WASHINGTON (AP) — The Census Bureau says police employees in California are the best paid in the nation.

The bureau reported police pay in California averaged \$432 a month last year. The District of Columbia was second with an average of \$451.

South Carolina was last with a \$281 figure.

The figures include uniformed officers, clerks, janitors and all other police workers.

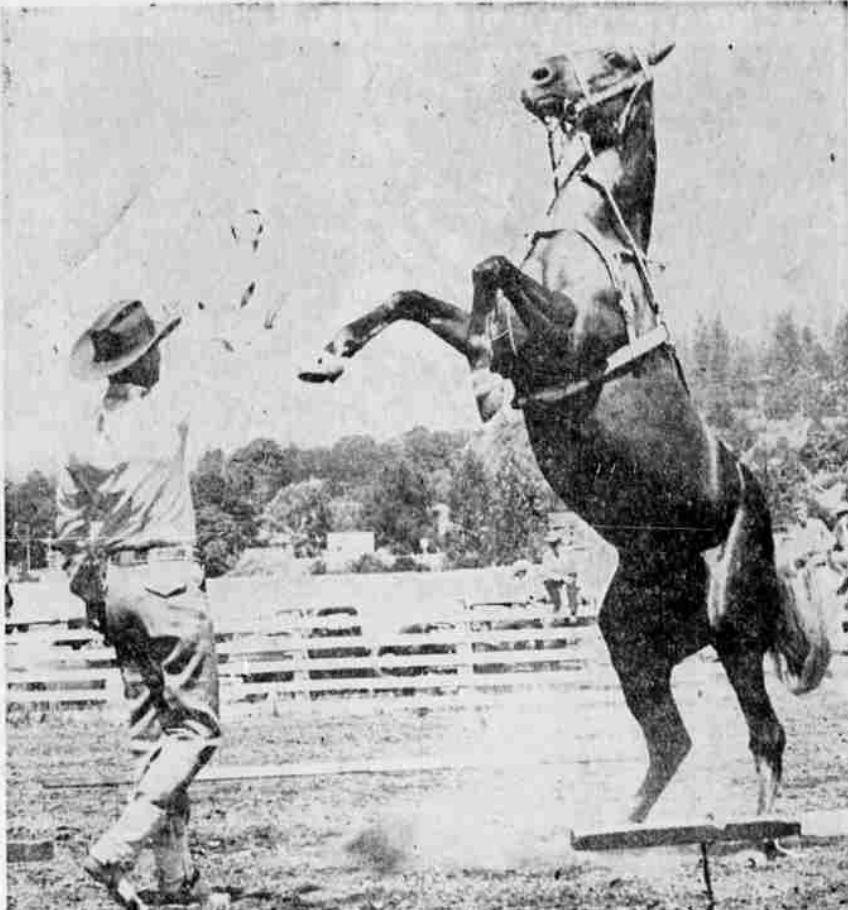
Morse said the President has conducted a regime "that steals within the law and has no regard for morality."

He said the President's support

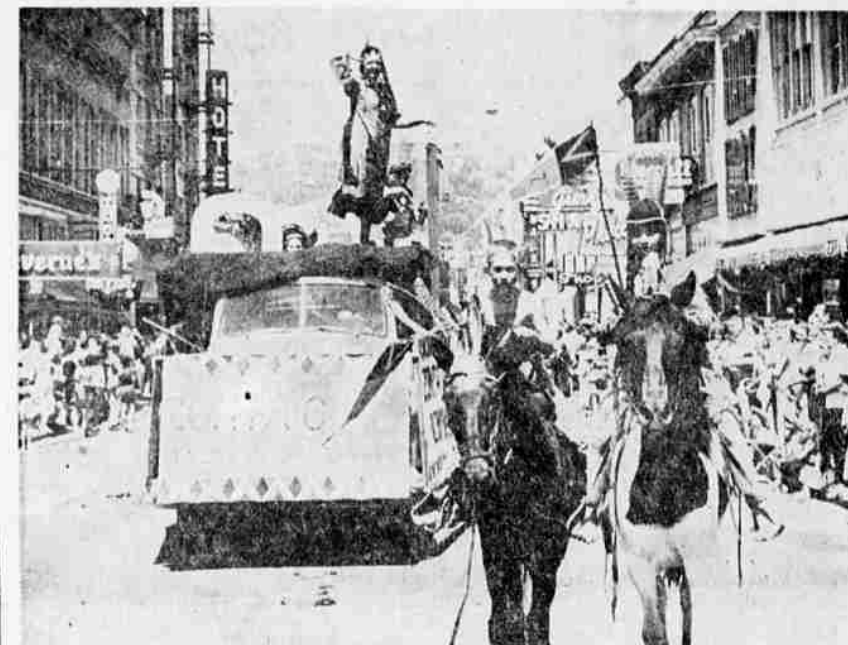
MARRIAGE LICENSE

BURBANK, Calif. (AP) — Television star Jack Webb and actress Jackie Loughery have a marriage license. But they haven't said when or where they will be married.

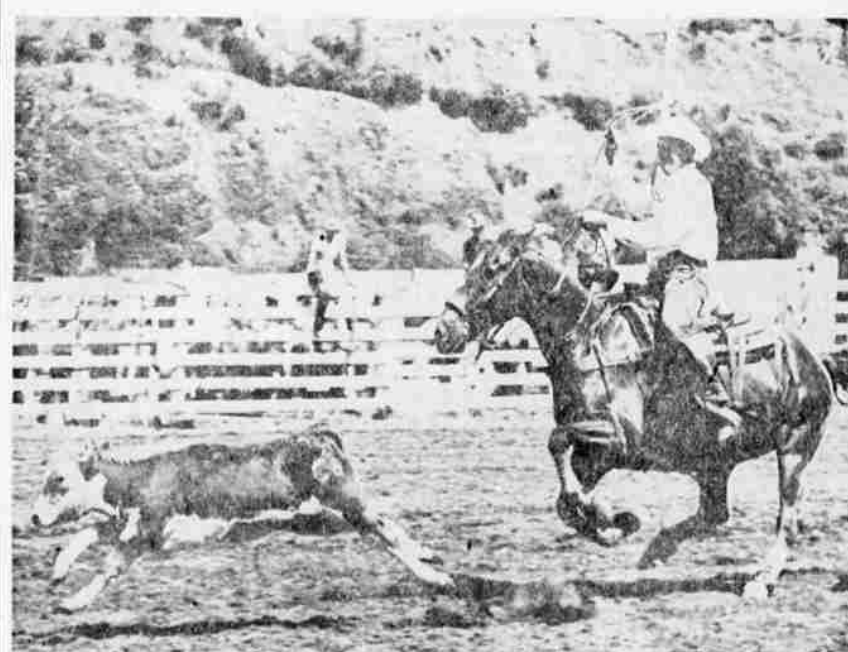
Webb, 38, and Miss Loughery, 28, former Miss USA, obtained the license Thursday.

Landlady Relents In Bricking Up Preacher Tenant

FONDI, Italy (AP) — The Catholic landlady who bricked up her Protestant minister tenant, said with a sigh today that maybe her offensive had backfired.

But Mrs. Gemma Rasile said she still was not finished with the Rev. Umberto Righetti, an evangelist of the First Church of Christ.

The minister rents two second-floor rooms from Mrs. Rasile and uses them as his residence and church. The landlady, living on the ground floor, objected to his Protestant flock trooping through her quarters. Early last month, armed with court permission, she had bricklayers seal up the only door to the preacher's rooms.

For three days the Rev. Mr. Righetti hauled his groceries through his window in a bucket and preached to his followers gathered in the street below. Then Mrs. Rasile relented and had the door unbricked. The minister resumed services in his rooms.

Followers Increase, Claim

Because of the publicity, Mrs. Rasile said, the evangelist now has "quite a few more followers than before."

"However, I believe he has increased his flock with only temporary followers who will leave him when the sensation quiets down," she said, adding ruefully: "I must admit he had my unwilling cooperation in surrounding himself with sensation."

The landlady insisted she had only given the preacher a four-month reprieve.

"He must find a new apartment in that time," she declared.

Therefore, I will have to tolerate him and his followers only until September. He will have to get out then — or I will have the door closed forever."

Audience Puffs 'Fags' During Cancer Speech

DALLAS (AP) — While cigarette smoke wafted up from the audience, the American Cancer Society's Dallas unit was chided here for flaunting the million dollars spent on the study of lung cancer.

"Nothing makes me angrier than to watch a person take a puff," said Dr. Robert J. Samp of the cancer research staff at the University of Wisconsin Medical Center, "and smile and say, 'Well, if I'm gonna go, it's a wonderful way to go.'"

"He will go, all right, and there's an excellent possibility the way will not be wonderful," he said.

Michigan Celebration Set For Five-Mile Bridge

STRAITS OF MACKINAC BRIDGE, Mich. (AP) — The Straits of Mackinac Bridge, five miles of steel and concrete that connects Upper and Lower Michigan, will be dedicated this week.

The formal ceremonies will be held Saturday in the midst of a festive celebration planned for the area.

Airplanes, marching men, aerial bombs, beauty queens, bands, horses, floats and politicians are on the program for the three-day celebration.

Three and a half years in the building, the bridge is the longest single-span structure in the world.

Top GOP Congressional Members Join Democrats In Snagging Ike's Policy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Members from both parties apparently are making it difficult for Republicans to build up the campaign theme that President Eisenhower needs a GOP Congress to get his legislative program approved.

The contention that the Democrats in Congress are hamstringing the President's proposals has been one of the main talking points of GOP National Chairman Meade Alcorn. Eisenhower himself used practically the same argument in an informal talk to the GOP state chairmen last Thursday.

But the Democrats and the Republicans are marking up a voting record in Congress that seems unlikely to sustain the GOP campaign argument.

For instance, unless all the signs

fail, Senate Democrats will have to furnish the lion's share of votes if Eisenhower's request for a five-year extension of the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act is approved.

Party Opposition Strong

Just as Republicans provided much of the opposition in the House, so the Senate finds its two top Republican leaders aligned against Eisenhower.

Senators Styles Bridges (R-NH) and William F. Knowland (R-Calif.) are leading a drive to cut the extension to three years. Bridges heads the party policy committee and Knowland is minority floor leader.

On the other hand, some of those counted among the strongest GOP supporters of the trade program voted against many of the administration's amendments to the labor regulation bill the Senate has passed. These included senators Clifford P. Case (R-NJ), John S. Cooper (R-Ky), Irving Ives (R-NY), Jacob K. Javits (R-NY) and Edward J. Thyne (R-Minn.).

Defense Plan Also Snagged

When the House passed a defense reorganization bill that was not fully satisfactory to the President, Republicans there wrote a record in support of Eisenhower's losing proposals. But Senate Republicans appear unlikely to muster even a majority of their members in support of similar amendments.

Knowland and Bridges led the successful Senate assault on proposed authority for Eisenhower to provide foreign aid for Iron Curtain countries. They won this fight after Knowland said Eisenhower favored the authority, but not under the foreign aid bill.

In some areas the Democrats have bucked Eisenhower. With some Republican help, they provided the votes to pass farm and public works bills he later vetoed. But even on these issues there was no clear-cut party line.

Don't Backslide, Graham's Appeal In Finale At S.F.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Billy Graham, styling himself "the messenger boy for Christ," went to bat against the Devil Sunday before 38,000 partisan fans at Seals Stadium.

The North Carolina evangelist ended his San Francisco crusade in the midst of an overflow crowd jammed into the 23,400-seat baseball park, home of the National League Giants.

"I know Willie Mays could fill Seals Stadium," he said from atop a platform at second base, "but I'm glad God can do it too."

"I am only the messenger boy for Christ. Give God the glory for what has been done this day."

Baseball was in the air before the sermon, with the Giants locked in an extra-inning battle with Philadelphia in the Pennsylvania city.

San Francisco Mayor George Christopher eased the tension with a brief announcement: "Kirkland hit a home run in the 14th inning and the Giants won."

Turning to Graham, the mayor said, "All of us are so much better off for having had him in our midst," and expressed belief the world should try morality for a change.

"We need moral and spiritual values," Christopher said. "We've tried everything else to find peace."

Don't Backslide, Plea

Graham, who last week concluded his seven-week San Francisco crusade, made a plea against backsliding.

To those who have made so-called "decision for Christ," he said, "Do not go back to your old ways of living or yield to temptations and old idolatries."

"Some 1,354 stepped forward in 'decisions' Sunday. They were part of a crowd topping by some 12,000 Graham's best attendance in the 16,400-seat Cow Palace, where his regular services were held."

The Baptist preacher, facing an oversized beer glass painted on a stadium signboard, told the crowd, "We should have a new outlook. We have responsibilities to our neighbors and must take a new attitude toward the racial question."

Church workers throughout the area will visit homes in an intensive follow-up to Graham's crusade, which moves on the Sacramento, Calif., next Sunday. A tour of California will follow.

New Evidence In Murphy Case Given To Porter

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.) showed new papers Monday which he said "back up to the hilt" a connection between U.S. flier Gerald Lester Murphy and Dr. Jesus de Galindez, who disappeared in 1956.

Porter showed the documents to reporters in his office. They were papers which the New York Times said earlier were in Murphy's handwriting.

"I have no doubt and the Justice Department has no doubt as to their authenticity," he said.

Porter long has been interested in the case, particularly since Murphy's parents live at Eugene, Ore., in his congressional district.

Dr. Galindez, an opponent of the Trujillo regime in the Dominican Republic, disappeared in New York on the night of March 12, 1956. There have been reports that he was flown to the Dominican Republic by Murphy, who himself later disappeared.

These reports were rejected by Morris L. Ernst, who was hired by the Dominican government to make an investigation of the Galindez case.

The State Department said consular officials found the newly-disclosed documents in a steel file in Murphy's apartment in Ciudad Trujillo, capital of the Dominican Republic.

Report "Fantastic"

Porter wired Ernst Monday saying: "Be pleased to make Gerald Murphy papers available to you in my office your earliest convenience. Hope you will examine them."

"I'd just like to see what he says to them. His report was so fantastic," Porter added.

He commented that the new papers were not available to Ernst before Ernst made his report.

Porter said he was going to examine the papers closely himself — "they're going to be part of my refutation of the Ernst report."

He said he had a letter from Murphy's parents empowering him to receive the new papers and he received them from the Justice Department Monday morning. The papers will go to Murphy's parents, Porter said.
