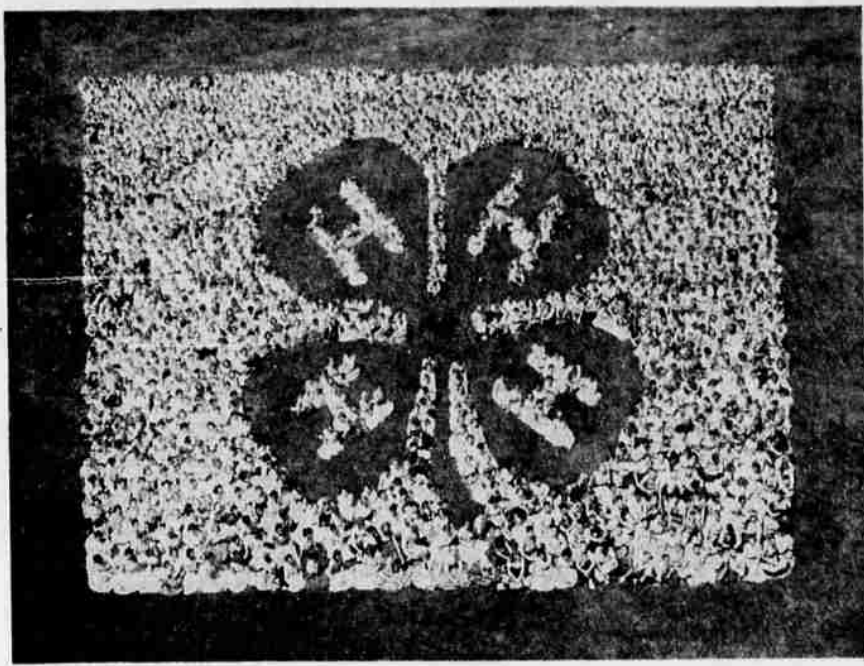

Local Youth Claims OSC Officer Bars

OREGON STATE COLLEGE — William R. Steele of Roseburg was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the Army at Oregon State College upon graduation and completion of the advanced ROTC training program.

The commissioning was a part of the college's 89th annual commencement exercises.

A total of 179 OSC senior men were commissioned this year including 80 in army ROTC, 29 in navy, 26 in air force, and 4 in the marine corps. All will be called to active duty for varying periods of time within the next year.

OSC is one of only 35 colleges in the country that offers advanced ROTC training in all branches of service.

Negroes Protest Youth's Arrest By Staging Riot

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Rioting Negroes, shouting "Little Little Rock," battled St. Louis County police early Friday after an officer arrested a 17-year-old youth on a traffic charge.

About 35 Negroes from the village of Neacham Park near suburban Kirkwood were involved in the hour-long riot, County police said. Several were arrested after four patrol cars were called to the scene.

Bricks and stones were hurled at the patrol car of patrolman Richard Seger, 25, who had stopped a car driven by Lee W. Lawrence, 17, on a careless driving charge.

Seger said he ordered Lawrence out of the car for a search and "he came out fighting."

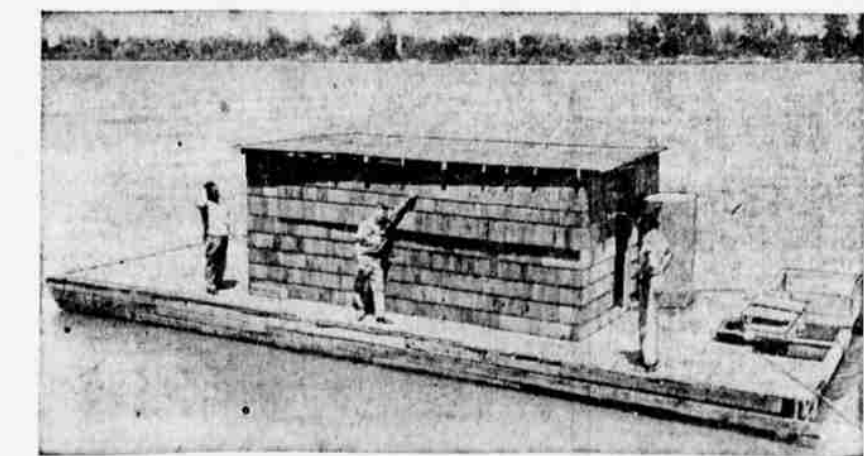
Other men came out of nearby houses and taverns as Seger sought to subdue Lawrence and his 17-year-old companion, Alfred S. Jackson.

Seger said he battled his way back to his patrol car and radioed for help. Then a brick crashed through the window of the patrol car and struck Seger in the arm. The group chanted "Little Little Rock."

Four one-man patrol cars quickly arrived on the scene and another 10 or 15 minutes were needed to quell the rioters, officers said.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON — Special recognition for high scholastic records were given 56 members of the senior class at the university's 81st annual commencement services this month.

Among those receiving "high scholarship" recognition and "sophomore honors" was Leola Carolyn Lorenzen. She is a Roseburg girl.

"Highest scholarship" recognition is given students who maintain a cumulative grade point average of 3.75 or higher on a possible 4.0 during their four years in college. High scholarship recognition is for those who maintain a cumulative GPA of 3.5.

"Sophomore honors" were given to students who during their freshman and sophomore years took special "honors" courses in the field of literature, social science, history and either biological or physical sciences and passed four comprehensive examinations.

P. Hoyt Says Not To Fear Federal Education Funds

TIMBERLINE LODGE, Ore. (AP) — It is needless to fear use of federal funds in education, Palmer Hoyt told a regional education group here Thursday night.

Federal money "need not be used to subvert our freedom," he asserted in telling a group of some 80 persons that it is time to get down to the business of specific advances in education.

Federal aid to schools is one of these things, he said, adding that it is necessary to get federal help. He said establishment of a national science academy along the lines of the military academy, higher teacher salaries and state action to equalize opportunities were all things which could produce results.

It is time, he said, to stop talking so much about the implications of Sputnik and get at the matter of improving school finances, organization and leadership.

He spoke at a western meeting of the National Citizens' Council for Better Schools. Hoyt, publisher of the Denver Post, is a former editor of The Oregonian.

Roseburg Trio On Church Tour

Three young Roseburg youths left Friday for Portland where they will join 30 other Presbyterian young persons from various Oregon communities for a two-week Presbyterian Mission Study tour.

From Roseburg were Cynthia Eastman, Gayle Harris and Brian Pargeter, accompanied by their advisors, Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Pargeter.

The mission tour will take them through the southwest, visiting mission stations and colleges in Idaho, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico and California. They also will visit Zion and Bryce Canyon National Parks, the Grand Canyon and Disneyland.

The tour is sponsored by the Youth Synod of Oregon. Expenses of local delegates were partially financed by food sales and a slave market in which members of their Westminster Fellowship group sold their services to other church members.

Sponsors of the tour said the purpose is not only to broaden the horizons and understanding of the young people who are going, but to provide background experience of program and resource material for all the Presbyterian youth of Oregon.

The 35 delegates will share their experiences with adult youth in Oregon churches through talks, panel discussions and film slides taken along the way.

Be Hopeful About Teenagers, Says Bishop F. Sheen

MT. ANGEL, Ore. (AP) — Be hopeful about today's teenagers, Bishop Fulton J. Sheen said here Thursday.

"They have been maligned very much," he told a press conference at this city where he has been holding retreats for Roman Catholic clergy.

The fling they are having, he said, can be blamed on a breakdown of parental discipline, a disrespect for the aged and a disregard for the Fourth Commandment.

Youth is in rebellion, he said, because it feels it is being cheated of the rights it should have.

Turning to another topic, he said it is the duty of newspapers not only to print news but to present truth and not to excite controversy and antagonisms.

"Too much of the news," he said, "is about the breaking of commandments and not enough about the faithful spouse who stays home and does the dishes."

Wool Growers To Get Government Payments

WASHINGTON (AP) — Farmers will get government payments of \$15.50 for each \$100 they received from the sale of wool during the year ended April 1.

These payments will be made by the Agriculture Department under its wool program, designed to encourage an increase in production. The payments are designed to help bring returns from wool to a national average price of 62 cents a pound. Market prices averaged 33.7 cents a pound.

The payments will be made during the summer on the basis of market receipts submitted by wool growers.

The wool payment program expires this year unless Congress votes to extend it. The Eisenhower administration is urging an extension.

SPOKANE (AP) — The Spokane County chapter quit the American Cancer Society Thursday because of orders from the national organization that local units withdraw from united community fund campaigns.

Chapter officers said they have formed their own group, the Spokane County Cancer Assn., and will continue to take part in the Spokane United Crusade drive.

The American Cancer Society ordered its local chapters to withdraw from united fund drives and conduct their own independent money campaigns.

The Spokane chapter quit the national society with the resignation of 18 of the 19 members of its advisory council. A spokesman said the officers believe in the United Crusade method of collecting funds to fight cancer.

'Objector' Takes Medics Training

A Roseburg youth, Donald F. Christie of 1126 NE Walnut St., was among 275 draft age men from the United States and Puerto Rico attending the annual national training camp sponsored by the Seventh-day Adventist Church at Grand Lodge, Mich.

He and the other young men, classified as "conscientious objectors" attended at their own expense. They received a stiff training course to prepare them for Medical Corps work.

The camp has the formal approval of the Army Surgeon General's office.

Because of their religious principles against taking life or bearing arms, Adventist draftees could be exempted completely from military service, but they are willing to wear the uniform, salute the flag and serve as medical corpsmen.

SALEM (AP)—Gov. Robert D. Holmes said Friday he is hopeful that a new highway will be built between Klamath Falls and Medford. It would replace the Green Springs Highway.

He said that when he was in Washington, D. C., this week a Forest Service official told him that there is a good chance that the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads would make a survey of the route soon.
