Ted Kroll Packs Two-Stroke Lead

FLINT, Mich. — It has been two years since Ted Kroll reaped the biggest payoff in the history of golf but the compact little veteran from Sarasota, Fla., is back knocking on the victory door again.

He carried a two-stroke lead into today's final round of the \$52,000 Flint Open.

Tommy Bolt, the fellow the 39-year-old Kroll unseated in yesterday's third round, said he was glad to be out of the lead for the first time in six competitive rounds.

"Let him find out how it feels up there in that No. 1 spot," said Bolt.

Consistency paid off for Kroll, whose \$72,000-plus earnings two years ago stand as the highest money total for one golfer in a single year.

Kroll has missed hitting only four greens in regulation since the 72-hole affair began at the Warwick Hills Golf and Country Club in nearby Grand Blanc. He has been over par on just two out of 52 holes.

"I'm hitting the ball better than I have in two years," he said.

"I'd like to hit this well the rest of my life and I'd be happy."

Kroll seized the lead from Bolt with a 3-under-par 69 while the U. S. Open champion was recording his second par.

Kroll's 4-hole total was 211, two strokes better than Bolt and Jack Fleck, Rochester, Mich. Fleck fired a 69 yesterday.

Trailing Fleck and Bolt by one stroke were Julius Boros, Mid Pines, N. C., and Bill Casper Jr., Apple Valley, Calif. Bob Roseburg, Palo Alto, Calif., was even with par at 216.

Series No-Hitter Recalled In Larson Two-Hit Victory

DETROIT (AP) — Everything is anticlimactic for Don Larson. Try as he does the New York Yankee right-hander undoubtedly never will repeat his miracle of Oct. 8, 1956.

That was the memorable day he pitched the first perfect game in World Series history.

He came pretty close to pitching another no-hitter yesterday. The Detroit Tigers collected only two singles off the no-windup pitcher as he blanked them 15-0. It was his third shutout of the season.

Unlike that sunny day in Yankee Stadium, there was no suspense. Billy Martin, who was on Larson's side in the perfect game, touched him for a line drive single in the second. Larson retired the next 16 batters before Earl Harris grounded a single through the infield in the seventh.

Only three other Tigers reached base. Larson walked the first two batters to face him in the first and issued another pass in the eighth.

"No, I don't think it was my best since the no-hitter," Larson said. "I've had better stuff in other games."

Larson seems to pitch his best when the going is toughest. Before today the Tigers had whipped the Yankees seven straight times. Casey Stengel barred his clubhouse doors after Saturday's 1-0 loss and gave his ruminating league leaders a stern chewing out.

It must have worked.

The Yankees wreaked vengeance with six runs in the first inning and gave Larson more working margin than he needed.

Elliott Starts Race Dispute

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (AP) — Herb Elliott of Australia has run another record-breaking mile race and started another controversy among track officials.

The lanky young miler was clocked in 3:57.9 in winning his specialty at the AAU championships Saturday night, shading the recognized mark of 3:58 set four years ago by his countryman, John Landy.

But no one seems to know for certain whether the International Amateur Athletic Federation, which must pass on all world records, recognizes mile marks recorded in tenths of seconds.

It was dealing only in fifths of seconds when Landy set his record four years ago. Landy actually ran 3:57.9, too, but it was recorded as 3:58 because of the IAAF policy.

Official Hopful

However, Pincus Sober, chairman of the national AAU track and field committee, expressed confidence Elliott's time would be recognized as a new world record.

He said the tenth-second practice was rescinded two years ago and would not apply to Elliott's effort as it did to Landy's four years ago.

Just a month ago Elliott broke the tape in another record mile only to get fouled up in the IAAF's red tape. His 3:57.8 in the Coliseum Relays at Los Angeles went for naught as a record because a last-minute entrant in the race turned out to be a pace setter who dropped out after a half mile.

Pushing Elliott all the way on the last quarter-mile Saturday night was his fellow Australian, Merv Lincoln, who finished three strides back, timed in 3:58.5.

Strides Fourth

Of most of the New York Athletic Club was third, Jim Grelle of Oregon, fourth, Jerome Walters of the Southern California Striders fifth, and Don Bowden of California, sixth.

All of them ran a tremendous race, with Bowden clocked in 4:02.6 in sixth place.

Jack Larson of the University of Washington was also in the field of 10 runners.

Eddie Southern of the University of Texas equalled the accepted world record in the 440 earlier in the evening. Southern was timed in 45.8 seconds to match the record set two years ago by Jim Lea of the University of Southern California.

At a meeting Sunday AAU officials and track coaches picked a team to face Russian speed and brawn in an international meet at Moscow next month. Most of the members finished in first or second place in the AAU championships.

The two chosen for the 1,500 meter run were Grelle of Oregon and Moran of the New York Athletic Club.
