

Oregon State Budget To be Revised, Richardson Says

SALEM (AP) — The state budget to be submitted to the 1959 Legislature will be revised in order to present more graphically the programs of each state agency, state Finance Director John F. Richardson announced Thursday.

Instead of just showing dollar amounts to be spent by the agencies, the new budget will show the services to be rendered and the objectives of each department and institution, Richardson said.

In order to plan the new budget, Richardson announced he has borrowed Kenneth Bragg, chief administrative officer for Los Angeles County, Calif., for the next two months. Bragg is a former employee of the Bonneville Administration.

"The budget," Richardson said, "is getting so complicated that we have to do something so that the Legislature and the governor

can deal with it more effectively. This improved budget presentation should help."

Richardson also announced he has ordered a survey of warehouse space in the Salem area. This, he said, might lead to construction or purchase of a central warehouse so that state agencies and institutions could buy in bigger quantities and thus save money.

The survey, to last all summer, will be conducted by William R. Hanson, Berkeley, Calif., who has just won his master's degree in public health at the University of California.

Dulles Says Not To Take Russian Threat Lightly

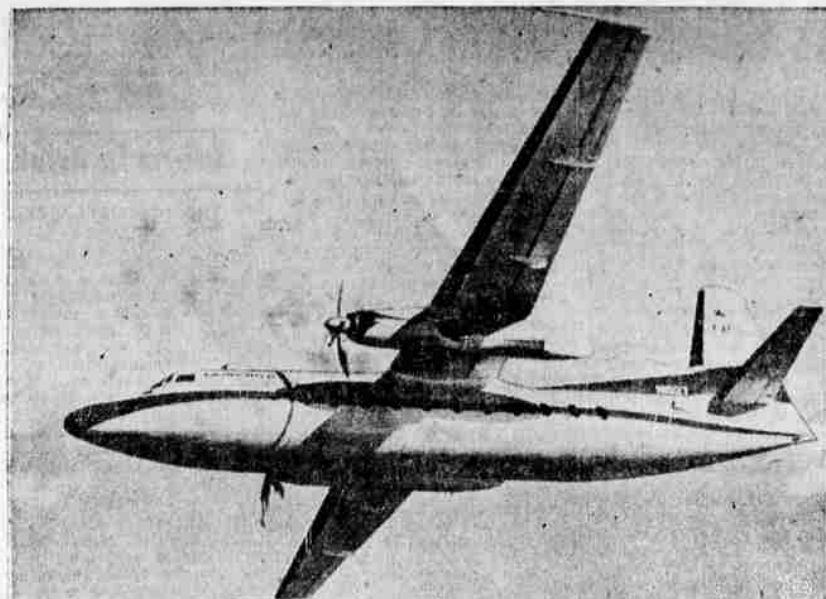
WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Dulles told Congress Friday it would be reckless to take lightly Russia's threat of economic warfare against the United States.

"The strategy of communist imperialism," he said, "involves the subversion of country after country until the United States is isolated and subject to economic strangulation."

Dulles was before the Senate Finance Committee, urging a five-year extension of the trade agreements act which expires this month.

The act authorizes the President to negotiate tariff reductions in order to stimulate trade. Dulles said the trade agreements program, together with the U.S. foreign aid, constitute "our basic answer" to Soviet Premier Khrushchev's economic warfare challenge.

The House has passed the trade agreements extension bill.

Gov. Holmes Says He Will Not Run For U. S. Senate

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Robert D. Holmes said Friday he would not run for the U. S. Senate in 1960, but he would like to see Richard L. Neuberger.

The governor said he heard the rumor that he would run from members of Oregon's congressional delegation while he was in Washington, D. C., Thursday.

"I will not run," he told a press conference. "I have no aspiration for the Senate."

Both Democrats, Neuberger will complete his first six-year Senate term in 1960, but hasn't said whether he will seek reelection.

The governor, up for reelection this year, said his Republican opponent, Secretary of State Mark Hatfield, hasn't said whether he favors a regional corporation to build dams and distribute power in the Northwest.

The governor gave his stand in favor of such a corporation to a congressional committee a few weeks ago.

"There isn't one word of testimony on this subject from Mr. Hatfield," Holmes said. "The people

are entitled to know where he stands. It is strange that he hasn't said anything about it."

The power policy committee of the state Republican central committee endorsed the regional corporation idea, but several Republican leaders have opposed this report.

The governor said he told another congressional committee this week that the federal government should adopt minimum payments for unemployment benefits.

The present system, he said, gives some states, such as the southern states, a big advantage in attracting new industry because they pay low benefits.

"There is real competition," he said, "among the states to get new industry, and this has become a real factor."

He said he was happy to have been in the Senate Thursday when it voted to repeal the excise taxes on transportation. The governor long has favored repeal of those taxes. He thinks repeal would be a great benefit to the Western states.

A-War Wouldn't Kill All In U. S.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Nuclear war wouldn't destroy the United States—just 40 per cent of it.

And the only way 60 per cent of the population could survive, a group of Air Force researchers forecast Friday, is for the United States not to lose that radioactive battle, but rather reach a "negotiated draw."

Should that stalemate be accomplished, said Herman Kahn, chairman of a 20-man research team at the Rand Corp. of Santa Monica, the United States could restore its survivors to very nearly their accustomed standard of living within 10 years.

Kahn addressed the closing session of a two-day symposium on modern warfare at the Hunters Point Naval Radiological Defense Laboratory.

The 20-man study, an admitted "quick job" done in three months, assumed that all 53 major manufacturing areas in the United States would be wiped out

by an enemy thermonuclear attack.

But the 60 per cent of the population living outside these centers and the 35 per cent of national wealth elsewhere would remain.

In fact, Kahn said, even if the hundred largest U. S. cities were destroyed "there would still be more wealth left in America than in all of Russia."

However, of the survivors of nuclear war, many would be stricken with fatal bone cancer and leukemia and those at the point where a bomb hit would be beyond protection, even though "medical science can handle the effects of all known atomic elements."
