Teenagers Admit Killing Old Man

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Acting

police chief Paul Caffrey announced Saturday that six teenagers have confessed killing an elderly man in a \$13 robbery two weeks ago.

The youths, Negroes ranging in age from 15 to 18, were picked up Friday night as part of an intensive police drive following three fatal muggings in the city within two weeks. All the victims were white.

Victim of the street robbery and slaying was Ludwig Lauther, 74,

of Newark, mechanical engineering consultant. His body was found on a sidewalk on June 7.

Police said he was knocked to the ground by a single punch from a 17-year-old boy. One of the others grabbed his wallet and they ran.

Two of the older boys got \$2.50 each while the others got \$2 each. Then they threw away the wallet and scattered.

Caffrey said murder charges would be filed against the older boys in the group.
