

## Present-Day Needs Demand Full-Scale School Reform, Foundation's Report Says

WASHINGTON (AP) — A two-year study concludes that a full-scale reform movement is needed to raise American education standards to the needs of modern times. A report by the Rockefeller Brothers Fund, Inc., called for immediate and far-reaching changes in the nation's educational system — not just more money.

The report echoed oft-repeated statements that American schools are overcrowded, understaffed and ill-equipped. It said the basic problem is one of providing more money, but that other things must be done too.

The report suggested these steps:

1. Testing and guidance procedures must be strengthened to push along more talented students who may be held back by average or slow groups.
2. Some educational problems "gravely affecting the national interest" may require a helping hand from the federal government.
3. National leaders must grasp the scope of the job that lies ahead.

**Wrong Approach Seen**  
"Perhaps the greatest problem facing American education is the widely held view that all we require are a few more teachers, a few more buildings, a little more money," said the report.

"Such an approach will be disastrous. An educational system grudgingly and tardily patch-

ed to meet the needs of the moment will be perpetually out of date.

"We must build for the future in education as daringly and aggressively as we have built other aspects of our national life in the past."

The report, based on a study by a panel of prominent Americans, said virtually every subject taught in American schools would profit by "a lively reform movement of the sort now going on in physics and mathematics teaching."

The crisis in science education, the report said, "is not an invention of the newspapers, or scientists or the Pentagon. It is a real crisis."

It has all been brought about, the group said, by man's swift plunge into a new technological era that is bringing changes "so startling as to test to the utmost our adaptive capacities, our stability and our wisdom."

The report said it is likely the educational crisis will get worse before it eases.

TACOMA (AP) — It'll be a June wedding for Mrs. Ida Ella Hulén, 92, and George M. Landon, 89, here Thursday.

Since romance comes at any age, Mrs. Hulén hopes this marriage lasts as long as the last one. Her previous one to George B. Hulén lasted 60 years until the day he fell out of an apple tree and died eight years ago.

Mrs. Hulén, now 92, was a little lonely, so at the suggestion of F. E. Mackenzie, 88, she took in Landon, now 89, as a boarder.

"They were both good people," Mackenzie said. "I knew once I got them together, something was bound to happen."

"We weren't really very serious until about three months ago," Mrs. Hulén said. "Then we decided marriage was the thing for us."

"She seems to think I got her the greatest man she's ever seen," the 89-year-old Cupid chuckled as he stood with the happy couple in Auditor Jack Sonntag's office Monday. He was a witness to the fact that both were old enough to get married without their parents' consent.

The bride and groom couldn't wait, either, so they went to Judge Bartlett Rummel's court to get a waiver on the three-day waiting period.

"I guess you're old enough to know what you are doing," Judge Rummel told them as he signed the waiver.

Landon is no newcomer to Tacoma. He came here from Michigan 30 years ago. He and his first wife had six children—four still are living. Mrs. Hulén had one daughter, Mrs. Goldie May Kern of Bremerton.

### Bomb Kills Five In Beirut Area

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — A bomb exploded in a bustling shopping area of Beirut Monday, killing five persons including a woman and her child.

The bomb went off just opposite the fruit bazaar in downtown Beirut. An empty bus parked at the curb shielded many shoppers and reduced the casualty toll.

The bombing came after several days of relative calm in the Lebanese capital while U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld was conferring here with government officials. Hammarskjöld left Saturday for Cairo but is to return Tuesday.

It was the worst terrorist outbreak since a crowded tram was bombed several weeks ago.

A second bomb exploded shortly afterward on another downtown street. It blew a door from a shop and one person was injured.

The bombings apparently were directed at shopkeepers who opened for business in defiance of a general strike ordered weeks ago by the rebels fighting to overthrow President Camille Chamoun.

The terrorist acts shattered the hopes of many here that the arrival of U.N. observers meant an easing of tension.

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## Morningside Hospital Not To Be Prosecuted

PORTLAND (AP) — Dist. Atty. Leo Smith of Multnomah County (Portland) said Morningside Hospital will not be prosecuted on congressional charges of mistreatment of Alaskan mental patients.

Smith said he had made an intensive investigation of the charges contained in a majority report by a subcommittee of the House Committee on Government Operations. The majority report listed a number of cases of what the congressmen said were mistreatment or improper treatment of the patients.

The Republican minority report accused Democrats on the committee of political partisanship and prejudice in the conduct of public hearings on the hospital.

Smith said that any accusation of mistreatment could not be prosecuted because the statute of limitations has run out. His office investigated only cases in which patients had died and found no basis for prosecution, he said.

The hospital has a contract with the government for caring for mental patients from Alaska.

Wayne Coe, who operates the hospital, has repeatedly denied that there has been any mistreatment of patients.

## Gunfight Victim's Funeral Scheduled

JOHN DAY (AP) — Funeral services were scheduled here Tuesday afternoon for Harlin Williams, 46, a Fox Valley rancher who was killed in a gunfight at his ranch Saturday.

They were to follow a preliminary hearing at Canyon City for Robert E. Sproul, 43, Williams' brother-in-law and Mr. Vernon Cattlemen. Sproul was held after the shooting, although no formal charge was placed against him.

Pistol bullets in the chest killed Williams. They were fired after the two ranchers, who had been quarreling over right of way to a road crossing Williams' property, met at a fence gate separating their properties.

Williams' brother, Dolly of Ontario, said he was present at the meeting in an attempt to make peace. He told Sheriff Ray Brisho that he looked down for a moment, heard shots, but was not able to determine which man had fired first.

Williams fell, fatally wounded. Sproul was not hit.

## Elfrida Facing Tough Opponent

NEW YORK (AP) — Elfrida Von Nardroff's drive to even larger TV quiz show winnings has hit a snag in the person of Robert Leicester.

Leicester, a New York City educator, and Miss Von Nardroff, top money winner in TV quiz show history, played one tie game last week, two more Monday night and are deadlocked 10-10 so far in a fourth game.

When they return to NBC's "Twenty-One" next week a possible \$12,000 will be at stake. They are playing for \$2,000 a point difference in their scores. Thus to win \$12,000 one contestant must blank the other 21-0.

Miss Von Nardroff has won \$233,500 so far. If she beats Leicester by 21-0 in their carry-over game, her winnings will zoom to \$295,500. If Leicester beats her by 21-0, her winnings will drop to \$211,500 and she will be eliminated from the show.

On the basis of her present \$233,500 winnings, tax experts figure Miss Von Nardroff would have to pay about \$200,000 to federal and state governments.

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## Aug. 1 Deadline For Registering Water Wells

Oregon residents have until Aug. 1 to register their water wells, Lewis A. Stanley, state engineer, announced.

Failure to comply will deprive persons of their right to continued use of ground water from the wells. Certain uses of ground water are exempt from registration. Owners or operators of wells that are used in unlawful appropriations of ground water should make application to the state engineer for a permit to appropriate ground water.

A right to appropriate ground water under a registration has a tentative priority based on the date when construction of the well was begun. Forms and information regarding well registration or permits to appropriate ground water can be obtained by writing to Stanley at Salem.
