MOVING ON to another topic—Some time ago, Roseburg baseball fans learned with much pleasure that the city was due for a new baseball field. The idea of a new lighted park was great!

Now, after much apparently unnecessary delay, fans are wondering, what's the holdup?

Evidently no one knows.

June 15 was the target date for completion of the new field. This allowed 3 1/2 months for the job, which should have been sufficient time.

The reason for the delay is very apparent to those watching the project closely. Lack of a well-coordinated plan of attack.

Work went along at a so-so pace as the field was leveled, however, it appeared as if no one working on the project was aware of one thing. An outfield is a tricky bit of territory for a ball player to cover at best; with holes, hills and dips throughout, the area is nearly an impossible chore. Apparently, officials of the project were finally checked out on this fact.

Meanwhile, time marches on.

THE GRASS INFELD was seeded next, and a second time. Why no success in this department? Evidently because no one was informed grass should be watered periodically to insure growth. On everyday trips to the site during the past three weeks, I observed only one instance where the new grass had been watered. I learned water had been brought on the river on ONE occasion. Last week, when hot weather hit the area, there was no attempt to protect the new grass, although the ground was baked hard enough to require the use of a shovel to dent the surface.

Though, on the public golf course ground during the extra-hot weather, the new grass surrounding the new club house was kept wet constantly.

And time marches on.

During the past three weeks, the total work force consisted of two men. With this "complement" of workmen, the grandstand foundations were the next phase. With two and sometimes only one man on the job, the forms were finally completed, and some poured. By Monday of this week, about 2-3 of the forms were finished, leaving still over 20 to go and the work force had increased from two to six, the new four raking the outfield.

OVER FOUR WEEKS to build and pour foundation forms! Still, time marches on.

Still to come is the building of the grandstand, which, based on the time consumed on the other phases of the project, could finally be completed by the end of baseball season.

The group taking the real beating from this farce is the local Legion Post.

This organization has supplied \$7,000 to the construction of the new park, and thus far has realized nothing from the project except the cancellation of three home games. At the moment, the only thing to which the Legion can look forward is a continued loss at the gate.

The Legion could have earmarked its money for re-construction of the Finlay Field facilities and could have been playing ball there again this year for the large crowds which have been drawn in the past.

It has been the American Legion junior baseball which has placed Roseburg on the map nationwide. It's an unwarranted blow to be losing home playing dates and crowds due to the city park fiasco.

The Legion is deserving of better treatment than this.

Yes, Roseburg will have a new baseball field—and time marches on!

The Chicago White Sox finally have put Manager Al Lopez's formula for success to work: If you can't score many runs yourself, don't let the other guy score any at all.

It sounds tough, but that's just what the Sox pitching staff has been doing lately. Ray Moore loaded another shutout on the American League—leading New York Yankees last night with a three-hitter that gave Chicago a 2-0 victory and a share of fourth place.

Moore, another profit in that power-pitching trade plan put into effect by the Sox last winter, hadn't pitched a shutout in a year, but he helped boost Chicago's whitewash total to six in nine games.

The second-place Kansas City A's whipped Washington 7-2 and retained their one-game lead over the third-place Detroit Tigers, who defeated Baltimore 3-1 in the only other game scheduled.

Milwaukee Coasts

In the National League, the Milwaukee Braves defeated San Francisco 7-0. St. Louis moved into a third-place tie with Cincinnati by beating Pittsburgh 7-5 while the Redlegs beat Los Angeles 6-1.

Moore, now 4-1, gave up nothing but singles, none after the fourth inning, and walked but two while striking out five. The Sox moved into a tie with idle Boston. A walk and Sherm Lollar's eighth home run in the first inning off south-

paw Whitey Ford accounted for the Chicago Runs.

The A's counted three home runs, one Bob Cerv's 19th to lead, when he beat the Yankees. Little Murry Dickson won his fifth with a seven-hitter.

Success Wins First

George Saxe, late of Boston, won his first for Detroit in his first complete game since Sept. 25, 1949, when he beat the Yankees. The lone Oriole run came in the sixth on Gus Triandos' 15th homer.

Your ace has lost three in a row. Your World Series hero is stumbling along with a 3-5 record. Your most consistent winner is on the disabled list and your pitching staff has come through with only one nine-inning complete game in more than three weeks. You should be dead.

Instead, the Milwaukee Braves reached down to the minors and pulled out a plump named Carleton Williams, a big right-hander who won 21 at Wichita last season. He was the toast of the dozen or so kid pitchers who crowded the spring camp. But come outdown time and he was shipped back to Wichita.

Now, with Warren Spahn slumping, Lew Burdette at 500 for 10 decisions and Bob Buhl ailing, Willey was called back, and he came back big—pitching a six-hit shutout in his first major league start and beating second-place San Francisco 7-0 last night.

SF Loses Ground

That bounced the Giants 2 1/2 games behind and in danger of being overhauled by St. Louis and Cincinnati.

Willey, 27, walked but one and struck out seven—giving up half the Giants' hits to Leon Wagner, who was purchased Saturday from Phoenix. Willey, apparently out of his slump, had two of the Giants' hits—the second a single for his 1,000th hit in the majors.

The Pirates built a 3-0 lead against the Cards, then blew it with five errors, three by Ted Kluszewski. Curt Flood had four hits for St. Louis.

Brooks Lawrence (5-3) won his fourth in a row for the Redlegs, going all the way with a six-hit while Cincy handed Johnny Podres his sixth defeat.

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Seven players with batting averages above .300 will be on the roster of the Pacific Coast League South team which meets a Northern squad in a PCL All-Star game in Vancouver, B.C., June 30.

Leading the power-packed Southers will be Salt Lake City outfielder Carlos Bernier, whose .370 average is pacing the PCL batting race, and teammate Dick Stuart, tops in home runs and runs batted in.

Fans picked 10 players from each division and eight more were added by All-Star Managers Charlie Metro of Vancouver for the South and Red Davis of Phoenix for the South.

Other .300 plus hitters on the South squad are Earl Averill, San Diego; Harry Bright, Sacramento; Andre Rodgers, and Bob Prescott, both of Phoenix; and Eddie Kazak, San Diego.

Debate Near On Sport Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House moved today toward debate on whether professional baseball's long immunity from anti-trust laws should be ended.

The House has before it legislation to spell out how the anti-trust laws would apply to four professional team sports—baseball, football, basketball and hockey.

Baseball is most vulnerable because the Supreme Court last year said that under present law baseball is still outside the scope of the antitrust statutes. Football comes under them. There have been no recent test cases on the other sports.

Three Paths Open

The representatives, who will not vote finally on the measure before tomorrow, could take any of three courses—leave things as they are, with baseball exempt and the exact applicability of the laws to other sports doubtful; or pass either of two pending bills.

The bill officially before the House would apply the antitrust laws to the four sports insofar as their business operations are concerned, but would exempt "reasonably necessary" operations connected with the games themselves—such as reserve clauses binding players to a particular team; territorial arrangements and the like. But they would have to be proved "reasonably necessary."

The author of this bill, Rep. Emanuel Celler (R-N.Y.), contends at least this much restriction is necessary, or "baseball owners will do as they wish."

Keating Dissents

But Rep. Kenneth B. Keating (R-N.Y.), one of a group of authors of a rival bill, has served notice he will try to have it substituted for Celler's. It is similar, but does not confine the exemption to "reasonably necessary" arrangements.

Keating and his colleagues contend these two words are an invitation to numerous lawsuits baseball couldn't afford. Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick and other highly placed spokesmen have expressed agreement.

Keating said an informal poll he conducted of House members indicates that his proposal "will gain a decisive victory."

Lockwood, Winetroutr Scheduled To Do Battle Wednesday Night

The first meeting of the year between the Lockwood Motors American Legion junior baseball team and the Winetroutr Ford club of Myrtle Creek is set for Wednesday night at Glendale. The first game of the district doubleheader will start at 7:30 p.m.

Both teams have played several games in the still young season, with the Lockwood nine sporting the better over-all season mark. Bill Harper's nine has won five games while losing three. Lost Four Straight

Myrtle Creek won its opener and has dropped four in a row in league play. Two games to Eugene and two to Lowell. For Lockwood, non-league games were wins over North Bend and Medford and losses to North Bend and Central Point. In district action, the Roseburg Legion team has handled Lowell twice and Eugene once, while losing to the Eugene club.

In the important twin-bill Wednesday, George will use Wes Davidson, a right-hander, in the first game, with southpaw Steve Keele going in the other tilt. Davidson is 1-2 and Keele 0-2.

For Lockwood, three hurlers could draw the mound duties. Right-handers Bob Whipple and Bill Eswine and southpaw John Livingston have all of the team's wins to their credit. Whipple is 2-2, Eswine 2-0 and Livingston 1-1.

The first game lineup for Winetroutr will find Gene Morrison behind the plate with Fred Earwood on first, Bob Cavanaugh on second, Gregg Lindquist at third and Rod Trask at short. In the outfield will be Buddy Smart in left, Troy Reynolds in center and Dave Weakley in right.

For Lockwood, Byron Baker will be behind the plate, with either Livingston or Gene Wagoner at first, Mike Hatfield at second, Eswine or Ted Kolberg at third and Don Wells at short. In the outfield will be Floyd Phillips in left, Wes Young in center and Bob Scott in right.

Casper Cops Golf Tourney In Michigan

FLINT, Mich. (AP) — Today is Bill Casper Jr.'s 27th birthday and he has a check for \$9,000, a gleaming trophy and the title of golf's leading money winner to make it a happy one.

The bevy ex-sailor from Apple Valley, Calif., packed \$9,000 worth of drama and excitement into one final putt yesterday. From a distance of 3½ feet he captured the \$52,000 Flint Open tournament by a single stroke.

Casper finished with a 71, one-under-par, and his 285 tournament total nosed out Masters champion Arnold Palmer of Latrobe, Pa., and Ted Kroll of Sarasota, Fla., by a stroke.

Palmer finished brilliantly with a 69, the finest of the rainy day, while third round leader Kroll staggered in with a 75.

Casper, whose winnings for the year exceed \$31,000, actually credited a two-hour downpour with helping him to his third triumph of the year. The apple-cheeked fellow with the rosy disposition sailed home splendidly after rain sogged the Warwick Hills course at nearby Grand Blanc.

Winner of the Crosby and Colonial events, Casper was two-over-par after four holes when rain brought a stoppage of play. He had gone over par on both the third and fourth holes when the skies gave way and forced a two-hour delay.

When play resumed he caught fire and Kroll, still two strokes ahead at that stage, sagged badly. Casper birdied the fifth hole while Kroll carded a double-bogie.

"That was the difference right there," said the new champion. "Everything I hit after that—no matter how I hit my shots—seemed to end up in the right place. I was pretty lucky."

Kroll and Palmer each picked up \$3,800. U. S. Open champion Tommy Bolt, snarling about the rain—"I won't play!" he had said in the locker room when officials called for play to resume—finished with 74 and tied for fourth with Doug Ford at 287.

Bolt, who led for two rounds in this event after leading all four rounds of last week's National Open, played the role of "Terrible Tommy" after two weeks of pleasantness.

Parry O'Brien Added To Eugene Meet Field
