Judge Denies Motion To Stay Suspend Order

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — U.S. District Judge Harry J. Lemley denied Monday a motion to stay his own order of Saturday which suspended integration in Little Rock schools for two and one-half years.

The judge said that to grant a stay would keep the racial situation at Central High School intolerable because too much time would be consumed in processing a Negro attorneys appeal of his order.

Wiley Branton, attorney for the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People, said he planned to telephone the U. S. Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals at St. Louis to ask for instructions on how to obtain a stay from that court. He said the appeal of Lem-

ley's integration order itself will be handled routinely. Notice of appeal has been filed here.

"I don't know at this point exactly how this is going to be handled," Branton told a newsman. "I may have to go to the chief circuit judge's home."

At St. Louis, Robert C. Tucker, clerk of the appeals court, said Branton had phoned. Tucker said he told him to mail his motion for the stay to the court and he would forward it to Chief Judge Archibald Gardner at his home in Huron, S.D.

The Little Rock School Board had opposed Branton's motion for a stay on grounds it would be in the interest of Negro students only, not the public.

Oral arguments on Branton's

motion took only six minutes. The court room was nearly filled with spectators. Branton was the only Negro attorney present.

Finally he decided Lair must be clean and entered. He found the room empty, the shower still running.

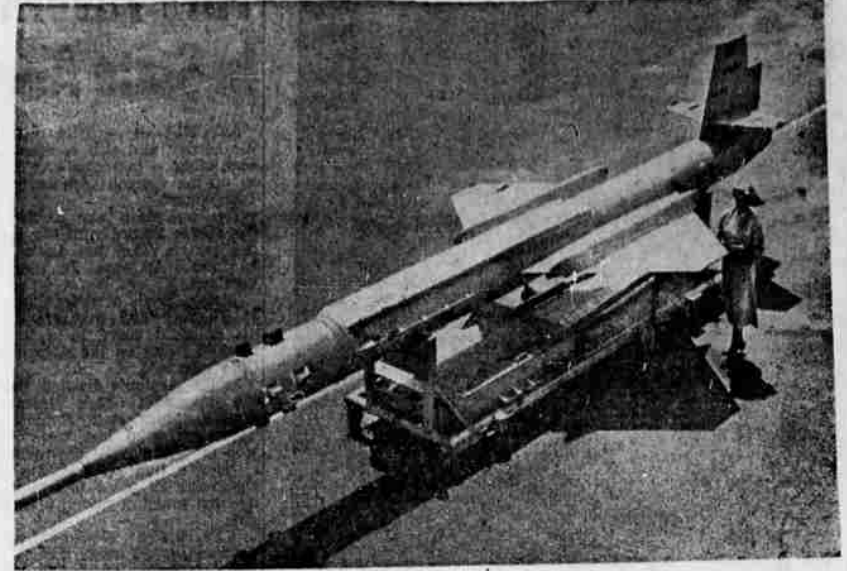
2-State Potato Board Has New Members
