Those St. Louis Cardinals, finding a new hero for each series, have slugged into second place in the National League race on a monthlong ride from the depths.

It was Joe Cunningham's late-inning belts that gave the Cards a split in four games at Cincinnati last week. Then it was Ken Boyer's bat that beat the Cardinals in two of three at Milwaukee over the weekend. And now it's Curt Flood doing the job against Pittsburgh.

The 20-year-old center fielder, with four hits in Monday's success, killed the Pirates again last night, breaking up Ronnie Kline's shut-out bid with a two-run homer in the ninth for a 2-1 victory that extended St. Louis' winning string to four.

Giants Skid
The Cards are .002 percentage points ahead of the San Francisco Giants, who skidded to third with a 2-1 defeat at Milwaukee.

In the other NL games, rookie

John Briggs won his first in the majors with an eight-hit shutout as the Chicago Cubs defeated Philadelphia 3-0. The last-place Los Angeles Dodgers swept a tough two-night pair at Cincinnati, winning 13-10 in 10 innings and 7-2 in 11. In the American League, the New York Yankees belted the Chicago White Sox 6-2, Kansas City and Washington were held to an eight-inning, 2-2 tie by rain, Detroit whipped Baltimore 5-0 on Paul Foytack's five-hitter, and Boston defeated Cleveland 4-3.

Flood slugged his fourth homer after a walk to junk Kline's five-hit shutout. Phil Paine won his fourth in relief.

Warren Spahn, who had lost three in a row, pitched a three-hitter against the Giants, getting the run he needed on a pair of homers, Ed Mathews' 15th and Joe Adcock's ninth. Stu Miller (1-4) lost it.

Six Whiffed
Briggs, 24, a right-hander with a flock of bone chips in his elbow, struck out six and walked four, blanking the Phils on two hits over the last five innings. Al Dark's single, a sacrifice and an error gave the Cubs the big run in the sixth off Jack Sanford, now 5-6. Rookie Sammy Taylor hit his fourth homer, with one on, in the seventh.

The Dodgers blew leads in both games. They nailed the opener with three in the 10th on homers by Gil Hodges and Joe Pignatano off old pal Don Newcombe, the loser in relief for a 1-7 record.

Duke Snider and Hodges homered for an early lead in the nightcap and then drove in three runs between them in a five-run 11th as Bob Purkey (8-4) lost his third straight. Sandy Koufax (5-3) won the opener in relief and saved the second game for rookie Dick Williams (3-1).

Walt Dropo, purchased from the Chicago White Sox earlier in the day, got the Reds started in the nightcap with his first National League homer, off rookie Bob Giallombardo in the sixth inning.

Snider was 6-for-9 and drove in six runs in the double-header, while Hodges drove in five runs. **Gets In Step**

Right-hander Paul Foytack finally is in step with the Tigers' new winning spirit.

The Tigers have won 11 of 14 under new Manager Bill Porter in a, climbing from last place to within sight of second in the American League. Foytack was charged with two of those three defeats.

ASTORIA — Title favorites Wednesday met stiff competition—each other—in second-day matches of the Oregon Amateur Golf Tournament.

Two top stars who earlier tied the course record with 65a met in one match. They are Dick Estey and Bob Atkinson Jr., both of Portland.

Estey fired a seven-under-par 65 Tuesday and Atkinson carded his splendid score in a practice round Sunday on the Astoria Golf Club course.

In the women's division, defending champion Grace DeMoss of Corvallis met June Robinson of Tillamook, who last week easily won the state girl's championship. Estey's fine performance overshadowed all other efforts in the opening round of match play Tuesday.

The husky 27-year-old Navy veteran scored seven birdies over the demanding course. He played par golf on the other holes.

On the 17th hole Estey barely missed a 10-foot shot that would have given him another birdie and the course record.

His game was exceptional, though, for he played in a steady rain and stiff wind.

Estey easily won his opening

match with a 6 and 5 triumph over Millard Rosenblatt of Portland and then went on to finish the round.

His Wednesday opponent, Atkinson, had little trouble Tuesday in tripping Elmer Hanagan of Portland, 4 and 3.

The tourney's medalist, Ed Palmrose of Astoria, Tuesday defeated Bill Wilcox of Astoria 6 and 5 and Wednesday played Don Krieger of Portland, the 1959 champ.

Krieger was a default winner Tuesday.

The defending champion, Ad Huycke of Oswego, also romped to a first-round win—a 4 and 3 triumph over Portland's Phil Underwood.

Two fine golfers were defeated in the opening round of play. Dusty Woods of McMinnville was nipped 3 and 1 by Dick Stearns of Portland and Salem's Bob Prall went down 2 and 1 to J. J. Hagan of Portland.

The Phoenix Giants surged into the Pacific Coast League lead Tuesday night as rain washed away the chaff half of the loop schedule.

The Giants mowed down Spokane 12-9 while the third-place San Diego Padres tacked a 3-2 defeat on the Vancouver Mounties, who staggered from first down to second, a game behind the Giants.

Rain washed out Sacramento at Seattle and Salt Lake City at Portland.

San Diego, now only one-half game behind the Mounties, got the winning margin in the eighth frame with two runs on a pair of singles and Larry Raines' triple. The Mounties got their first run in the ninth on Spider Jorgensen's homer.

Spokane's Bob Jenkins got a homer, a triple and a double in five trips, driving in seven of the losers' nine runs. The Giants splurged for seven runs in the first inning, frittered the lead away and then came back to win with two runs in the seventh and singletons in the sixth and eighth, all on homers.

Bill Werle notched his seventh victory against only four defeats in shaking Vancouver on five hits while his San Diego teammates were getting seven safeties off the Mounties' George Bamberger.

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Title Bout To Be Held Despite Promoter Loss

LOS ANGELES — Floyd Patterson's manager says the heavyweight champion will defend his title against Roy Harris here Aug. 18 despite the denial of a promoter's license to Al Weill. But a Los Angeles matchmaker has other ideas.

George Parnassus of the Olympic Auditorium Club promptly challenged the Aug. 18 date. The Olympic has signed Zora Folley and Pete Rademacher to fight July 25 and Carmen Basilio and Art Aragon for Aug. 28. Any date in between, Parnassus argued, would hurt either fight.

The California Athletic Commission denied a license Tuesday to veteran fight figure Weill to promote the Patterson-Harris bout. A spokesman said the commission wasn't satisfied with Weill's explanation of his acquaintanceship with Frankie Carbo of New York, long a shadowy figure in U. S. boxing.

Called Bad Deal
Weill, who managed Rocky Marciano to the heavyweight championship, called it "the worst deal I've had in 45 years in the sport."

Patterson's manager, Gus

D'Amato, in Houston, Tex., to watch Harris in a three-round exhibition, said:

"Every effort has been made to prevent this match. We are going to hold it in the very place they didn't want it." Without identifying the "they," he added:

"I feel it's the promoter's privilege to pick the site. We have the promoter, with the money, and he wants it in Los Angeles."

D'Amato said there is a distinct possibility the promoter might be Jack Hurley of Seattle. He didn't say whether Hurley has a California license.

"I consider him a tremendous promoter," D'Amato said. "He's honest, has a good background, and couldn't help but turn out a good show. I thought the Patterson-Rademacher bout he put on in Seattle was one of the finest promotions in the history of boxing."

Doesn't Know Charges
D'Amato said he doesn't know the specific charges against Weill. "But I do know they will have absolutely no grounds for charges of any kind against the man who will now promote the fight for us in Los Angeles."

He said Weill had voluntarily stepped aside as the promoter. Matchmaker Parnassus was unhappy at mention of Hurley.

"Why do we have to have someone from Seattle to promote a fight when we have licensed promoters in this state?" he asked. Weill said the commission's 4-0 vote against him:

"I'm not through with this thing. I intend to defend my good name. Never before have I been denied a license of any kind in any state."

Gonzaga Snares German Hoopman

SPOKANE (AP)—The Gonzaga University Bulldogs, who picked up a 7-foot-3 basketball player in France last year, now have landed a 6-2 sharpshooter in Germany.

Coach Hank Anderson said Tuesday the latest catch is Frank Burgess, 23, a native of Arkansas who was spotted by a former Gonzaga student in an Air Force tournament in Germany.

Burgess averaged 34.2 points a game last year for an Air Force team at Hahn, Germany. He connected Gonzaga and has enrolled there in summer school as a sophomore after his service discharge, Anderson said.

He said Burgess has an excellent reputation as a floor leader as well as a scorer and may develop into a feeder for big Jean Claude Lefebvre, the towering sophomore from Paris.

WSA, Arizona Announce Plans For Grid Games

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—Washington State College and the University of Arizona announced a home-and-home football series Tuesday with the first game at Spokane on Oct. 5, 1963 and the second at Tucson Oct. 3, 1964. It will be the first time the two schools have competed in sports.
