

Senator Argues Statehood Plan One Of Idealism

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Herman E. Talmadge (D-Ga.) contended Thursday that arguments for Alaska statehood "have their basis in idealism rather than realism... stem from emotion rather than logic."

The former Georgia governor, picking up the Southern opposition, spoke as the Senate speeded up its schedule in the third day of debate on the statehood bill.

On the other side of the issue, Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) urged passage of the bill as a demonstration "that the United States is able gradually yet effectively to liquidate its colonial relationships."
