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Compromise Water Measure Passed; NW Jobs Included

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress

sent President Eisenhower Wednesday a compromise version of a twice-vetted 1½ billion dollar water projects authorization bill.

There was every expectation that the President would sign the new bill. It was worked out in conferences between congressmen and administration representatives.

The bill authorizes future construction of about 150 navigation, flood control, beach erosion and power projects at a total federal cost of \$1,556,230,500. Congress has yet to appropriate money to pay for the work.

Congressional action was completed when both the Senate and the House accepted a final version worked out by a Senate-House conference committee named to iron out some slight differences in the bills which the two branches had passed earlier.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pacific Northwest projects costing nearly 137 million dollars were contained in the water projects authorization bill passed by Congress Wednesday.

The largest item was 112 million dollars worth of flood control work in the Columbia River Basin. The only other Northwest flood control project was \$1,300,000 for the Bruce's Eddy Dam in Idaho.

Navigation projects included: Oregon, Yaquina bay and Harbor, \$19,800,000; and Siuslaw River, \$1,683,100; Washington, Port Townsend harbor, \$387,000; and Bellingham harbor, \$83,700.

The authorization bill contains no money. Appropriations must be voted separately later.
