Salt Lake City edged Portland 6-5 in Wednesday night's Pacific Coast League baseball game as Jim McDaniel singled home the winning run.

The Bees were scoreless until the seventh inning but then they exploded for five runs. McDaniel's three-run homer helped the surge.

Meanwhile the Phoenix Giants stepped out to a game and a half lead in league pennant race. The Giants smothered Spokane with home runs while San Diego belted the Vancouver Mounties for the second straight time.

The powerful Giants smashed out four homers, including Dusty Rhodes' grand slammer, in hanging a 16-12 defeat on the Indians. San Diego's Padres, whipping the Mounties 3-2 on Bud Podbielan's seven-hitter, moved into second place behind Phoenix. The Mounties slipped to third, two full games off the pace.

The Salt Lake City Bees used a five-run seventh inning to stop Portland 6-5 and Seattle's Max

Surkont gave the Rainiers a 2-1 victory with a four-hit job on Sacramento's last-place Solons. Rhodes' blast came in the ninth frame. Don Taussig doubled to start the frame and Spokane reliever Bill George, a southpaw, walked the next two men intentionally to get at Rhodes, a left-handed batter.

Strategy Backfires
The strategy backfired when Rhodes sent one of George's offerings over the right-centerfield wall. Bob Jenkins got two homers for Spokane in addition to a double and a single in five trips. He drove in five runs.

The Padres, in winning their 20th game in their last 24 starts, got one run in the first frame and then struck for two in the sixth on Rudy Regalado's double and three singles.

Vada Pinson, Seattle's fleet centerfielder, scored both of the Rainiers' runs, the first in the fourth and the second in the sixth. The Solons coupled two of their hits, a fielder's choice and a bunted double play attempt for their lone run in the seventh frame.

Edstrom, Anderson Close Behind Rafer In Decathlon Meet

KINGSBURG, Calif. (AP) — UCLA's Rafer Johnson may be gunning Thursday night for the new world record set by Russia's Vasily Lutsnetsov for the decathlon.

Leading the Kingsburg Invitational Decathlon at the half way point with 4,319 points, Johnson, if all goes well, has a chance to better the 8,013 point record set by the Soviet athlete. Lutsnetsov recently beat Johnson's old world's record of 7,895 points set in 1955.

Crowding Johnson, who favors an injured left knee in this meet, are two U.S. Olympic hopefuls from Oregon, Dave Edstrom and Steve Anderson. Both University of Oregon athletes were impressive here Wednesday night in the first half of the two-night meet.

Edstrom had a total of 4,194 points and Anderson, 4,092.

Seattle Girl Beaten By Aussie In Wimbledon Match

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Janet Hopps, of Seattle, Wash., seventh seeded woman player who has been suffering from a back injury, was beaten in a second round match of the Wimbledon tennis championships Thursday by Norma Marsh of Australia, 7-5, 9-7.

Miss Hopps suffered a slipped disc in a fall in the Queen's Club Tournament a week ago and has been receiving daily treatment.

Janet was in pain throughout the match and friends on the sidelines urged her to default. She was trailing one set at the time. "I can't stop when I'm behind," she said and carried on. Despite the injury she made Miss Marsh, a minor player, go all out. Normally Janet figured to win easily. Later Miss Hopps said she had scratched from the doubles competition.

In matches earlier, veteran Gardnar Mulloy and Karol Gageros, a couple of Floridians, caught up with the leaders by winning second round matches.

Mulloy, 44, of Coral Gables, eliminated John Hurry of South Africa, 6-2, 6-4, 6-3.

Miss Fageros, of Miami, defeated Italy's Silvana Lazzarini, 6-1, 7-5.

In another second round match, Australia's talented Neale Fraser, routed Foo Mei of Communist China, 6-1, 6-1, 6-1.

These second rounders had to be held Thursday because of rain which washed out about one-third of the scheduled matches Wednesday.
