Rep. Burdick Says Wife Can Return If She Wishes

WASHINGTON (AP)—Seventy-nine-year-old Rep. Usher L. Burdick (R-ND) says his estranged 30-year-old wife "can come back any time she wants to."

Burdick said this Wednesday night after asking a North Dakota court to dismiss his suit seeking annulment of his marriage four months ago to Mrs. Jean Rodgers Burdick.

There was no immediate comment from Mrs. Burdick. Speaking from a sickbed, the veteran congressman said he had not asked his wife to return to his home, but that "I think she'd come back if everybody would leave us alone."

Burdick, who bruised his back in falling down stairs last Sunday, said "I figured I was in for a big siege of trouble before I got back on my feet." Thus, he added, he didn't want the annulment action "hanging over me."

"She ran out on me figuring I didn't want her," he said, "but she was mistaken about that." The North Dakota Republican was married Feb. 28 to the former Jean Rodgers who had worked part time in his congressional office. She has a four-year-old son by a previous marriage. Five weeks ago, Burdick moved to annul the marriage, saying Mrs. Burdick had no intention of consummating it. In his petition, Burdick also contended his wife's Reno divorce from her previous husband was inadequate and that his marriage to her in an Arlington, Va., attorney's office was void under Virginia law.

In a counter-action Mrs. Burdick sued for temporary and permanent maintenance. She said she was ejected from Burdick's home.
