Well, look who ain't dead: Those Los Angeles Dodgers are breathing again, winning five of their last six in a drive to quit the cellar and extending their whammy over Milwaukee's National League champs to eight straight.

Right-hander Don Drysdale, the hoped-for ace who lost seven of his first eight decisions, has won two in a row for the first time this season.

He finally bagged his second complete game as the Dodgers beat the Braves 4-1 last night.

The second-place St. Louis Cardinals kept rolling, beating Pittsburgh 6-2 for a four-game sweep against the Pirates and a six-game winning streak. That kept them .003 percentage points ahead of the San Francisco Giants, who won two in a row for the first time in a month with a 5-1 victory at Cincinnati.

Yanks Win

In the American League, the New York Yankees defeated the Chicago White Sox 4-3. Second-place Kansas City at Washington 8-6 in 12 innings. Baltimore dropped Detroit 2-0 on Jack Harshman's five-hit pitching, and Boston handed Cleveland a 2-1 defeat.

The Dodgers got to Lew Burdette for a run in each of the first three innings. Charlie Neal's 11th homer bagged it in the second. Drysdale homered in the seventh.

The Giants scored a run in the first with the help of an error, then cracked a 1-1 tie with four in the eighth, capped by Orlando Cepeda's two-on 15th homer. Johnny Antonelli won his eighth. Harvey Haddix lost his fourth.

The Cards, who have come from behind in five games during the streak, did it again. An error by Bob Skinner opened the way for three runs in the seventh as Ken Boyer tripled and Gene Green, Curt Flood and Hobbie Landrith followed with singles off loser Vern Law (7-5). Lindy McDaniel won his fourth.

Bill Mazeroski booted two in a two-run Cardinal ninth, giving the Pirates a total of 11 errors in the four-game set.

A's Face NY

Here's a switch. Kansas City confronts the New York Yankees with a hot streak tonight, instead of the other way around. The A's have won six straight for the first time since 1953, thanks to the unexpected slugging of Hector Lopez.

After hitting only four home runs in 65 games, Lopez walloped three last night, driving in five runs and beating Washington 8-6

with a two-run shot in the 12th inning.

The Yankees, who open a three-game set at Kansas City tonight with a 7 1/2-game lead over the second-place A's, defeated the Chicago White Sox 4-3 yesterday.

Southpaw Jack Harshman blanked Detroit on five hits for a 2-0 Baltimore victory. And Boston defeated Cleveland 2-1 shortly before the Indians fired Manager Bobby Bragan and hired Joe Gordon.

The A's riding their longest string since winning seven in a row in '53 back in Philadelphia, also collected two big runs on a triple by Bob Cerv. Roy Sievers drove in four Senators runs with his 14th and 15th homers.

KC Ties Game

Cerv's triple helped the A's tie it 6-6 with four runs in the eighth, capped by Lopez's second homer. Then Hector put it away after a single by Preston Ward in the 12th against losing reliever Vito Valentini (1-1). Murry Dickson won his sixth in relief.

The Yankees, held to one hit for five innings, handed Dick Donovan a two-run single by first baseman Bill Skowron. Norm Siebern's fourth homer clinched it in the seventh for Johnny Kucks.

Boston's Ted Williams broke up a 1-1 tie with his ninth home run in the ninth as relief ace like DeLoach, making his first start since last August, outduelled Cal McLish (3-5) with a five-hitter.

Harshman, now 6-6, gave up three doubles but seldom was in trouble while gaining his second shutout, both over Detroit and Billy Hoelt. A walk, Dick Williams' single and a sacrifice fly from Gus Triandos gave Harshman the run he needed in the first inning. Bob Boyd homered for the other run.

Top Grid Prospect Ignites Stadium Overhaul At WSC

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—Washington State University, which expects more enthusiasm from its football fans this fall than almost ever before, is going to beef up the stadium.

Plans for a \$45,000 improvement project on Rogers Field were announced Thursday, including \$25,000 for heavy lumber work to strengthen the "undercarriage" of the south side of the stadium.

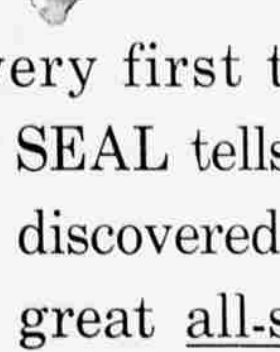
When this is down, the 23,500-seat stadium will get a complete paint job at a cost of almost \$20,000. WSC said the summer repair work is some of the most extensive done in more than 20 years.

The second half of the stadium was completed in 1936.

The job is due for completion before the season starts for the Cougars, who have a veteran team returning and are rated strong contenders for the Pacific Coast Conference title.

The Salem Senators, dead last and fighting to stay in the Northwest baseball league, staged a ninth inning three-run rally before 2,014 of the hometown fans and edged Wenatchee, 4-3, Thursday night.

The Senators said they would drop from the league unless they draw 10,000 during this week's series.

Eugene swept a doubleheader from Yakima, 2-1 and 4-3. Lewiston, which won the league's first half play Wednesday night, continued to batter Tri-City pitching, this time for a 12-1 win.

A bases-loaded walk brought in the winning run at Salem. The walk capped a three-run, come-from-behind rally in the ninth. Roy Parker's line drive single scored two runs earlier in the inning. Seven Salem errors helped Wenatchee scoring.

Tri-City left pitcher Dick Newberg absorbed all the punishment at Lewiston. His worst inning was the first when he walked four men and five runs scored. Newberg drove in Tri-City's only run in the seventh.

Eugene won both games of its doubleheader with Yakima by Carl Hutzler scoring ninth inning runs. Yakima pitcher Dick Donnelly was knocked unconscious at the end of the second game as he tried to cover home to put out Hutzler. They collided. Hutzler was racing for home with the winning run on a wild pitch. A club spokesman said Donnelly may have suffered several broken ribs.

A timely home run in the second extra inning by Hutzler won the first game. One hit pitching by Ken Bailey also helped.

Bragan Fired; Gordon Hired

CLEVELAND (AP)—Joe Gordon, former star second baseman for the New York Yankees and Cleveland Indians, flew here today to take over as manager of the Indians for tonight's game with Baltimore.

General Manager Frank Lane announced last night he had fired Bobby Bragan and hired Gordon for the rest of this season and for 1959.

"We are making this change with the hope that there will be a general improvement in the club," he explained.

Gordon, 43, an insurance salesman in Sacramento, Calif., since he left baseball after piloting San Francisco to a Pacific Coast league pennant last year, said he was "excited and thrilled" to take the job.

Lane said the decision to fire Bragan was made in the last few days and resulted from a "succession of little things."

He refused to pinpoint any one thing that led to the change, but he had been openly critical of Bragan's platooning, his constant efforts to find a place for rookie outfielder Gary Geiger in the lineup and his handling of some pitchers.

Bragan was hired as manager by Hank Greenberg, Lane's predecessor, at the end of last season to succeed Kerby Farrell. He was informed of his dismissal shortly after the Indians lost 2-1 to the Boston Red Sox.

Bragan admitted the bad news hit him as a surprise, but he voiced no bitterness. In fact, he had only words of praise for Lane as a general manager.

Gordon played for the Yankees and Indians from 1938-50 and was a member of the Tribe's world championship team in 1948.

The 40-year-old Bragan began his managerial career with Fort Worth in the Texas League in 1948 after playing with Philadelphia and Brooklyn in the National League. He piloted the Pittsburgh Pirates to a seventh-place finish in the National League in 1956, but was fired as manager of the Pirates in midseason last year.

Hydro Gunned To New Diamond Cup Record

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP)—Bill Stead gunned his unlimited hydroplane Maverick to a new Diamond Cup course speed record Thursday, skimming over the three miles in 11:23.3 miles an hour.

Maverick's speed was tops for the week's test runs in preparation for Sunday's Diamond Cup race on Lake Coeur d'Alene and only six miles an hour short of the world speed mark of 119 m.p.h.

Miss Thriftway and Thriftway Two, Seattle's two favorites, were scheduled to arrive here Friday night and drive the course Saturday. Adios, the Tri-City entry which must qualify itself and driver George Gilliam, also will arrive Friday night.
