Patterson To Defend Title

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The heavyweight title bout between champion Floyd Patterson and Roy Harris appears definitely set for Aug. 18 at Wrigley Field.

The State Athletic Commission approved the date Thursday.

The decision seemed to settle the confusion that has hovered over the proposed bout for several weeks. Besides the argument over dates, the question of who was going to promote the fight was in doubt until Wednesday.

The boxing board had denied a promoter's license for Al Weill, who wanted to put on the bout with the Hollywood Legion. William Rosenholz, television executive, replaced Weill as co-promoter.

The commission recommended that the Art Aragon-Carmen Basilio match set for Aug. 28 at Wrigley Field be reset for some time in September.

In Houston, Tex., Harris' manager, Lou Viscusi, said the Cut and Shoot, Tex., schoolteacher will move his training camp to California about four weeks before the fight.

Roseburg Sale Of Pro Grid Tickets Scheduled

A special box office will open in Roseburg next week for the sale of tickets for the professional football game between the San Francisco 49ers and Washington Redskins, to be played at Multnomah Stadium, Portland, Saturday night, August 23.

Herman's Men's Store will be the local agency handling the sale of tickets for Oregon Sports Attractions, promoters of the pro grid classic. A block of reserved seats, priced at \$4 each, has been made available to local football fans.

The game will mark the first appearance here of the Redskins, who bring two Oregon-reared players, Dick James of Oregon and Sam Baker of Oregon State, back to the stadium.

The 49ers, who tied for the Western division championship of the National Football League last year, will make their second showing in Portland.

Tickets will remain on sale in Roseburg until one week before the game.

The first president to attend an opening day major league game was Howard Taft. He saw Washington beat Philadelphia in 1910 by 3-0. Walter Johnson pitched a one-hitter that day.

Fan Poll Snubs Slumping Ted

NEW YORK (AP) — Ted Williams failed to make the starting lineup for the July 8 All-Star Game today in the team selected for the first time by the major league players, coaches and managers.

The 39-year-old Boston Red Sox slugger who has played 13 previous All-Star Games undoubtedly will be named to the squad for the Baltimore contest when the managers announce the remainder of their 25-man team Sunday.

"Well, I didn't expect to make it. I haven't been going too well," Williams said in Detroit, where the Red Sox play tonight.

Pittsburgh placed three starters on the National League side where only Stan Musial of St. Louis, Willie Mays of San Francisco and Hank Aaron of Milwaukee are repeaters from the 1957 lineup.

Only Mickey Mantle of the New York Yankees and Nelson Fox of the Chicago White Sox were named from the 1957 starters in the American, which will be missing such familiar names as Yogi Berra of New York, Harvey Kuenn and Al Kaline of Detroit and Williams.

The result of the voting was announced by Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick at a press conference after Frank Slocum of the commissioner's office had toured the majors, distributing and collecting the ballots. He reported 255 votes in the American and 231 in the National.

Musial, who will be playing his 15th All-Star Game, received 201 of the 231 votes.

Top man in the American League was Boston's Frank Malzone at third base, with 186 votes. Williams, batting only .299, gave way to Bob Cerv, the thumping left fielder of the Kansas City Athletics, who has been leading the league in runs batted in and home runs most of the time.

The closest fight was for second base in the American, where Fox nosed out Gil McDougald of the Yankees 108-104.

The old order really was upset.

Gordien, now a Brightwood, Ore., lumberman, had been invited to compete in the July 4 Oregon AAU track and field meet here.

Gordien holds the meet record in both the discus and the shot. The shot record is almost certain to fall when Perry O'Brien of California, the world record holder, goes into action at the meet.

Game Men Say Fishing's Fine

The Oregon State Game Commission said in its weekly fishing report Thursday that angling is good in most areas of the state. Here is the report by district.

Northwest
North coast streams are producing fair catches. Best bets for the weekend will be the recently stocked Necanicum, Lewis and Clark and Big Creek. Salmon anglers in streams have slowed. Marked cutthroat have been released in Neskonwink Creek. Little Nestucca, Big Nestucca, Tillamook, Trask, Kilehis and Miami Rivers. Sand Lake, Spruce Lake and Lake Lytle also have been stocked this week. Sutton, Mercer and Munsel lakes have been good for trout on May flies. Clearwater lake has been fair for trout. Most streams in the North Willamette Valley are in good condition and should produce some fine catches this weekend. The Sandy tributaries are producing good catches of planted trout. The Clackamas is good to fair. Timothy Lake is improving. Clear and Gold lakes are fair. The Willamette and McKenzie Rivers are fair for small trout. Lookout Point and Dexter reservoirs are fair. Dorena Reservoir is good for bass at the east end.

Southwest
Trout angling on the North Umpqua and South Umpqua is fair to good. On Lemolo and Tokette Reservoirs, it is only fair. Smith River is fair. Coastal streams are slow. Best chance for trout is on Floras and Garrison lakes early mornings and late evenings. The main Rogue is slow for both salmon and trout. Trout fishing is improving in the Union Creek area. The Applegate below Ruch is muddy. Willow Creek Reservoir and Fish Lake are slow.

Central
Lost Lake is fair to good. So is the east fork of Hood River. Ollalie Lake and Kingsley Reservoir are fair to good. Blue Lake is reported very good. East and Pauline lakes are good and still fishing with eggs and worms is producing best results. Sparks Lake is fair. Lake Simulstus is fair to good, drift fishing with worms and eggs in the upper end. Ochoco and Haystack reservoirs are fair to good. The Upper Deschutes River above Bend is good on trout for both brown and rainbow. Fishing is good at Big Lake. Crane Prairie Reservoir is spotty. Crescent Lake has been fair in the evening. Odell Lake is fair to good. Diamond Lake is excellent on fly, flatfish and spinner and worms. Fourmile Lake has been excellent for kokanee. Lake of the Woods is excellent on spinner and worms. Williamson River is slow.

Northeast
Strawberry Lake is producing fair catches. Olive Lake is good for kokanee and rainbow on slow drift. The Snake River is producing best on trout. Angling has been fair in the Umatilla River and is improved in the north fork of the John Day. Cold Springs Reservoir is slow. The Vogel Pond is good for rainbow. Catherine Creek and the Grande Ronde rivers should be good for liberated rainbow. Wallowa Lake is good. Most streams in Wallowa County are high and murky and angling has slowed. A few salmon are being taken in the Innahwa River. Better angling was had for liberated rainbow in Baker County in Pine Creek and Eagle Creek.

Southeast
The Malheur Reservoir has been slow. The Owyhee River has been stocked and angling is good. The Snake River is poor. Bendah Reservoir is good for rainbow of all sizes. The North Fork of the Malheur River has been stocked and should produce well. Warm Springs Reservoir is slow. The Blitzen River, Emigrant Creek, Silvies River and Silver Creek have been stocked and have been producing good catches. Fair lake is fair. Delintment Lake is poor. The middle fork of the Malheur and Big Creek in Logan Valley are fair. The Chewaucan River, Dairy and Deep creeks and the Ana Reservoir are fair to good. Ana River has been excellent.

Top NW Golfers Practice For Tourney

WALLA WALLA (AP) — An impressive field of top Northwest professionals and amateurs stepped up practice rounds Thursday as they prepared for Friday's opening round of the 72-hole Washington State Open Golf Tournament.

Tournament trail veterans Joe Greer of Yakima, Chuck Congdon of Tacoma and Jim Russell of Walla Walla, the host pro, head a strong pro contingent seeking the crown won last year by Seattle amateur Don Taylor.

Also among top professionals entered in the three-day, medal play tourney are George Schneider, formerly of Salt Lake City and ex-tourney manager of the Professional Golfers Assn., and Ted Longworth and Larry Lamberger, both of Portland. Schneider now lives at Bellings, Mont.

Longworth won the Washington open 23 years ago. Taylor, of Seattle's Rainier Country Club, won the title last year at the Inglewood Country Club course outside Seattle.

East Washington entries include Babe Henderson, formerly of Spokane and now pro at the Walla Walla municipal course; Sid Harman of Yakima; Bill Welch of Tri-Cities; Chuck Chromister of Clarkston, and Jim Mallory, 1957 runner-up in the Pacific Northwest Open. Eighteen holes will be played Friday and Saturday, with the 60 top scorers qualifying for Sunday's final 36 holes.

Oregon Game Dept. Director To Head West Association

SUN VALLEY, Idaho (AP) — P.W. Schneider, director of the Oregon Game Department, has been elected president of the Western Assn. of State Game and Fish Commissioners.

Schneider succeeded Idaho's department director, Ross Leonard. Discussion of public land use featured the concluding sessions of the association's convention Wednesday.

Harold Crane, Utah's department director who was elected vice president of the association, said during the land discussion that it was not now possible to repair what he called the damage done to the public interest in misuse of public land. But he urged better use in the future.

Don't Condone Pollution
An assistant chief forester of the U.S. Forest Service, Edward P. Cliff, said his agency will not condone improper livestock grazing such as might cause pollution of streams.

Crane said stock and wildlife can both graze on the public lands provided they are kept in reasonable balance with forage.

Jack Brenner, a past president of the Montana Cattlemen's Assn., said during the panel discussion that ranchers have been hampered in their efforts to cooperate with the Bureau of Land Management because, he said, the ranchers are looked upon with suspicion.

Brenner also said elk herds have become so large in some areas that they are hurting range land. He added that elk and deer herds are dangerous reservoirs of disease.

BLM Director Edward Woolley spoke of the need to reconcile the many demands from different groups to "achieve the best balanced use of public lands."
