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ROSEBURG'S CHALLENGE

Roseburg has a challenge to meet.

An idea born here is about to die or be spirited away for lack of funds and effort. It is the On-To-Oregon Cavalcade, which gives promise of being one of the greatest advertisements for Oregon since the days the old Oregon Trail was being pounded constantly under hooves and wheels.

Briefly, the idea involves getting cities of the state to sponsor covered wagons which will be formed into a train to make a 2,000-mile trek from Independence, Mo., to Independence, Ore.

The train would leave Independence, Mo., next April. Such a wagon train, recapturing the spirit of the old Oregon Trail, has implications of tremendous publicity value. It isn't even possible that a wagon of 10 to 15 covered wagons drawn by teams of horses and hallyhooped in every town across the plains will go unnoticed by national magazines. It is a natural.

The train's progress will be followed every wheelturn of the way by magazines, newspaper press, radio and television. Nothing could do more to broadcast the glories of Oregon at less cost so effectively.

Idea Sidetracked

Now, here's the rub. So far, the idea has been outlined but has been sidetracked by lack of initial money to get it under way.

A group of six men, calling themselves On-To-Oregon Cavalcade, Inc., has taken on the project with the close identification of the Roseburg Junior Chamber of Commerce. The incorporation is made up of Jaycees from Roseburg. Heading the incorporation is the idea's originator, Alan Knudsen.

The hatching of the idea and the formation of the corporation and identification with the Jaycees has been thoroughly broadcast throughout the state.

The project at one time appeared ready to roll. Any city wanting to take part needed only to raise \$1,650 to pay for construction and equipment of a wagon representing it. It was the plan to have the money raised by Jaycee chapters all over the state.

The snag, however, came when the chapters said they felt a buffer was needed in addition to the \$1,650. It has been generally agreed that the answer to this was a national sponsor.

This snag has now reached towering proportions which promise to make Roseburg a laughing stock of sorts. It has been decided to request industrial firms of the Roseburg area for contributions totaling between \$2,000, and \$3,000 to get the cavalcade off its feet. This will cover \$1,000 for employment of a public relations man to sweep the coast in an effort to secure a national sponsor who will contribute \$30,000. It will also include \$500 for publicity, promotion and administration of the project.

Buffer Fund Needed

This should break the log jam which has deterred cities around the state from sponsoring wagons in the train. The major objection has been the lack of a margin of error fund in addition to the \$1,650 which will probably only cover costs of the wagons.

Another \$1,000 will then be used to cover expenses of the On-To-Oregon Cavalcade organization to travel around the state to recruit wagons.

Ted Hallock, state coordinator of the Oregon Centennial, said Friday that the Centennial Commission has heartily endorsed the cavalcade. He said the commission wants Roseburg to get all the credit as the originator and promoter. He said the idea is so good that it will undoubtedly be taken over by some other town or organization if it cannot be handled here.

Whether it's right or wrong to be in the position, Roseburg has been closely identified with the project. This means the city's pride is at stake.

The local corporation will put the idea up for grabs if it cannot raise enough money within a week.

Presidential Assistant Sherman Adams wrote his own best comment on his case when he acknowledged before the Harris subcommittee that he had been imprudent.

He said he would not do again what he did a few years ago, namely, place a call to a federal agency to inquire for a friend upon the status of his case before that agency.

Unfortunately, wisdom in this vital field came a little late to Adams. To be sure, he was green at federal government when he came to Washington in 1953. But he was a seasoned politician, a former governor of New Hampshire.

Admittedly there is more informality in these matters at the state and local levels of government. But even this cannot be condoned. And certainly it should be obvious to any man committed to a course of proper conduct—as Adams clearly was—that the most ardent standards must apply for all who serve a president closely.

In this instance it is particularly bad that he has embarrassed President Eisenhower, who because of three serious illnesses has been more dependent than some presidents upon a strong chief of staff. The President has openly confessed this reliance.

Adams unquestionably believes sincerely that he did not in fact try to exercise any influence in behalf of his friend Bernard Goldfine, and that no federal agency responded with special favor.

penalty. What interests me is the use of the word capitol when the word capital is obviously called for.

It couldn't have been a typographical error, for it is repeated three times. It was just a plain honor. Newspaper people should not make boners like that. Their job is to inform the public. If they are to inform the public accurately, they must use the right words—just as a surgeon must use the right instrument if his operation is to be successful and save the patient's life.

This misuse of the word capitol could be quite misleading.

For example: capitol, punishment means imposition of the death penalty for certain crimes, including murder and treason.

capitol, punishment can mean a wide range of evils. capitol is the monumental buildings located in state and national capitals. It is in these buildings that governmental policies are outlined and embodied into laws.

So—

It is obvious that capitol punishment can be among the roughest of the punishments that can be inflicted upon us.

BAD GOVERNMENT is undoubtedly the worst punishment that can be imposed upon mankind. Bad government originates in capitol. It must therefore be classed as capitol punishment.

capitol, punishment is pretty tough, of course. But it has this ameliorating advantage:

OVER QUICKLY. The trap falls on the scaffold. The current is turned into the hot seat of the electric chair. The poison gas pellets are dropped into the receptacle in the execution chamber. That's that, and it's done and over with.

capitol, punishment—meaning bad government including grinding taxation and all the evils that go along with government that isn't what it should be—LASTS A LONG, LONG TIME. Sometimes it lasts for centuries.

So—

BE CAREFUL WITH YOUR WORDS.

They are the tools of your trade.
