Divorce Actions

Lillian L. vs. David M. Almada on grounds of cruelty, affirmation of property settlement and restoration of former name, Lillian Lorene Robertson. Married Nov. 17, 1954, at Reno, Nev. No children involved.

Marjorie Pearl vs. Lloyd Shields on grounds of cruelty. Plaintiff seeks real property and \$3,500 settlement, and asks court to order defendant to assume debts. No children involved. Married at Walker, Minn., Nov. 1, 1947.

Elinor vs. Gordon Talley on grounds of cruelty. Plaintiff seeks custody of two minor children and award of real and personal property. Married Oct. 14, 1944, in San Francisco.

Clarice E. Savage vs. Benjamin F. Savage on grounds of desertion. Plaintiff asks custody of two minor children and \$70 a month support. Married at Corvallis Nov. 29, 1945.

Edith vs. Onis Gupton on grounds of cruelty. Plaintiff asks custody of a minor child and reasonable support money and certain personal property. Married at Tulsa, Okla., on Nov. 24, 1935.

Pearl Ellen vs. Glenn George Rigsby on grounds of cruelty for decree only. No children involved. Married Dec. 6, 1937 at Crescent City, Calif.

State GOP Chairman's Re-election Expected

SALEM (AP)—State Republican Chairman James F. Short is expected to be reelected when the Republican State Central Committee meets her July 19.
No other candidates are in the running.
Short has served since March 28, 1957.
He said he is not campaigning for the job, but would accept re-election.
Margaret Von Lubken, Hood River, vice chairman, has said she would not accept re-election.
Mrs. Frederick Young, Portland, secretary, and Otto Wilson, Salem, treasurer, also are expected to be reelected.

Oregon Birth Rate Lowest Of Any State

PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon's birth rate was the lowest of any state in the nation last year, the state Board of Health reported in a statistical survey Friday.
The report also said that Oregon had the second lowest marriage rate in the nation, more deaths than in any year in its history, and the lowest divorce rate in the past 20 years.
The 1957 birth rate was reported at 21.8 births per thousand population. The national rate is 25.0.
The board said that deteriorating economic conditions and the fact that Oregon's population is older than the national average contributed to the low birth rate.
The state's marriage rate was 5.7 per thousand population, com-

pared with the national rate of 8.9. Early marriages among teenagers the past few years may have resulted in lower marriage figures for 1957, the board said.
Another reason given for the low birth and marriage rates was the smaller number of eligible persons because of the low birth rates during the depression years.
Oregon's divorce rate last year was 3.0 per thousand. More than half of these divorces involved children and 20 per cent of them occurred prior to the second anniversary of the marriage.
The death rate was 9.0 per thousand. The highest rate was in the city of Portland—11.3. The lowest was in Benton County—5.4.

Slump In Lumber Prices Continuing, Sources Say

PORTLAND (AP)—The slump in lumber market prices is continuing, two industry sources reported Friday.
Crow's Lumber Price Index said the average for green and dry fir and white pine is well down from this time a year ago, although dry fir showed a minor increase.
Plywood prices have stabilized, both for sanded and unsanded grades. Crow said vacation shut-downs are making it a bit difficult to place orders. Sanded plywood sold at \$68 per thousand feet.
Prices of most fir and pine lumber stayed at the same level as one week ago.
