Teen-Ager Car Designing Efforts Now Being Judged

Thousands of teen-age eyes focused on Detroit today where four weeks of judging gets underway to determine the winners in the 1958 Fisher Body Craftsman's Guild model car competition.

At stake is \$115,000 in university scholarships and cash awards.

The entries consist of miniature sports cars, convertibles, hardtops, sedans and station wagons and each represent what its youthful designer would like to drive in the future.

Represent Several Fields

Judges are members of the General Motors styling staff, industrial arts instructors from Detroit area public schools and representatives from the Guild's technical department.

Model cars scoring highest in

scale fidelity, workmanship, painting, originality of design, artistic merit and practicability will win the coveted state, regional and national awards — of which there are 1,038 in all.

State and regional winners will be announced sometime in July after all models have been inspected and scored. The 40 regional winners will come to Detroit from all over the nation, expense-free, from Aug. 12-15 for the annual guild convention and the scholarship banquet, which will be held in Flint, Mich., where the national winners will be announced.

Top Awards Listed

Eight scholarship, two each in the amounts of \$5,000, \$4,000, \$3,000, and \$2,000 are the top awards, to be given to the best model car builders in the junior (11 through 15 years old) and senior (16 to 20 years old) age divisions.

Ten additional \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded on the basis of styling merits to boys whose cars indicate unusual styling ability.

State awards in each age division are \$150 for first, \$100 for second, \$50 for third and \$25 for each of the five honorable mentions. The first state winners in each state will compete against the winners from the other state or states in their region for the convention trips to Detroit.

MANITOWOC, Wis. (AP)—The 13 sons of the Matthew Wagners had a flock of boys names ready for the new baby in the family. But it turned out their mother had the winning combination. She picked Mary Ann.

The first girl in the all-boy family, that Wagner says, "takes what God gives us," is due home this weekend from Holy Family Hospital. Born Wednesday, she scaled a robust 19 pounds, 6 1/4 ounces. Home for the Wagners is a 38-acre dairy farm on which everyone shares the work.

Obviously the boys hadn't counted on having a sister, and Wagner admitted Saturday that he had "given up all ideas of having a girl." But his wife, Julietta, thought differently.

"I have an idea she had that name picked out five years ago—just hoping," said Wagner. "The boys, though, had been asked for suggestions. Each had favorite names and we wrote them all down—all boy's names."

Wagner said the boys reacted quite naturally to the happy news. "They didn't say much, but everyone of them grinned from ear to ear. With that many brothers to look out for her, Mary Ann ought to make out all right," he added.

Will there be more children? "Will it rain tomorrow?" asked Wagner. "Who knows? We are a Catholic family and we take what God gives us. So far we have nothing to complain about."

Even the hospital got into the spirit of the thing. Mrs. Wagner's hospitalization was "on the house."

Willamette Music Camp Is Launched At Salem

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY—Three nationally known figures in the musical world will conduct sessions at Willamette University's first annual Music Camp which began Sunday. The sessions held in the university campus featured individual and group work in all vocal and instrumental areas.

L. Bruce Jones, director of the Louisiana State University department of bands and music education; Dr. Richard E. Duncan of the Omaha Symphony Orchestra; and Dr. James McElroy, choral director of Chapman College in California will take leading roles in the music camp.

In addition to the out of state consultants, well-known Oregon musicians will participate, being led by Dr. William Sweetman, Salem public schools orchestra director. The regular Willamette faculty will also be in attendance.

The music camp is an innovation with the college of music and is open to high school and college students as well as their instructors. Its curriculum includes work in choir, band, orchestra, theory, ensemble and conducting.

Classes, concerts and recreation will occupy those enrolled for the two weeks as a 12-hour schedule is planned for every day of the session. Students are housed on the university campus in Donoy and Baxter halls, residences for women and men, respectively.

If you want to get that job, girls, don't apply for it wearing a sack dress, a straggly short haircut, bare legs and loafers. These are the current pet hates of bosses, as revealed by a recent survey of 206 office executives.

The girl who gets the job, employers agree, is the neat, well-groomed miss who wears a trim tailored suit (fitted, please), a small hat, clean gloves, sheer stockings, plain pumps with high or medium heels, a medium-length, well-brushed hairdo and a minimum of makeup.

As to boys, the best way not to get a job is to wear an Elvis Presley haircut, a loud sports coat and slacks, pork pie hat and two-tone oxfords with rubber soles.

The bosses say that the first impression made by a young job seeker is the most important. The boy on girl who takes the trouble to be well-groomed and properly dressed when applying for a job is the one who may be expected to show initiative and responsibility after he gets it.

No Sacks

Employers are almost unanimous in vetoing the sack dress as office attire, and they are firm in their stand against sloppy flat-heeled shoes and bobby sox or bare legs.

They have little use for the pony-tail hairdo, and particularly abhor that ragged crew-cut affected by many high-school girls.

The average boss also is not impressed by the girl who shows up wearing heavy eye makeup and garish lipstick. A discreet use of makeup is, of course, all right, and even desirable. The object should be to make it look natural, so that the unobserving male will think you are wearing none.

Taylor Won't Run In Idaho

BOISE (AP)—Former Sen. Glen H. Taylor all but took himself out of the running Saturday for the Democratic nomination for governor of Idaho.

"I do not plan to run at this moment," Taylor said, only a few hours before the filing deadline.

"The only thing that could make me change my mind," said Taylor, "is if I got reports that Glasby is coming up strong. And I don't expect it to happen."

John Glasby of Mountain Home, who was Democratic state chairman during Taylor's unsuccessful bid for a recount of a close senatorial primary race two years ago, is a candidate for the gubernatorial nomination. His announced opponents are State Sen. Max Hanson of Fairfield, who has filed, and State Sen. A. M. Derr of Clark Fork and Omar Maine of Parma, who had not filed early Saturday.

Taylor said he supports Hanson for the nomination, provided he does not run himself. But he said he did not think it would be necessary for him to campaign on Hanson's behalf.

Girl Blames Tattoos For All Her Troubles

SALTASH, England (AP)—Nineteen-year-old Yvonne Clements started a six-month jail sentence Wednesday—blaming tattoos for her troubles.

12-Month School Year Studied

OLYMPIA (AP)—John A. Shaw, a former Spokane educator, has been named to head a state study on the feasibility of operating schools on a 12-month basis.

Lloyd J. Andrews, state school superintendent, said the study will also cover the feasibility of increasing the number of teaching days in the present school year, the ratio of school administrators to teachers and the possibility of setting up summer school classes.

Shaw's appointment is for one year beginning Nov. 1, when the study will be initiated. He will be paid \$832 a month. Shaw was formerly superintendent of the Spokane city system.

The proposal contemplates adding a fourth quarter to be held during the present summer vacation months as an answer to the problems of obtaining more school buildings and more teachers to educate the ever increasing school population.
