Jensen Scoffs At AL Hurlers

DETROIT (AP) — Jackie Jensen is enjoying the hottest hitting streak of his career and he says all the American League pitchers "look like they don't have any stuff at all."

The Boston Red Sox slugger hit his fourth home run in three games as the Sox outslugged the Detroit Tigers yesterday 10-7, and now leads the American League in home runs with 23 and RBI's with 60.

"I've always been a streak hitter," the 31-year-old outfielder explained, "but I've never been this hot so long. When I'm going like this, all pitchers look like they don't have any stuff at all. But when I'm going the other way, every one of them looks like 20-game winners."

Over the last four seasons, Jensen has more RBI's than any other player in the league.

"I can't explain it," said Jensen, the American League's 1958 all-star game right fielder. "I know the pitchers are working harder on me now, but I'm using the same type bat, the same swing, the same everything. All I know is that it feels wonderful."

The Red Sox just completed an 11-game road trip and Jensen's 13 hits included seven home runs. He drove in 14 runs. Since June 1 he has hit 14 home runs and his total of 23 on the season matches his entire 1957 output.

Jensen, who established the league record by hitting into 32 double plays in 1955, has hit into just six this season.

"That makes me feel as good as anything," he said. "And my cold streaks have pulled the club down a few times, too. So it's nice to be hitting this well. — I just hope I can keep it up."

Detroit Manager Bill Norman, who has been around the league only three weeks, had this comment: "We pitch Jensen inside and he hits the ball over the left field fence. So we pitch him outside — and all he does is hit the thing over the right field fence. Maybe these other managers can figure out something else."

MacKay Triumphs in Wimbledon Go

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Lanky Barry MacKay of Dayton, Ohio, crushed India's Ramanathan Krishnan, 6-3, 11-9, 6-2, Monday to gain the quarter-finals of the Wimbledon tennis championships.

There had been some argument over seeding MacKay eighth over Krishnan, India's 21-year-old Davis Cup star. Some experts said the Indian should have received the last seeded position over the American.

Australia's fourth-seeded Neale Fraser moved up with MacKay by trouncing France's Pierre Darmon, 6-4, 6-3, 6-3, in another fourth round match.

Sixth seeded Kurt Nielsen ousted Sweden's Ulf Schmidt, 6-4, 15-13, 6-4, to join the others in the quarter-finals.

American veterans Gardner Mulloy and Budge Patty were both eliminated.

Patty, 1950 Wimbledon winner from Los Angeles and Paris, was beaten by Sweden's sixth-seeded Sven Davidson, 6-4, 2-6, 4-6, 9-7, 6-4, who also reached the quarter-finals.

Third-seeded Mervyn Rose of Australia trounced Mulloy, of Coral Gables, Fla., 6-2, 6-3, 6-1.

Aberdeen Pro Everham In Wash. Open Playoff

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (AP) — Aberdeen professional Tom Everham tamed a stubborn putter on the final hole Sunday to set the stage for a "sudden death" playoff Monday with Ray Honsberger of Seattle for the Washington State Open golf championship.

Both professionals wound up tied at the end of 72 holes in first place at 282. The winner of Monday's playoff will take home \$500 first money and the loser \$300 as second-place finisher.

Yakima pro Joe Greer took third place money of \$250 with 284.

Tied at 285 and dividing \$560 were Chuck Congdon, Tacoma; Bill Eggers, Portland and Bud Hofmeister, Hayden Lake, Idaho.

Bragan Selected As Spoke Boss

SPOKANE (AP) — Bobby Bragan was hired as manager of the Spokane Indians Monday to succeed Goldie Holt.

Bragan was let out only last week as manager of the Cleveland Indians and was replaced there by Joe Gordon.

The parent Los Angeles Dodgers let Holt go Sunday at Phoenix where the Indians, mired deep in the Pacific Coast League second division, split a doubleheader.

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP)

The Maverick got a jump on the field at the first turn Sunday and won the Diamond Cup race for unlimited hydroplanes at an average speed of 101.752 miles an hour.

Owned by Bill Waggoner of Phoenix, Ariz., and driven by Bill Stead, the Maverick opened up a big early lead and won easily over the only other three boats able to finish the 30-mile championship heat.

The Thriftway Too of Seattle was second, the community-owned Miss Spokane was third and Detroit's Miss U.S. 1, winner of two earlier heats, faded to fourth. The Miss Thriftway, damaged in the first heat when it hit something in the water, and the Miss Seattle couldn't complete the last run.

Waggoner picked up only \$1,000 for the victory but he got the handsome Diamond Cup and the prestige that goes with beating some of the nation's fastest speed boats with power to spare.

Stead took the fourth heat of 15 miles with an average speed of 106.698, the day's fastest.

The Miss U.S. went into the race as the season's leader in total points and appeared likely to run away with all the honors. She won the first heat handily at an average of 104.166 and took the third at 99.228 mph.

But the U.S. was never in the running in the final heat. She started losing power after two laps, fell far behind and driver Fred Altier merely kept her going to finish.

Only six of the 12 boats in the original field were still in business after four heats. The Miss Burien qualified for the seventh berth in the 30-mile run for the cup but mechanical trouble kept her out.

Earlier, the Coral Reef of Tacoma and Seattle's Miss Pay 'N Save went out with thrown rods. The locally-sponsored Miss Roundtable failed to qualify, the Miss Bardahl of Seattle broke a propeller blade and the Adios of the Tri-City, Wash., area lost a super-charger.

Holt Claims Firing Move No Surprise

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Goldie Holt, fired as manager of the Spokane Indians of the Pacific Coast League, said Sunday night the move came as no great surprise.

"That's the way it goes when a team isn't doing well," he said.

Holt, 57, said he learned of his removal Sunday morning just before Club President Dick Walsh left Phoenix for Vancouver and the PCL meeting.

Danny May, sportswriter for the Spokesman-Review, reported that Walsh said the new manager would be a man "with major league experience," and would take over direction of the club Tuesday when the Indians open a home stand against Sacramento.

The Indians weren't told of the move until after Sunday night's doubleheader with the Phoenix Giants.

Holt said, "I have no immediate plans but I'll stay in the game. Right now, I intend to go fishing and play golf," at his Sherman Oaks, Calif., home.

This was Holt's first year as a triple A manager, although he managed in the Texas League and Southern Assn., both AA circuits. He has been in baseball for 20 years.
