

Rainmakers Would Halt Rain For Cherry Season

OLYMPIA (AP)—A rainmaking operation in south western Washington was shut down Monday to protect the Yakima Valley cherry harvest, Stuart Shumway of the State Weather Modification Board announced.

He said he received a request for the shutdown from cherry producers in the area early Monday. A few hours later Pacific Power and Light Co. of Portland, sponsors of the cloudseeding, agreed to halt operations until the cherry harvest is over July 15 and possibly for the entire summer.

PP&L has employed a Denver weather modification firm in an attempt to milk enough rain out of the clouds to raise the water level in its power dams on the Lewis and White Salmon Rivers.

Shumway said a second cloudseeding project in the Connel area closed last weekend because of the early wheat harvest.

BURGLARS TAKE CASH

EUGENE (AP)—Burglars took an estimated \$1,300 in cash, auto supplies and tools from four lane and Douglas County business establishments during the weekend.

Two thefts were reported at Co-burg, one on Coburg Road near Eugene, and a fourth at Drain.

Bombs Planted In Hotels And Aboard Ferry

KELOWNA, B.C. (AP)—Terrorists planted bombs in two Okanagan Valley hotels and aboard a ferry during the weekend and one went off before it was found.

The incidents brought immediate assurance by Provincial Highway Minister Phil Gaglardi that all those responsible for the "vicious bombings" would be rounded up before Princess Margaret visits British Columbia beginning July 12.

No one was injured when a bomb exploded at the Willow Inn Hotel here, but damage of about \$1,000 was caused to a hotel room.

All three bombs were planted in men's washrooms, probably Saturday, and two appeared to have been timed to go off at approximately the same time.

The bomb that exploded went off at 2:15 a.m. Sunday. A second bomb discovered at the Allison Hotel in Vernon, 30 miles north of here, was timed to go off at 2:30 a.m.

The third bomb was found aboard the ferry Lequime on Lake Okanagan and was thrown overboard by a crew member.

Navy Closes Sprawling Spokane Naval Depot

SPOKANE (AP)—The Navy closed down the sprawling Spokane Naval Supply Depot Monday just 15½ years after it was opened as a major facility for the Pacific Fleet in World War II.

The depot, opened Jan. 1, 1943, was declared surplus last year. Most of its equipment has either been sold or shipped to other military installations. The rest will be offered for sale by the Federal Services Administration.

At one time during the war, more than 2,500 people were employed there. The depot has 29 permanent warehouses with 3,752,000 square feet of storage space.

Oregon Man President Of Seed Association

SUN VALLEY, Idaho (AP)—An Oregon man is the new president of the Idaho-Eastern Oregon Seed Assn.

He is Laurence Bishop of Ontario, elected as delegates ended their annual meeting at this resort town Saturday night.

Two other Oregon men, W. K. Wahlert of Nyssa and Ace Lloyd of Ontario, were elected to the organization's board of directors.

Sen. McClellan Says Syndicate Imperils Nation

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. John L. McClellan (D-Ark.) charged Monday that the nation's economic destiny is imperiled by "close-knit, clandestine criminal syndicate."

With that statement, McClellan launched a wide-scale investigation by his Senate Rackets Committee. The aim, he said, is to show that a powerful underworld syndicate, sometimes known as the Mafia, is fattening off helpless businesses and labor unions.

"The ramifications of this problem present the gravest implications for the destiny of our national economy," McClellan said.

"We propose to probe deep into the ramifications of this problem."

"We are going to call in some of the leading figures in the national criminal hierarchy."

He pictured the syndicate as a group which even holds conventions for presumed nefarious purposes. He pointed to the mysterious gathering of gangsters the police broke up at Apalachin, N.Y. last fall.

AP Bureau Chief Weds Former Japanese Actress

TOKYO (AP)—John Randolph, chief of the Associated Press bureau in Tokyo, and Kay Hashimoto were married in a civil ceremony.

Miss Hashimoto, 27, formerly was an actress with the Bungakuza, one of Japan's leading contemporary theatrical groups.

Randolph, 39, of Seattle, Wash., was a member of the staff of the now-defunct Seattle Star before joining the Associated Press. He worked for the AP in Oklahoma City and New York, then went to Korea in 1950 as a war correspondent. After the war he remained in Tokyo and was appointed chief of the AP bureau in 1956.

241 PERSONS KILLED

OLYMPIA (AP)—Traffic accidents in Washington have taken 241 lives so far this year, the State Patrol reported Monday.

That was 11 more than last year at this time and 36 more than the average for the period during the last five years.

Supreme Court Ends Session With Decisions

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court ended its current session Monday by declining to pass a U.S. circuit court rule directly on an order suspending for 2½ years desegregation in Little Rock schools.

Negro groups had asked the court to hold a special term and give a quick ruling. They asked the high tribunal to upset an order by U.S. District Judge Harry J. Lemley stalling integration for 30 months.

The Supreme Court said it had no doubt that the court of appeals in St. Louis will recognize the importance of the time element involved and will act in ample time for arrangements to be made for the next school year.

Among other actions Monday the court:

Threw out a contempt finding and \$100,000 fine levied against the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People by an Alabama judge.

Ruled President Eisenhower lacked authority to dismiss Myron Wiener as a member of the old War Claims Commission.

Upheld firing of a veteran Philadelphia teacher who refused to answer a questionnaire of Communist Party associations.

Barred enforcement of a California law requiring non-Communist oaths to obtain tax exemptions.

Denied New York gambler Frank Costello a review of his 1954 income tax evasion conviction.

Refused to review an arrangement under which Girard College of Philadelphia has continued as a school for white orphans only.

The court recessed until Oct. 6.

Welsh Song Festival Draws Few Children

BEAVERCREEK, Ore. (AP)—The 22nd annual Welsh song festival was held Sunday at Bryn Seion Church in this Clackamas County community.

The church was filled for the singing but few of those attending were children. They do not understand the language, whose use in homes of the district died out a generation ago.

The church was built in 1884 and still has 18 members. Services are usually conducted in English, but occasionally a minister who speaks Welsh is present.

Servants in that language were conducted Sunday by the Rev. J. R. Johns of Seattle.

First Missile Platform Bomber To Be Started

WICHITA, Kan. (AP)—The first B52G "missile platform" bomber will roll from Boeing Airplane Co.'s production lines here July 23.

A Boeing announcement said Gen. Thomas D. White, Air Force chief of staff, will head a group of high-ranking officers who will attend rollout ceremonies.

The 225-ton B52G, with an intercontinental range permitting it to cross oceans and return to base without refueling, will carry hound dog missiles produced by North American Aviation.

The guided air-to-surface missile, capable of sustained supersonic flight, can be launched several hundred miles from target. They give the huge planes a quick extension of striking power beyond the range of their normal bomb loads.

The new bomber, to be used by the Strategic Air Command, has been described as the world's most powerful, long-range aerial weapon, and America's first line of defense for years to come.

JURY OF PEERS

WARREN, Ohio (AP)—A new method of handling juvenile traffic offenses here was introduced when Judge Bruce P. Henderson accepted recommendations of a jury composed of high school students.

Representatives of 10 Trumbull County schools deliberated 20 minutes, then recommended that a high school freshman from nearby Southington be fined \$20 and costs. They further urged that his driver's license be suspended for 60 days.

The Ohio Highway Patrol said the youth failed to observe a stop sign, caused a traffic accident and left the accident scene.

Louisiana Bills Bypass Bus Segregation End

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP)—The Louisiana Senate passed and sent to the governor Sunday night two bills designed to bypass a federal court order to end segregated bus seating in New Orleans.

The bills, passed by 34-0 votes, repeal Louisiana bus and street car segregation laws named in a recent federal court order.

Rep. E.W. Gravelle Jr. of Plaquemines Parish, had argued his bills would nullify the federal order and permit operating the buses under a private seating policy.

Earlier the House passed a third bus segregation bill, a 1st week which permits the first person on a double seat to select who shall sit beside him.
