Supreme Court Throws Out Fine Against NAACP

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court threw out Monday a contempt finding and \$100,000 fine levied against the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People by an Alabama judge.

Justice Harlan delivered the unanimous decision.

At the same time the high tribunal declined to act on a request that it dissolve a restraining order barring NAACP from operating in Alabama.

Harlan said the court found the association has never received a hearing on the merits of the ouster suit and that the issue was not properly before the Supreme Court. The litigation developed from a complaint by Alabama in 1956 that NAACP had not registered under Alabama laws dealing with out of state corporations.

Harlan's opinion said: "We hold that the immunity from state scrutiny of membership lists which the association claims on behalf of its members is here so related to the right of the members to pursue their lawful private interest privately and to associate freely with others in so doing as to come within the protection of the 14th Amendment."

As to the ouster question, the Supreme Court in effect told the Alabama Supreme Court that it must grant a hearing on the issue of the right of the state to bar the association from doing business in Alabama.

Rockefeller Gives Five Million To Art Center

NEW YORK (AP)—John D. Rockefeller Jr., who has dispersed many millions of dollars for public purposes, has given five million dollars to the Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts.

The 84-year-old philanthropist's gift was announced by his son John D. Rockefeller III, president of the center, and Clarence Francis, chairman of its 75-million-dollar campaign.

Lincoln Center, on Manhattan's West Side, will include a concert hall, a new Metropolitan Opera House and other cultural facilities.
