**Underdog Champion Attorney Goodman Dies In Portland**

PORTLAND (AP) — Attorney Irvin Goodman, 61, champion of the underdog, died Monday of a heart ailment aggravated by recent surgery.

Goodman participated as defense attorney in a number of celebrated criminal cases, including the Wilson brothers murder trial and the trial of Wayne and Sherry Fong.

He helped defend Lt. Nicolai G. Redin, Russian naval officer acquitted on a charge of trying to steal American naval secrets, and successfully defended 25 miners accused of manslaughter in Alaska.

He served as counsel for several persons called to testify at a House Un-American Activities Committee hearing here several years ago.

**Statute Overthrown**  
Oregon's criminal syndicalism statute was overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court in a case handled by Goodman. The statute concerned conspiracies to overthrow the government.

In 1932 he defended five convicts accused in the killing of a prison guard in an escape attempt at the Washington State Penitentiary.

Goodman had participated in 28 murder trials.

The Wilson brothers, Utah and Turman of Canas, Wash. were his only clients to be executed. They were hanged for the murder of JoAnn Dewey, 16-year-old Vancouver, Wash., girl.

The Fongs in subsequent retrials were freed on a charge of slaying their teen-aged babysitter, Diane Hank.

Born in Portland, Goodman had lived here most of his life. He attended Reed College and Northwestern College of Law here.

The widow, Ora, and two brothers are among survivors.

### Union Witnesses Take Stand In Picketing Hearing

THE DALLES (AP) — Union witnesses took the stand Tuesday to answer charges that picketing at the Harvey aluminum reduction plant here was not peaceful.

The hearings opened Monday on a request of General Engineering Co. that picketing be banned. It is before Circuit Judge Malcolm Wilkinson and is aimed at the Oregon State Labor Council and the Teamster and Electrical Workers unions.

On May 22 the judge ordered a halt to mass picketing, coercion and intimidation but excluded peaceful picketing from his injunction. The company asks that this injunction be extended now to halt all picketing.

The company said Monday a June 18 incident at the plant entrance was a violation by the union of peaceful picketing. An employee, Marvin Brown, testified that Owen Graham, a picket, attacked him and William A. Brice, a passenger in his pickup truck.

Graham has filed a \$20,000 suit in circuit court, charging that Graham hit him with the vehicle.

Unions started picketing the plant after General Engineering Co. was formed to take the construction contract and did not employ union labor.

Unions had agreements with the previous contractor.

### Mill Accident Causes Serious Injuries To Man

GRANTS PASS (AP) — Robert McLean, 43, suffered multiple fractures of both legs and crushing of both feet in a mill accident at Bate mill at Merlin Monday afternoon. An angle iron, attached to a stack of lumber on a hoist, fell across his legs below the knees.

McLean was taken by ambulance first to Josephine General Hospital, then transferred to Sacred Heart Hospital in Medford.

A local physician described his condition as "extremely serious."

### Making Movies Only Work Lana Turner Knows

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Lana Turner might have quit the movies after Johnny Stompanato's death except that "it's the only work I know."

The 38-year-old star's comment came to light with the filing Monday of a juvenile court transcript.

It detailed a proceeding April 24 when a judge was deliberating the fate of Lana's 14-year-old daughter Cheryl Crane, acknowledged slayer of her mother's boy friend.

"A great part of me would like very much not to continue (in films)," Lana told the jurist.

"However, the fact is that it's the only work I know, and that I have been the sole support of my daughter and my mother."

"I wish I could say that I had enough to pay that I wouldn't have to work. I don't. I must continue working."

The record of the conversation was filed in an appeal court in an effort by Cheryl's father, Stephen Crane to void a decision making his daughter a ward of the juvenile court.
