State Motor Vehicle Dept To Move Oct. 1

SALEM (AP)—The state Motor Vehicle Department will move Oct. 1 into a building to be constructed on Lana Ave. near the Pacific highway in North Salem, James F. Johnson, director of the department, announced Monday.

The building will be constructed by Wallace H. Bonesteel, Salem, and the department has signed a 10-year lease.

However, either party could cancel after six years' occupancy provided three years' notice is given.

The 10-year rental for the 39,000 square feet will be \$421,000.

The department has been ordered to vacate its space in the capitol buildings by July 1. This order was made by Secretary of State Mark Hatfield, who assigns space to state departments.

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Student Captures Enough Snakes To Pay College Way

SPOKANE (AP)—Thanks to snakes alive, Wayne Johnson has made it through his freshman year at Whitworth College.

Johnson, 19, told Monday how he caught and tamed enough rattlesnakes this spring to run his car and help pay school expenses.

His part-time job fits in nicely with his biology studies at Whitworth and he said he hopes to do research someday on reptiles.

Armed with lots of nerve, a forked stick and a gunny sack, Johnson made four springtime trips to the nearby Reardan, Wilbur and Vanport Davenport areas and came back with about 300 snakes.

His mother won't let him near the house with the things and that goes for the neighbors, too. The Johnsons live in a west side residential area.

"I bring them to a friend's garage and we pack them 20 or so to a box," Johnson said. The snakes are then shipped to a supply house in Texas where venom is extracted for commercial use.

Johnson said the snakes bring 50 to 75 cents apiece, depending on the size, and that the Texas company also buys frogs, turtles and other reptiles from him.

He said he hasn't ever been bitten.

Practical Way Of Solving Problem Of Aged Told

PORTLAND (AP)—Problems caused by increasing numbers of aging people in the American population may be partly solved in two ways, delegates to the Northwestern Regional Conference on Aging were told here Monday.

One, people must recognize their own responsibility in planning for the future, and two, a preventive program must be stressed for the middle aged.

This was the advice of Miss Ollie A. Randall, New York City, vice chairman of the National Committee on the Aging in the conference keynote address.

Gov. Robert Holmes will address the group Tuesday. The four-day session is being held at Reed College.
