PLAN IN EFFECT MOSCOW (AP) — Premier Nikita Khrushchev's sweeping program abolishing compulsory crop deliveries to the state by collective farms went into effect Tuesday. A decree by the Council of Ministers was published ratifying the plan as approved two weeks ago by the Communist Party's central committee. The decree introduces a new pricing system on agricultural products with the intention of increasing incentive and productivity among farmers.

The University of Oregon has noted that total bank debits for May in Douglas, Lane and Coos Counties were up 4.1 per cent over the figure for April.

The debit total for May was \$137,270,631, said the university's news bureau. While this is an increase over April UO spokesmen noted, it represents a drop of 6.5 per cent from May, 1957.

Statewide totals for May were up 3.8 per cent over April and down 2.4 per cent from May a year ago. The May figure was \$1,641,780,596, compared to \$1,580,783,625 in April and \$1,682,990,876 in May of 1957.

Bank debits are considered good indicators of business activity because they represent the dollar value of checks drawn against the deposit accounts of individuals and firms, said the university.

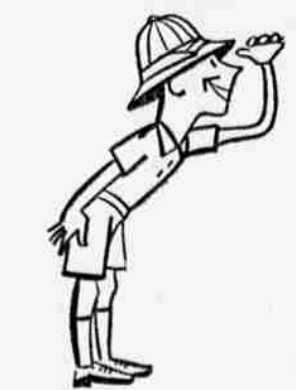
