The newcomers on the team announced Tuesday by the U.S. Golf Assn. include Jo Anne Gunerson of Kirkland, Wash., national amateur champion and Anne Quist of Marysville, Wash.

Steadying the youngsters will be Polly Riley and Barbara Romack, a pair of veterans in the competition. Miss Riley, from Fort Worth, Tex., will be playing on her sixth cup team. Miss Romack, from Sacramento, Calif., will make her third Curtis appearance.

The matches, held every two years, will be played Aug. 8-9 at Brae Burn Country Club, West Newton, Mass.

Either way, nobody but the champs has been that far ahead, and the Braves made it only the second time on a shutout by Lew Burdette and a home run by Eddie Mathews that beat Cincinnati 1-0 last night. That gave Milwaukee a four-game streak since ending a nine-game losing jinx with two victories last weekend.

The Dodgers contributed to Milwaukee's lead with a 9-3 victory over second-place St. Louis, and the Chicago Cubs knocked off third-place San Francisco 9-5. Philadelphia defeated Pittsburgh 4-2.

PORTLAND SENDS OUTFIELDER TO SOUTHERN ASSN. TEAM

PORTLAND (AP) — The Portland Beavers of the Pacific Coast League Tuesday sent outfielder Don Robertson to Memphis of the Southern Assn.

Robertson, who has been bothered by a sore arm, was obtained three weeks ago from Fort Worth. He hit .125 for Portland.

Bill Bremner, Portland's assistant general manager, also announced that Ron Morrison, rookie shortstop from the College of Idaho, has been sent to Salinas of the California State League.

Delock Wins 10th

Reformed reliever Ike Delock won his 10th in a row, sixth of the year, with an eight-hitter, one Norm Sauchin's eighth homer.

Bad Boy Billy Loes, who had lost seven straight, won his first in relief when Baltimore overhauled a Yankee lead with five in the fifth. Billy Gardner's three-run triple capped it against losing reliever Duke Maas (4-7). Don Larsen (7-1) homered for a 1-1 tie, then won the night cap on Mickey Mantle's 16th home run, second of the night, in the eighth inning off Jack Harshman (6-7). Gene Woodling, 5-for-8 in the pair, homered for the Birds.

Bob Cerv's 21st home run got the A's started and they clinched Nel Garver's eighth victory, first in a month, in the sixth on two-run singles by Hector Lopez and Harry Chitt. Frank Lary lost his sixth. Garver allowed only five hits, three by Ozzie Virgil, and lost his shutout in the eighth on Bob Barle's first AL home run.

Sherm Lollar, whose three-run homer gave Chicago a 4-0 lead in the sixth, singled home the winner off losing reliever Mudcat Grant (6-5). Pierce, who had a near-perfect game Friday, stretched his shutout string to 33 innings—longest in the majors this year—before the Tribe scored an unearned run in the seventh. Lary Doby, late of the Sox, tied it with a pinch-hit, three-run homer in the eighth off Jerry Staley. Early Wynn (8-6) won it.

The Vancouver Mounties, sporting a half-game lead in the torrid Pacific Coast League pennant chase, go for the bundle Wednesday night as they open a seven-game stand at Phoenix's Municipal Stadium, lair of the second-place Giants.

The Mounties, second-place finishers in the PCL a year ago and tabbed as the team to beat when play got under way this year, padded their record with a 3-2 victory over the Seattle Rainiers Tuesday night in one of the two games played.

Indians Perk Up

The Spokane Indians perked up as brass Bobby Bragan took over managerial duties and gave Bragan a 4-2 victory over Sacramento's last-place Solons.

A Vancouver Manager Charlie Metro has nominated Mel Held, a righthander with a 5-4 record, to pitch the opening game of the Phoenix series. The Giants will counter with Glenn McMin, who stacks up at 2-2.

The Mounties found Seattle a soft touch Tuesday night as Erv Palica stopped the Solons on five hits, including Vada Pinson's two-run homer in the sixth.

Seattle threatened in the ninth inning, getting two men on with only one out. But Russ Heman came in to relieve the tiring Palica and put the next two Seattle batters down in order.

Vancouver's first two runs came in the second inning on Owen Friend's third homer of the year with Dick Dittusa aboard.

Sherry Pitches Route

Larry Sherry pitched the route for the Indians, giving up nine hits, fanning three and walking three along the way as his mates pulled off three double plays.

The Solons got their two runs in the fourth off three singles and a wild pitch. The Indians got single runs in the first and sixth and struck for two in the fourth on three singles, a wild pitch and a balk.

Bragan, who was fired as pilot of the Cleveland Indians last Thursday, replaces Goldie Holt as manager at Spokane.

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SPORTS HEARINGS PLANNED TO DETERMINE LEGAL STATUS

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress may yet decide this summer whether to give pro football, basketball and hockey some of baseball's freedom from the antitrust laws.

The Senate Antitrust subcommittee has decided to open hearings on the legal status of sports soon, probably July 8 or 9.

Subcommittee Chairman Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) said there was no move in a closed meeting to kill a sports bill passed by the House.

Minds Will Be Open

"It was the sense of the subcommittee that we go into this with an open mind to get all the facts and problems," Kefauver said.

Opponents of the House bill have hoped the Senate would put it aside this year. That would mean the House and Senate, now ending the 85th Congress, would have to start all over again next year.

Rep. Emanuel Celler (D-NY) said last week he would fight the House measure to the limit. Celler heads the House Antitrust subcommittee. He pushed a bill to give antitrust exemptions only to practices found "reasonably necessary" to the sports.

The house turned this one down for a bill by Rep. Francis E. Walter (D-Pa.) and supported by Rep. Kenneth B. Keating (R-NY), senior Republican on the House subcommittee. This bill would exempt such practices as player drafts, contract options, trades, territorial rights and self-regulation of TV-radio broadcasts.

Court's Decision

Ticket sales, concessions and other commercial activities would be governed by antitrust laws.

Baseball is now wholly exempt, as the result of Supreme Court decisions. But the court has held that pro football is wholly covered and implied that no other sport may enjoy baseball's immunity.
