General Manager Joe Cronin made the announcement Wednesday.

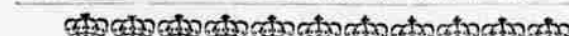

Umpqua Trout Biting As State Angling Seen Good

Holiday weekend angling will be good over most of the state, the Oregon Game Commission reported Wednesday. The report, by areas:

Northwest
Sea run cutthroats are beginning to appear in north coast streams, and some good catches have been reported during the week. Cut-throat angling should improve this weekend from the freshet which should lure in a good run. Sunset and Coffenburg lakes and the Necanicum should produce some good catches of planted trout. Chinook angling off Hobsonville in Tillamook Bay has been holding up exceptionally well. Rainbows will be released in most streams this week, which should result in some fine weekend catches. Tide-water is the best bet for sea run cutthroats, but fresh-run fish are being taken above tide. All streams in the north Willamette area are in good condition. Planted trout plentiful in the Sandy tributaries, and there should be some good catches in the upper reaches also. Small high lakes are still producing good catches on fly. The McKenzie River and the Willamette above Oakridge are fair for small trout. Salmon angling off the Yaquina bar and over the Siuslaw bar is excellent.

Southwest
Trout angling is fair to good on the Umpqua. Salmon angling at Winchester Bay is improving and at Coos Bay it is good, with mostly Chinooks being taken. Salmon fishing is slow on the Grants Pass section of the Rogue, but improving and good in the upper Rogue. Trout fishing is also improving in the North Forks area. Takkenitch and Siletcoos lakes are producing some fine perch, bluegill and catfish catches.

Central
Rock Creek Reservoir is poor. The lower Deschutes River is clearing and fishing is fair to good. Clear Lake is poor, but evening fly fishing should produce some good catches. Lost Lake is fair. Slow and deep trolling continues to produce good results. Big Lava Lake, Crane Prairie Reservoir is fair. Elk Lake has been very good for Eastern Brook from 12 to 15 inches, with trolling getting best results. Flies and trolling are both good at Ochoco Reservoir. The Metolius River has been excellent. Many limits are being taken at Lake of the Woods. Diamond Lake is also excellent on bait, flatfish or fly.

Northeast
Best rainbow angling in the John Day area should be Canyon Creek and the upper John Day River. The north and south forks of the Umatilla are fair to good. Bass angling above McNary Dam is slow, with best catches reported on the Washington side. Limit catches of wild trout are being made on Jarbwa Creek, with a few good catches on Lookingglass Creek. Angling should be good to excellent for liberated rainbow on the upper Grande Ronde, Catherine Creek, Lostine River, Wallowa River, Prairie Creek and the Imnaha River. Rainbow fishing is good to excellent at Wallowa Lake. Trolling should improve for rainbow later this month.

Million Attendance Mark Looms For Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Los Angeles Dodgers may become the first major league team to reach the 1,000,000 mark in home attendance Thursday night.

The Dodgers, returning after an extended, and moderately successful road trip, take on the St. Louis Cardinals in a two-night doubleheader at the Coliseum.

The Dodger attendance to date is 949,802 — so it will take a crowd of 50,198 to enable the club to hit a million. The Dodgers did not reach the 1,000,000 mark in Brooklyn last season until Sept. 3. They wound up with 1,028,238.

Emigrant Creek and the Blitzen River are excellent for planted trout in Harney County. Silver Creek, Silvies River, Malheur north fork and Little Malheur have been recently planted and should produce good results. Fish Lake is fair, but roads into it can be very slick if it is raining. Malheur Reservoir is still slow with only occasional good catches. The Snake River is poor. The Owyhee Reservoir has been fair for small bass and crappies. The Owyhee River should produce excellent trout catches. All streams in south Malheur County are good for limits of small trout.

Sports Salmon Fishing Poor In Washington

SEATTLE (AP) — The year 1958 will be "one of the worst sports salmon fishing years on record" in Washington state, the Times said Wednesday.

The article quoted Milo Moore, state director of fisheries, as saying he will reduce the limits on sports-caught salmon in the very near future.

"The new regulation probably will follow closely the recommendation adopted by the State Sportsmen's Council calling for a limit of three kings or silvers, not less than 16 inches for Puget Sound and three kings or silvers not less than 20 inches for ocean waters," said the article, written by Enos Bradner.

USC Swimming Coach To Retire At Age Of 73

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Fred Cady is retiring as head swimming coach at the University of Southern California.

Cady, 73, has held the post since he organized USC's first swim team in 1925. He was the diving coach on every U.S. Olympic team from 1928 to 1952.

Freshman coach Peter Daland will succeed Cady, who announced his retirement Tuesday.

Driver Must Look Before Train Hits, Or Damages Out

SALEM (AP) — If a train hits your automobile, you can't collect damages unless you looked before crossing the railroad track.

The state Supreme Court handed down this ruling Wednesday in denying damages to Edward McNeely, who had sued the Portland Traction Co. in Multnomah County Circuit Court.

McNeely's car was struck by an interurban on River Road south of Milwaukie. The lower court gave him \$5,000 damages.

The Supreme Court, however, reversed the verdict, holding that McNeely also was negligent.

The high court pointed out that McNeely could have seen the interurban for at least 150 feet before it reached the intersection. The court assumed that McNeely didn't look before crossing the tracks.

Traveler Must Look

The decision, by Chief Justice William C. Perry, added that it's still the law that a traveler crossing a track must look to see what's coming, or else be guilty of conduct barring recovery of damages.

The decision reversed former Judge Pro Tem Gordon W. Sloan. He now is a Supreme Court Justice, but he didn't consider the case on appeal.

In an appeal from Lane County, the court ruled that Joe M. Long couldn't collect damages for personal injury from his employer, Springfield Lumber Mills. This decision reversed Circuit Judge Frank B. Reid, Eugene.

Long, a truck driver, was hurt while dumping logs into a log pond.

He was covered by the Workmen's Compensation Act. The opinion was by Justice George Rossman.
