White satin bows centered by sprays of lily-of-the-valley marked the aisle pews. Acolytes lighting the altar candles were Jim and Frank Webster. Miss Sally Hill, organist, played softly as the guests assembled and accompanied Elia Vance, who sang, "Ave Maria" and "The Lord's Prayer." Father Steen Whiteside, rector of St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Eugene, performed the impressive double ring ceremony at 4 p.m. in the presence of several hundred guests. Father Alfred S.
