

RUSSIA LIBERATES CREW OF U.S. PLANE

Goldfine's Papers Stolen; 'Mike' Planted In Room

WASHINGTON (AP) — A batch of Bernard Goldfine's confidential papers were reported stolen from a hotel room Monday. A microphone was found planted to eavesdrop on conversations of his aides quartered in the same hotel.

The sensational developments swirled around a congressional investigation of relations between Goldfine, a Boston industrialist, and White House aide Sherman Adams. The probe suddenly was converted into an investigation by the committee of its own staff.

Washington police also were investigating, and the FBI was reported to be.

The committee's chief investigator, Baron I. Shacklette, was in a hotel room next door to the suite occupied by Goldfine aides when the microphone was found in the early morning hours. With him was Jack Anderson, a legman for columnist Drew Pearson. The listening device was inside Shacklette's room but placed at the crack under a door leading to an adjoining suite. This suite was occupied by Jack Lott, a public relations man and others helping Goldfine fight accusations of flogging with Adams to influence government agencies.

Bank Records Stolen

This sensation was still rumbling when in mid-morning Goldfine's secretary, Miss Mildred Pearce, reported that bank records, correspondence and other Goldfine documents in her keeping had been stolen from her room.

The House committee met in an emergency session.

After 15 hours of closed door handling, Chairman Oren Harris (D-Ark.) told newsmen the congressmen would "get to the bottom of the incidents."

"The integrity of the committee is at stake and we have simply got to get to the bottom of this," he said.

A junior counseling camp will be held this Saturday and Sunday at a camp by the same name, Camp Myrtlewood, but near Gold Beach. Students going on the junior counseling session will leave from the Douglas County courthouse at 8 a.m. Saturday.

Von Borstel has asked the youths to bring their own sack lunch for Saturday noon, warm clothes and a sleeping bag.

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Riddle Man Drowns In S. Umpqua

Body Located In Deep Hole This Morning

Richard Roy Lander, Not Good Swimmer, Brother Tells Officer

The South Umpqua River claimed another victim Sunday night to mar an otherwise perfect July 4 holiday weekend for Douglas County.

Richard Roy Lander, 25, of Riddle was pulled from a 20-foot hole in the river early this morning by Undersheriff Carl Smith about 100 feet north of the Myrtle Creek bridge. He was seen to go down by dozens of bathers about 7:40 last night and darkness frustrated rescue operations.

Lander was the sixth drowning case reported by county authorities so far this year.

Flounders Midstream

The victim was swimming the river with a companion, Bonnie Hughes, 21, also of Riddle when the accident occurred. She told officers the young man "suddenly" disappeared.

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Holiday Traffic Toll Well Below Advance Estimate

Drownings 182
Miscellaneous 93
Total 639

Cautious driving by millions of homebound motorists across the nation held the July 4th weekend holiday traffic toll well below the pre-holiday estimate of 419.

In the Pacific Northwest, Oregon had the enviable record of no traffic deaths but 12 persons drowned and 2 others died from miscellaneous causes. Only a few other states in the nation, such as Nebraska, New Hampshire and New Mexico went through the holiday with no traffic fatalities.

Washington state, however, had 10 highway deaths, 2 more than had been predicted by State Patrol Chief Roy Bellach. Five persons drowned. One of them, C. Pirie Brown, 35, of Bellevue, son of the noted Washington, D.C., columnist Constantine Brown, an Ashtland, Ore., man, Louis Joseph Garden, was killed by a switch engine near Auburn, Wash.

Thirty-two persons were killed in California traffic accidents. New York state had 23 and Texas 21.

The national Safety Council attributed the lower death toll to energetic traffic enforcement and the shock of the skyrocketing death toll during the early hours of the holiday.

SHINGLE MILL BURNS

RAINIER, Ore. (AP) — Fire virtually destroyed an old shingle mill on the banks of the Columbia River here late Saturday night.

The Wasser Bros. mill employed about 25 men. Some 100 fire fighters turned out to battle the fast-spreading flames. The mill was built on piling at the water's edge. There was no estimate of the loss.

Draper was listed as the driver of the car.

KLAMATH FALLS (AP) — A highway collision injured the mayor of Lakeview and four other persons Saturday.

State police said his car and a car carrying a Portland couple collided on Highway 30 some 30 miles east of here. Both cars overturned, police said.

Mrs. James Barney, 21, Portland, who was driving the other car, was the most severely injured. She was brought to the Klamath Valley Hospital here. Attendants said her condition was satisfactory Monday. Her husband escaped injury.

Mayor Howard Goodnough of Lakeview suffered heat cuts, his wife a broken arm and a cut knee and two of their children suffered minor cuts. They were treated at Lakeview.

3 Boys, Under 10, Admit \$1,000,000 Fire Blame

HACKENSACK, N.J. — Police say three brothers — aged 7, 8 and 9 — were responsible for a million-dollar fire here over the weekend.

The fire burned out the block-long Comfort Coal and Lumber Co. yard, destroyed or damaged eight cars and blistered four houses and a gas station Saturday night.

The boys were released in the custody of their parents after questioning.

Police Lt. Owen Toolen quoted the boys as saying they were on their way to work with some empty soda bottles when they found a partially filled book of matches.

The 8-year-old ignited a piece of paper. His 7-year-old brother told Toolen he thought he had stamped the small fire out, so the youngest brother left the paper and proceeded to the store.

They saw the fire on their way home.

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Oregon Counts 12 Drownings As Three Days' Holiday Toll

Oregon experienced a tragic Independence Day weekend on the water, but apparently escaped death on the highways in the long three-day holiday.

Twelve persons drowned as 90-degree heat drove thousands to swimming areas and fishing streams. Two other deaths pushed the Oregon toll to 14 by midnight Sunday, when the counting ended.

Not one traffic death was recorded in the holiday period which began at 6 p.m. last Thursday.

The deaths other than drowning were those of a California youth crushed by a huge rock near Odell Lake Sunday, and a 4-year-old dead male who died in the thunderous explosion of a fireworks warehouse in southeast Portland early Saturday.

Two of the drowning victims were Portland sisters, swept away while wading, hand-in-hand, in the Columbia River near Saville Island.

The sisters were Sheila Ann Scroggins, 13, and Connie Scroggins, 11. They were holding hands while wading with five other youngsters. None of the seven could swim.

Their mother, and a brother, Ronald, 21, saw the girls slip into a deep pool. Ronald and other adults jumped in, but were not able to reach the sisters.

Two in Lane County

Roger Braman, 20, Eugene, drowned Sunday morning in the south fork of the Willamette River 16 miles above Oakridge. He was fishing with a companion, who told state police Braman fell into the stream and was swept away. The body was recovered.

Another drowning in the Eugene area took the life of Walter A. Chaffee, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Chaffee, route 2, Veneta, Sunday. The father said the boy disappeared suddenly from a raft in the swimming area at Fern Ridge Reservoir. The body was not recovered until too late.

Richard Roy Lander, 25, Riddle, drowned in the South Umpqua River near Myrtle Creek Sunday evening. He went under while attempting to swim across the river. The body was recovered Monday.

A youngster wading in the South Santiam River, five miles east of Lebanon, drowned after falling into a pool. He was Harry Allen Anderson, 15, visiting from Lincoln, Neb. He was wading with his twin brother, Harold, who managed to reach shore.

Ken Mayer of the Lebanon Fire Department rescue squad recovered the body.

Lewis Jackson Jr., 21, Seattle, a nonswimmer, drowned while wading in the Sandy River near Troutdale, east of Portland. He was visiting Portland friends for the holiday.

Boating Mishap Fatal

In a boating accident south of Newport on the coast, three persons reached safely but a fourth drowned when a 14-foot outboard powered boat was capsized by a large wave. The craft had been missing and lost in the fog Saturday.

The boat came upon a crab boat, the George E., of Newport, skippered by Ed Erickson. He told the four to follow a line of crab pots back to the harbor, and notified the Coast Guard.

A Coast Guard patrol rounded up four other boats, but missed one occupied by Donald F. Crosby, 27, Portland, and three companions. The boat drifted ashore and capsized. Crosby failed to reach the beach.

Green Dist. Denied Loan For Sewer

Federal Agency Turns Down Plea Because Of Project Opposition

The Green Sanitary District's bid for federal help in building its sewer system has been turned down.

A letter has been received by the district's board of directors from A. F. Moberg, acting director for Northwest operations of the federal Housing and Home Finance Agency, saying the loan of \$355,000 has been refused.

This was the latest setback in a stormy history of the efforts to build a sewer system. Voters of the district have approved sale of \$355,000 in bonds to finance the sewer, but prospective bond buyers have failed to take an interest in purchasing them.

In his letter, Moberg lists four reasons for disapproval of the requested loan to the district.

Opposition Heavy

In the first place, he says, opposition to the district operations has been heavy. In bond and dissolution elections, opposition has ranged from 30 to 40 per cent of the total vote. (The Committee for Dissolution of the district took a solid stand against approval of the loan from the HHFA.)

Secondly, the HHFA takes a dim view of the necessity of enforcing a "mandatory connection ordinance" during the next few years in order to secure connections for the sewer. The district, in its bid for the loan, said it could not secure 350 voluntary agreements to connect to the proposed sewer system.

The HHFA also is not impressed by the probability of the necessity

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Eisenhower Plans Visit To Canada To Ease Tensions

OTTAWA (AP) — President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Diefenbaker in their talks opening here tomorrow may take historic steps to establish a direct channel between the law-making bodies of Canada and the United States.

Diefenbaker, describing the meeting as a move to eliminate differences and strengthen ties between the two countries, last night expressed hope they will lead to the creation of a joint Canada-U.S. parliamentary committee.

The purpose of such a group would be to keep a constant watch on problems emerging between the neighbors and presumably to initiate some fast action if friction reaches the danger point.

Public aggravations between the two countries have increased in the last few years, rather than diminished.

Diefenbaker will seek solutions on such grievances as the American ban on Chinese trade, import restrictions on Canadian oil, and the dumping of American wheat in commercial markets overseas, thereby hurting Canadian attempts to market their own surpluses for dollars.

The survivors were identified as Robert Nuese, 29, and his wife, Barbara, 28, of Gresham, and Evelyn L. Gospodnetich, 24, Portland.

Rock Crushes Youth

The youth crushed by an overturning rock was William David DeLay, 17, of Indio, Calif. He had been visiting in Springfield with the Gordon Miller family, and took Miller's daughter, 17-year-old Judy, on an outing to Odell Lake Sunday.

Young DeLay climbed a huge rock, camera in hand. The rock slipped, pitching the boy to his death as it rolled on him.

The other five deaths, four by drowning, occurred earlier in the holiday weekend.

The Victims

Martin Fisher, 46, and his 19-year-old son, Allan, both of North Bend, and Andrew Young, 40, Oregon City, in a boating accident off Florence.

Sally Jenkins, 14, Sweet Home, drowned while swimming in the Santiam River near Sweet Home.

Mary Beth Howe, 4, Portland, died in the explosion of a fireworks warehouse in southeast Portland early Saturday.

Robot Substitute For Human Brain In Creation Stage

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy announced today the partial development of an electronic robot it says will be able to match some of the functions of the human brain.

It calls the robot a Perceptron. At least another year will be required to complete the first full pilot model, the Navy said, but its principle and concept already have been demonstrated successfully by using a large electronic computer.

When it is fully developed, the machine is expected to be able to perceive, recognize and identify its surroundings without any human training or control. It differs from an ordinary computer in that it does not have to be fed facts and figures in advance.

The Navy says the new system closely parallels, by electronic means, the "selective recognition or 'similarity' functions of man's mind."

It would operate in much the same way that the human eye and certain brain areas work together to provide the human function of recognition.

Tornadic Winds Breeding Floods Hit Texas Cities

DALLAS (AP) — Flood-creating deluges—up to 12 inches—and violent and damaging winds struck Texas during the night. The storm-breeding cloud front stalled over the state Monday, threatening more damage.

Winds of tornadic force damaged homes in Tyler and Dallas. Fort Worth lost a church steeple to lightning.

An estimated eight inches of rain hit Devine in south-central Texas and flooded the small town Sunday night. Several automobiles were submerged at an underpass, and several sections of the town were under four feet of water. Some homes were evacuated, but no casualties were reported and damage was not estimated.

The 12-inch rain struck Hannibal in central Texas. It sent the Cosque River and Barton Creek surging out of their banks, flooded the Stephenville city park and damaged several stores.

A wholesale grocery firm's building and several homes were heavily damaged in Tyler.

Damage was estimated at several thousand dollars when the Arcadia Park section of Dallas was hit by what residents described as a small twister. Small outbuildings, cars and TV antennas were damaged.

The Polytechnic Methodist Church on the campus of Texas Wesleyan College at Fort Worth was damaged about the same time when lightning knocked off one of its four concrete steeples.

Lightning struck another Fort Worth church, but no damage was reported.

Lightning also hit the St. Mary's Cathedral in Austin in central Texas, knocking stones from the 100-foot tower through a tile roof of the sanctuary. About a half dozen homes in this area were damaged. Lightning struck the Austin police station with minor damage.

Capone's Restaurant Racket Due For Probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — Members of the prohibition-era Capone gang will figure in a Senate investigation of alleged mobster control of Chicago's restaurant industry.

The Senate Rackets Committee will open hearings on the matter tomorrow. The hearings are expected to last about two weeks.

Chairman John L. McClellan (D-Ark.) announced: "We plan to take a close look at the way racketeers and hoodlums, including members of the old Capone mob in Chicago, muscled into the restaurant industry in that town through close ties with labor unions and management associations."

"We hope to present a revealing picture of the extent to which racketeers were able to control and operate this industry through fear, intimidation and shakedowns."

McClellan said the investigation will go into whether collective agreements were signed between the Chicago Restaurant Assn., certain independent restaurants in Chicago and certain unions.

Rebels Hold Americans To Deter Govt. Attacks

GUANTANAMO, Cuba (AP) — Fidel Castro's rebels still held 36 U.S. citizens and one Canadian today. Hope continued that their release will be speeded up.

There were strong indications, however, that the rebels were in no hurry because the presence of the Americans in the rebel camps has brought a halt to air attacks by the forces of President Fulgencio Batista.

Four American civilians and one Canadian were brought by U.S. Navy helicopter to the Guantanamo naval base Sunday. The rebels freed four Americans and a Canadian last Wednesday and three Americans Saturday night.

The motive for the kidnappings reportedly was to pressure the United States not to supply Batista's forces with fuel or ammunition.

"Castro was quoted as saying, 'The Cuban army won't drop any bombs while the Americans are here. They are very good 30mm. antiaircraft protection.'"

All those released have been in good shape and reported the rebels treated them well.

Two Roseburg Children Struck By Car Saturday

City police today reported two children, Steve Hartsough, 6, and his 11-year-old sister, Bertina, were hit by a car Saturday afternoon as they attempted to cross Winchester St. near Diamond Lake Blvd. The girl suffered abrasions to her left elbow, but her brother was unhurt.

Driver of the car was identified as Harlow Wagner, Rt. 1, Roseburg, who took the children to their home and then to a local hospital for treatment. Police said Wagner told the children's father he did not see them until they were struck by his car. The youngsters live at 428 SE Rose St. No action was taken by police.

Six Killed, 2 Injured In Two-Car Collision

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. (AP) — Two cars collided near here Sunday during a thunderstorm, killing six persons. Two others were injured critically.

Dead are Aaron Leitwein, 68; his wife Dathna, 64; their son, Harry Leitwein, 45; and his son Dean, 13, all of Springfield; and Howard Bigelow, 48, and his son David, 13, Kansas City.

The injured are Bigelow's other son, Tommy, 9, and Mrs. Harry Leitwein, 45.

The two cars were involved in a collision on Highway 13, near the intersection of Highway 13 and Highway 13.

The collision occurred during a severe thunderstorm with heavy rain and strong winds.

The cause of the collision is under investigation by local police.

The families of the deceased are being notified by police.

The bodies of the deceased are being held at the local morgue.

The investigation is continuing.

The police are asking anyone who saw the accident to call them.

Broadcast In Moscow Airst Action

Nine-Man Personnel Comprising Entire Crew Accounted For

LONDON (AP) — Moscow Radio said the nine-man crew of a U. S. Air Force transport plane forced down in Soviet Armenia June 27 was freed on the Soviet-Iranian frontier Monday.

The broadcast said the airmen were handed over to a U.S. military representative at the town of Astara.

It gave no further details. The U.S.S.R. announced on June 28 that the C118 military transport had been caught by Soviet fighters inside the Soviet-Armenian border and forced to land.

The U.S. Embassy in Moscow had since been negotiating at high level for the return of the men. Names of those released coincided in eight cases with the list of those aboard issued in Washington on June 30.

But instead of Maj. Bennie A. Shupe, Moscow listed a Maj. S. D. Allen, whose home address was not given.
