Roseburg Girl Is Delegate To Current FHA Session

Eighteen-year-old Sharyl Swenson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Swenson of 838 W. Haggerty, Roseburg, is among 450 teen-age delegates to the 1958 national meeting of the Future Homemakers of America who went into session in Kansas City, Mo. today.

Sharyl and eight other FHAers were chosen by the state FHA to represent Oregon at the national meeting. They were accompanied east by Miss Mildred Deischer, state FHA adviser and member of the state home economics supervisory staff, and Mrs. Eleanor DeCamp, homemaking teacher at Cascade Union High School at Turner and member of the state FHA advisory Board.

Exchanging Ideas

The five-day meeting, with the theme "Future Homemakers of America — Teens with a Purpose," planned and carried out by the teen-agers themselves, will give Oregon delegates an opportunity to exchange ideas with FHAers from 47 states, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

In general sessions and group discussions, they will stress the importance of education for developing the abilities needed in home and family life today and how they can prepare for future adult homemaking responsibilities.

"Why An Education?" will be the key question at Tuesday's general session. Dr. Charles Koerber, dean of faculty at Northwest Missouri State College, will emphasize the values of an education. Then, after a panel presentation on careers in home economics, the teen-age delegates will divide into discussion groups to give their ideas on career and marriage and education for both.

Values Emphasized

During the five packed days, leaders from education and business will help the FHA delegates to focus their attention on the value of an education, career opportunities in home economics, ways for becoming better citizens, improving their human relations and broadening spiritual values.

Multnomah Co. To Draw Lots On Scholarships

PORTLAND (AP) — Multnomah County Commissioners will draw lots next week to decide 24 winners of tuition-free scholarships to Oregon State College.

The new scholarships came into being when an old law, unnoticed for 70 years, was discovered. It provides that each state legislature and each county court select a scholarship winner.

Under terms of the 1855 law, Multnomah County is entitled to scholarships for 16 representatives plus seven state senators and one for the board of commissioners.

In a case where a legislator has submitted more than one nominee, lots will be drawn to determine his selection.

The scholarships provide a year's tuition worth \$213.

UTILITIES VALUATION

OLYMPIA (AP) — Public utilities in Washington state were valued at \$817,434,873 this week, a net increase of \$74,198,703 over last year.

Largest boost in valuation was for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. The tax commission placed a value of 198 million dollars on the company, an increase of 28 million over 1957.

PAY RAISE PRAISED

WASHINGTON (AP) — Recent wage increases granted by Congress will result in a large increase in federal worker purchasing power, Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said here.

He said the increase for Oregon's nearly 19,000 federal employees and retired federal pensioners will amount to about 7 1/2 million dollars.

6 Oregon Youths Named To Federal Academies

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) Saturday named six Oregon youths to four of the nation's service academies.

Neuberger appointed three to the Naval Academy at Annapolis. They are: Jay Stanley Brown, 18, Hillsboro; Denton J. Cameron Nelson, 18, Portland; and Stanley David Griggs, 18, Portland.

Named to the Military Academy at West Point was Jan Terry Molvar, Portland. F. Michael Banks, 18, formerly of Oswego, was appointed to the Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs.

David G. Larive, 18, Hermiston, was named to the Merchant Marine Academy.

Neuberger said the appointees had passed all necessary qualifying and entrance examinations.

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State Launches Swine Program

CHICAGO (Special) — A new 4-H program open to boys and girls interested in raising meat animals has been arranged by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, according to Norman C. Mindrum, director.

It is the national 4-H swine program, and is supported by the Moorman Manufacturing Co., Quincy, Illinois, makers of concentrate feeds and parasite control products for livestock and poultry.

The company will provide \$400 college scholarships to six national 4-H champions as well as state trips to the 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, and medals will be awarded to county winners.

"It gives us a great deal of pleasure and satisfaction to become the donor in connection with the national 4-H swine awards program," stated E. H. Wilson, president of Moorman. "We consider it to be a splendid way by which we can help farm boys and girls gain a greater appreciation of — and to acquire a greater participation in — the future of animal agriculture."

"It is our sincere hope that these awards will stimulate ever greater achievements from the fine group of youngsters which make up the 4-H membership," Wilson said.

Although this new awards program has just recently been launched by the State Extension staff, 4-H Club members enrolled now will be eligible to enter their records in competition for the 1958 awards. Detailed information may be obtained from the county agent.

Twining Says Troops Ready For Lebanon Action

DETROIT (AP) — Gen. Nathan Twining says the United States is prepared to send troops into Lebanon if the need arises.

"I don't think it would start an all-out war," he said.

But he added: "If we go into Lebanon, we go for a purpose and we are prepared for any eventuality. We are ready for any eventuality — all-out war or limited war — right now."

If U. S. troops intervened in the seven-week-old rebellion in the tiny Middle East country, they probably would do it without nuclear arms, he told a news conference.
