

Lockwood Clips Prineville

Young, Whipple Are Stars In 9-4 Win

The Lockwood Motors American Legion junior baseball team completed a clean sweep Saturday morning of its three-game sojourn into Central Oregon. But it took two extra innings to finish the job at Prineville's Davidson Field.

Bill Harper's club broke up a 4-4 tie in the top of the ninth with five big runs, to win, 9-4. Credit for the win goes to righthander Bob Whipple, again pitching in relief. Whipple's record is now 3-2.

The win for Lockwood also makes it seven in a row and eight wins in the last nine starts. The Roseburg Legion also beat a team owning a 25-7 record and a pitcher who had a 4-1 mark.

Lockwood began early in posting the win. Lead-off man Don Wells met righthander Jerry Riley with a double to left-center and Wes Young followed with a single to right. Young continued to second when Gene Grummer allowed the ball to get through him, and Wells scored the first run.

Mike Hatfield then hit to short-stop Wayne Kee, who let the ball get through him, with Young scoring run number two. That was the end of the rally, as the next three batters were retired.

Lockwood went into a 4-0 lead in the top of the inning with an infield single and Chuck Hiney walked. Hurler Bill Eswine beat out a beautiful hunt down the third base line and the bases were loaded. Then the first out occurred when Wells hit into a fielder's choice with Eswine wiped out at second, but on the tap, Scott scored.

Young Hits, Hiney Scores
Young then collected his second single of the game, another blow to right with Hiney scoring. Wells became out number two of the frame, as he was out at the plate attempting to score on a passed ball. The inning ended as Hatfield flied to left field.

The Prineville club chipped away at this 4-0 score until the game was tied. Eswine allowed one run in the second and another in the fourth. In the fifth, a walk, two errors and two singles gave the Prineville team its tying runs.

At this point, Harper juggled his lineup, sending Whipple to the mound, Eswine to left and Byron Baker into the game behind the plate.

In the top of the sixth, Lockwood loaded the bases with two away, but the last batter, Wells, was whiffed by Riley on an even count.

In the last of the seventh, the host team came very close to grabbing the contest. Whipple hit the first man up, and the second batter in the frame was safe on

a fielder's choice. On this play, Whipple tried for the runner going into second but, on a disputed call, Dennis DeCoursey was ruled safe. Whipple struck out the next hitter, to take the heat off somewhat. Then came the third double play of the game for Lockwood. The last one couldn't have happened at a better time.

Rally Cut Short

John Woodward hit to Wells who stepped on second to force the runner coming in from first, and then fired to Baker to get DeCoursey sliding at the plate. So the fray continued into the eighth chapter.

Lockwood was set down in order in its half of the eighth and Prineville collected a single and a walk off Whipple in the bottom of the inning. The side was retired again at a crucial moment, when Tom Nichols flied to Eswine in left field.

The winning ninth inning for Lockwood began as Baker singled to left and Eswine was safe on a fielder's choice. Wells sacrificed the runners along.

Then it was Young, who hit 3-5 and collected four RBI's, who poked out a single to right to score Baker and Eswine. These runs should have been sufficient, but the Lockwood club kept rolling. Hatfield was on through a fielder's choice as Young moved into second on the second baseman's error.

John Livingston drew a walk to load the bases.

With Whipple the batter, Young stole home and the other runners also advanced. Hurler Riley, badly shaken up by this turn of events, slammed the ball to the ground in disgust, and Hatfield raced in to score. Livingston scored the final run as Whipple came through with a single. The chapter ended as Ted Kolberg hit into a doubleplay.

With one out in the ninth, Whipple received outstanding support to end the game, as Eswine and Yates both came up with great catches.

Young's hitting spree on the road trip was an important factor in the successful week. The outfielder collected 9-16 for a week's average of .362 — and he drove in six runs.

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Padres Jump Into Race As Leaders Split; Bevos Lose

The two power clubs of the Pacific Coast League — Phoenix and Vancouver — have finished their face-to-face meeting in which both sought to grasp a firm hold on first place.

But they're still as close together as they were when they started the series and now a third team has joined the race.

The Giants and the Mounties split a doubleheader Sunday. Vancouver taking the opener 7-6 and Phoenix rallying for an 11-7 nightcap victory. The series ended 4-3 top with a .593 percentage while Vancouver is five points behind in third place.

Three points behind Vancouver are the San Diego Padres, who divided a twin bill with Salt Lake. The Lakers won the first game 2-1

and the Padres took the nightcap 11-3.

Bevos Bounced
In other games, Seattle trounced Spokane, 3-1, and Sacramento edged Portland 2-1.

Going into the bottom of the fifth in the nightcap, Vancouver held a 6-2 lead but the Giants encashed their hitting power and scored four tallies, two of them on Dusty Rhodes' homer. They went ahead to stay in the sixth frame when Andre Rodgers hit a two-run homer. The Giants picked up two more runs in the seventh inning.

Joe Durham was credited with five RBIs in the opener as he belted a grand slam homer in the first inning and then singled in the winning run in the last frame for Vancouver's victory.

Phoenix had rallied for six tallies after the Mounties jumped off to a 6-0 lead. Jim King smashed a bases-loaded home run and Rodgers scored his 18th homer of the season for Phoenix and the contest was tied 6-6 at the end of four.

Paids Take Series
The split at San Diego gave the Padres the series, 4-3.

Bob Alexander allowed the Lakers but five hits as he notched his mound victory in the nightcap. One of the runs against him was on an error. San Diego touched three Salt Lake pitchers for 13 hits.

Salt Lake won the first game on a couple of unexpected home runs — one by Sam Miley, who led off the game after Carlos Bernier had been bounced off by arguing with an umpire. The other was by low-hitting Pete Naton.

Single games were played at Sacramento and Spokane.

The Solons' Roger Osenbaugh tied Portland to six hits in winning at Sacramento.

Spokane outthrew Seattle 7-6 but made the safe blows pay off at the plate.

Seattle's Chuck Churn was in control all the way. He struck out four and walked one.

Rested Hurlers To Compete In All-Star Game

BALTIMORE (AP) — For the first time in recent years, the managers of the All-Star baseball teams will have a stable of well-rested starting pitchers.

None of the 15 pitchers (eight in the National and seven in the American) slated for tomorrow's silver anniversary game started Sunday games. A few years back, it seemed everybody on the roster worked on the final day of regular play.

Manager Casey Stengel of the New York Yankees, perennial boss of the Americans, scooped off last year's St. Louis when he learned pitchers he wanted to use weren't available.

Old Case picked three men off his own Yankee staff this year. He was able to see to it that Bob Turley, top man in the majors with a 12-3 record, didn't pitch since beating Washington Friday with a three-hitter.

Manager Fred Haney of the Milwaukee Braves, who heads the Nationals, also has a close mouthed about his pitching selections. However, he leaned toward Bob Friend of Pittsburgh. Friend beat Milwaukee Saturday for his 10th victory.

The preponderance of righthanded hitters in the starting lineups, selected by the players' votes, makes it desirable to start a righthanded pitcher on each side.

Stengel, whose Americans are favored 13-10 has Early Wynn of Chicago, Ray Narleski of Cleveland and his own relief man, Ryne Duren, as other right-handers. For left handed hurlers, he has southpaw Whitey Ford of the Yanks, Billy Pierce of Chicago and Billy O'Dell of Baltimore.

Haney has right-handers Bob Purkey of Cincinnati, who was used briefly in relief yesterday. Larry Jackson of St. Louis, Don McMahon of Milwaukee and Dick Farrell of Philadelphia, in addition to Friend.

Jackson started early in the year but has been used only on relief lately. McMahon and Farrell are relief pitchers. His left handed hurler, Warren Spahn, Johnny Podres of Los Angeles and Johnny Antonelli of San Francisco.

Stan Musial of St. Louis, playing his 15th All-Star Game, and Bob Skinner of Pittsburgh are the only left-handed hurlers in the National's starting lineup. Nelson Fox of Chicago and switch-hitting Mickey Mantle of the Yanks are the American lefties against right-handers.

The American League holds a 14-10 edge in the series.

LINEUPS TABBED
BALTIMORE (AP) — Bob Turley of the New York Yankees and Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves were named Monday as starting pitchers in Tuesday's 25th All-Star baseball game.

The choice of Spahn was a surprise because the American League starting lineup contained only two left-handed hurlers and one of those, Mickey Mantle, is a switch hitter who will bat right-handed against southpaws.

Turley's choice was expected. He is the top winner in the major league with 12 victories, 3 defeats, Spahn, 37, has a 10-5 record for the world champion Braves.

Manager Fred Haney of Milwaukee listed another surprise when he listed Willie Mays, San Francisco centerfielder, as his leadoff man.

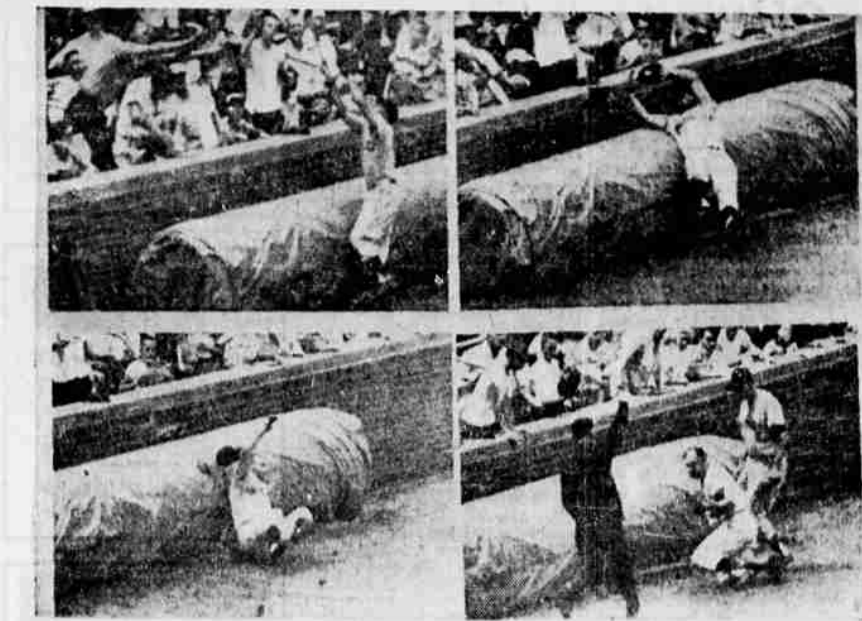
Spokane Player Wins Women's Inland Crown

In the Cubs' second straight triumph at Los Angeles, Drott won his fourth in ten decisions. He had a no-hitter until Jim Gilliam got the lone dodger hit, a single with one out in the seventh.

Drott, however, had to be replaced after he forced in a run in the seventh with his eighth pass.

Bell Raps Ball
Gus Bell rapped four hits and drove in four runs to pace Cincinnati's 15-hit attack in the second game victory after the Phillies had equalled the National League's longest winning streak of the season in the opener. Rookie pitcher Ray Semproch limited the Redlegs to five hits for his 10th triumph as the Phils made it seven in a row in the first game.

In spring training, Ivan (Ike) Delock was just another name on the Boston Red Sox roster. Manager Mike Higgins had plans for him, but in relief roles. No. 2 behind Lefty Leo Kiely.

Today, as Higgins takes inventory during the season's half-way turn, he shoulders to think where his second place Sox would be without Delock. Ike not only has blossomed into a starting pitcher but he has become the team's biggest winner and the ace of the staff.

Posis 7-0 Slate
The 23-year-old right-hander won his seventh game without defeat Sunday. It was Boston's first victory over the American League

Philadelphia's Phillies extended their winning streak to seven by defeating Cincinnati 7-1, but the Redlegs won the second game of the doubleheader 11-4. The Braves broke their five-game losing streak as Joey Jay hurled a 2-0 shutout against Pittsburgh. Chicago's Cubs, behind the one-hit pitching of Dick Drott and Don Elston, defeated Los Angeles 6-2.

NY Holds Lead
The New York Yankees' first place lead in the American League remained unshaken despite their 10-4 defeat by Boston. Kansas City, tied with the Red Sox in the runner-up spot, dropped an 8-5 decision to Cleveland. Detroit nipped Chicago 2-1 and Washington snapped a tie in the eighth to defeat Baltimore 4-3.

Jay, the Braves' 22-year-old bonus righthander, throttled the Pirates with only four hits for his

chance as any of collecting. The Bears, whose slow but steady improvement made the team a bright star in the usually drab circuit, are the leaders with six victories and one defeat. And if they continue to play the next 30 games the way they did the last 35, the Bears will easily take the crown.

Yakima blasted Tri-City, in fourth place with a 3-5 record, Sunday 7-1. The Braves split a doubleheader with the Braves Saturday, losing the opener 10-9 and winning the second game 9-5.

But the Lewiston Braves are going to give Yakima quite a fight in No. 2 spot with five wins and two losses. The Braves took a twin bill from Wenatchee Sunday, 6-5 and 8-6 but lost Saturday's contest to the Chiefs, 7-5. Wenatchee, now 5-3, is in third place.

Eugene and Salem are occupying the league cellar together, each with two victories and six defeats. The Senators lost to Eugene 3-2 Saturday but gathered strength for Sunday's doubleheader to win both games, 6-3 and 4-3.
