

Elkton Nursery Ends Spring Job Of Tree Seeding

Don Maus, assistant state forester, has announced that spring sowing of forest tree seed at the Elkton nursery has been completed, with the result that some 19 million seedlings will be available for re-forestation and conservation projects in western Oregon.

Sowing of seed for a planned production of another 10 million seedlings has been completed at Corvallis, said Maus.

The forester said 4 million of the Elkton seedlings will be used for U.S. Forest Service re-forestation projects. The balance of some 25 million seedlings are being grown primarily for planting under the conservation reserve program and Title IV, both under the Soil Bank program, he added.

"Surplus stock is to be distributed for re-forestation in the farm woodlands of the state, for industrial plantations, to the various schools and other group organizations and to other forest land owners who wish to re-forest," said Maus.

Some 5 million Corvallis seedlings have been ticketed for the state re-forestation project. A large part of this production will go into the huge Tillamook burn. Maus said that doubling of the production of the past season would meet demands of tree planters of the state.

But he said there might be a shortage of white fir — commonly used in Christmas tree plantations. Difficulty in securing the seed of the species has resulted in the shortage, he said.

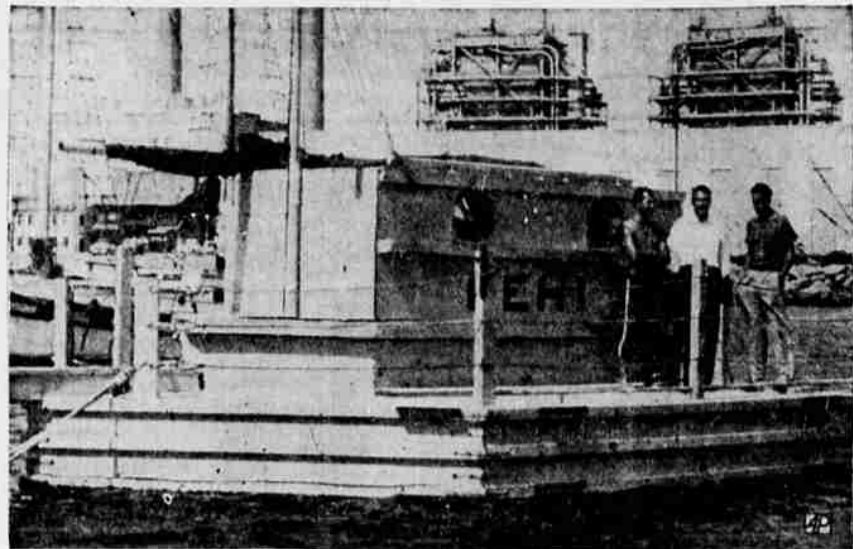

Adventist Camp Meeting Dated At Gladstone Park

The annual ten-day Oregon Conference Seventh-day Adventist summer camp meeting at Gladstone Park will begin July 17 and end July 26.

Featured at the meetings this year will be a number of missionaries who have returned to the United States to attend the world session of the general conference of Seventh-day Adventists held recently in Cleveland, Ohio.

The Oregon meeting is one of the largest Adventist gatherings in the U. S., with a crowd of 15,000 expected. Elder W. R. Riston, local pastor, has been at the camp ground assisting the pastors of the 19 Oregon conference churches in preparing for the annual event.

Preparation of the more than 1400 pitched tents and 400 cabins, as well as all other aspects of getting the 74-acre camp ground ready for meetings, is a yearly task assigned to the Adventist ministers of the conference. Pastors also remain at the conclusion of the encampment to dismantle the tents.

Many Roseburg Adventists will attend the meeting, but for those who cannot go, regular services will be held at the local church. Dr. A. B. Munroe and Clayton Konzack will be in charge of the services July 19 and 26, according to Elder Riston.

N. Korean Red Stages Attack, Kills Himself

SEOUL (AP)—A North Korean soldier armed with hand grenades and a submachinegun stole through the U. N. portion of the demilitarized zone between North and South Korea July 4 and made a one-man attack on a U. N. military police shelter.

The Communist soldier, tossed a grenade into the shelter, killing one South Korean soldier and wounding another. He started to throw another grenade, but a third South Korean soldier who had gone outside to investigate a noise shot him.

The intruder fell on his own grenade and was killed by its blast.

Tax Bite Leaves Only \$50,000 Out Of \$220,500 Win

NEW YORK (AP)—Elfrida von Nardroff lost \$33,000 and one of her two titles last night.

The Brooklyn quiz whiz finally was ousted from NBC-TV's Twenty-One after 21 appearances. Robert Leicester, an assistant director of a private high school in New York, beat her 21-10. They were playing for \$3,000 a point difference in Leicester's scores.

Thus Leicester's 11-point margin of victory gave him \$33,000 and the same amount was subtracted from Miss von Nardroff's previous winnings of \$253,000 leaving her with \$220,500.

The Brooklyn woman remains the record money winner for a single TV quiz show. Her loss to Leicester drops her total winnings below the \$224,000 won by Robert Strom, an 11-year-old Bronx boy, on two different shows.

Miss von Nardroff, 32, quit her job as a personnel manager to concentrate on the show. After taxes she will keep about \$50,000 of her winnings.

Tunisia Plans Tie-Up With Soviet Russia

TUNIS (AP)—Tunisia is getting ready to establish diplomatic relations with Soviet Russia and Communist China although its government plans to stay friendly with the West.

President Habib Bourguiba told his Neo-Destour Party's weekly newspaper L'Action that Tunisia would set up its first formal ties with the Communist bloc before the end of the year. A commercial delegation is already on its way to Moscow, he added.

The North African leader, who is generally regarded as one of the West's best Moslem friends, criticized the United States for not sending enough military and economic aid to his country.
