Elsa Maxwell Delivers Sharp Jabs At Russians

BERLIN (AP)—Elsa Maxwell came back from Soviet run East Berlin recently declaring that the backside of the Communists show "they haven't got it."

"Baggy pants, baggy pants. That's all you see over there from the rear," said the famous 69-year-old party giver. "You can always tell the strength of a man by his backside. And there is no strength in baggy trousers."

"Ever see a Spanish toreador from the rear? Ah, there's some strength," said Elsa, enthusiastically punching the air with her fist.

Elsa drove with this reporter through the red-flagged Brandenburg gate, past respectful East German Communist guards who looked as if they had just seen a Stalin tank camouflaged in a black shanting suit and a flower garden hat.

Elsa lumbered down Satinalle, posed before a statue of Stalin—"that old fiscal—and rubber-necked at the air raid bunker where Hitler died with his bride Eva Braun.

She was shocked by the absence of people on the bomb-scarred streets.

"Complete emptiness," she said. "The people on the streets don't seem real. They walk like zombies—something out of a Boris Karloff movie."

Elsa returned to West Berlin, where she is attending the film festival, with a big sigh of relief.

"Now look. There's a boy over there with his arm around a girl," she said. "Now I didn't see that over there."

"That terrible man Hitler at least had one idea in his life: Strength through joy. But in East Berlin they don't even have joy through strength."

Indictments Slated In Narcotics Traffic

NEW YORK (AP)—"A most important development in a major case" against underworld narcotics big shots is due Tuesday, says U.S. Atty. Paul W. Williams.

Williams' annual report indicates that indictments will be returned by a federal grand jury that has been investigating the mobster convention at Apalachin, N.Y., last Nov. 14.

After the report was released Sunday, a newsman asked Williams for details about a line in the report concerning imminent action in a major case against the underworld hierarchy.

Williams said the crackdown will involve at least two and maybe more of the hoodlums who attended the Apalachin meeting.

He said the two Apalachin characters he had in mind are "very big — believe me — very big."
