Gobbling up second-division teams with regularity is the common behavior among front runners in the major leagues.

But that's not the way it's working with the first-place Milwaukee Braves and the last-place Los Angeles Dodgers.

Last night the Dodgers knocked down the Braves for the eighth time in 10 meetings this season. The score was 10-3.

This was the only game in the National League.

The Braves will be in Los Angeles again tonight. Pittsburgh will be at Chicago, Philadelphia at St. Louis and Cincinnati at San Francisco.

The heroes of last night's piece were Steve Bilko and Stan Williams.

Bilko Locates Fence
Bilko, a local idol when he played in the Coast League for the old Los Angeles Angels, made his first starting appearance at home since his recent acquisition from Cincinnati. He slammed a three-run homer in the first inning. The big first baseman drove in another run later with a sacrifice fly.

Williams, a rookie right-hander, pitched a pretty four-hitter and picked up his fourth victory in seven decisions.

He walked three in the fifth inning and two in the eighth. The Braves nicked him for a run in the fifth, on Eddie Mathews' sacrifice fly, but he got out of the eighth-inning jam by getting Hank Aaron to ground into a double play.

Roseboro Hits
Right behind Bilko in run production was rookie catcher John Roseboro, who drove in three with a double and a single. He scored twice himself, once after tripling.

Carlton Willey, the Milwaukee starter, was assigned to the show after the first inning and took his second loss of the season. Gene Conley, Bob Trowbridge and Ernie

Johnson followed him to the mound. Joe Gordon held forth at second base for the New York Yankees for many a year, but nowadays he's strictly an enemy of the Bronx Bombers.

And, as an enemy will on occasion, he did a little gloating. "Boy," he laughed, "I'll bet they felt strange last night after getting rid of Power, Held and Hunter."

Win Amuses Gordon
He was referring to last night's slaughter of the Yanks — the first time he's come up against them as manager of the Cleveland Indians. He took over for Bobby Bragan two weeks ago and the Tribe has won 7 of 11 since.

Vic Power, Woody Held and Billy Hunter all were laborers for Casey Stengel in recent years, but the Yanks couldn't find a spot for them. Last night, they really went against Whitey Ford and Virgil Trucks. Power had five hits, Held two and Hunter two.

The game was the only one scheduled in the American League last night. In the only National League game, the Los Angeles Dodgers defeated the first-place Milwaukee Braves 10-3.

Worst Pounding For NY
The Tribe collected 19 hits off Ford and Trucks. It was the worst barrage the Yanks have been subjected to this season.

Actual it was a close battle between Ford and Cal McLish for seven innings. But in the eighth, the Indians scored seven runs. McLish was lifted for a pinch hitter during the uprising, which prompted Gordon to comment:

"Imagine making your last pitch with the score tied 1-1 and finishing up the winner of a 12-1 ball game."

A dozen Indians batted in that eighth inning. Included among the hits were a homer by Mickey Vernon and doubles by Held, Bob by Avila and Billy Harrell. The Tribe scored four more in the ninth, but by that time they were getting tired.

Both rightlander Bill Eswine and southpaw John Livingston tossed one-hitters at the Springfield club. Eswine gave up two runs, both unearned, as the Lockwood club took two counters. It was 7-2 in the opener and 1-0 in the nightcap.

Eswine pitched the first game, and except for the first two innings when his mates helped Springfield with four errors, pitched hitless and runless ball. He whiffed eight and issued walks to three.

Livingston completely handcuffed the Springfield club until the fifth when shortstop Jerry Haugen saw his routine pop fly drop in at second base. It was a real fluke, however, as Mike Hatfield had moved to the bag expecting a throw-down by Byron Baker as the runner at first was off and running. Haugen attempted to hit behind the runner and the scratch pop single landed exactly where Hatfield had been.

Wells was the next hitter and he, too, was given a free pass. Then it was Wes Young with a single to center, driving Scott across with the run which was to be the winning tally.

In the fifth, Bill Harper's nine picked up another single, this one by Scott. Again Wells walked, but still two were left on base. In the sixth, Livingston and Wagner hit back-to-back singles with one away, but again the runners were left stranded.

Livingston Checks Hitters
Livingston kept Springfield in check throughout the contest and he too whiffed eight batters while walking two.

The two wins increased the Lockwood win streak to nine games, and the season mark to 14-4. Saturday night, the Lockwood nine meets Albany in a return non-counter and Sunday tackles the Eugene club in another district doubleheader.

MC Rips Eugene As Morrison, Davidson Shine

The Winetrout Ford American junior baseball club proved it could win ball games Wednesday night even when short handed.

The Winetrout nine, with only 11 players on its roster, scored convincing wins over the number three team in the district, Eugene, in a twin - bill at Glendale. The finals were 12-2 and 6-2.

Bill George received top hurling from his two remaining chukkers, Gene Morrison and Wes Davidson. Morrison went the distance in the opener, spacing out five hits. Davidson limited the Eugene club to just three base blows while going the route in the nightcap.

The two recorded 15 strikeouts between them, nine by Morrison and the balance by Davidson. In addition, both moundsmen either came up with timely hits in the two games or became base runners.

MC Club Takes Lead
Winetrout overcame a Eugene one - run lead in the first game in going on to post the win. After Eugene had plated one marker in the third, Winetrout made it a 4-1 ball game in the fourth.

Rod Trask was safe on an error, and advanced to third on Gregg Lindquist's single and a Eugene throwing error. The Winetrout shortstop scored on a passed ball. Morrison followed with a single to give the Myrtle Creek club two baserunners.

Then came the big blow of the evening. Catcher Ed Cearly connected with a single - tripper to center, to give the Winetrout club its three-run lead.

This was extended in the fifth as five more runs came across. Dave Weakley began the inning with a single, and Jack Ball also rapped out a single.

Then Trask walked, Lindquist collected singles and both Weakley and Ball scored. Morrison belted out another single scoring Trask, and Lindquist also scored on a throwing error on the play. Morrison scored the fifth run in the inning on a squeeze, when Bob Cavanaugh bunted.

Eugene picked up another tally in the sixth and Winetrout ended its scoring with three in the bottom of the inning. Dan Denzley was safe on an error and Weakley walked, then Trask gained life on an error with Denzley crossing the plate. Morrison hit to score the baseman and a miscel allowed the other two runs to score.

Eugene Scores First
In the second fray, again the Eugene club scored first, with two runs in the second. Winetrout tied the ball game in its half of the chapter when Lindquist hit a single and Morrison was safe on an error. After Lindquist had moved to third on the boot, he stole home and Morrison went to second on a delayed steal. Then came a walk to Davidson and on an infield throwing error, with Morrison scoring.

Three more markers were posted by Winetrout in the fourth on singles by Morrison and Davidson, two Eugene boots and a passed ball. The Winetrout nine capped off the evening with a single tally in the sixth. Davidson drew a base on balls, was sacrificed to second by Cavanaugh, went to third on an infield out, and scored on Weakley's single.

The doublewin for the Myrtle Creek nine moved them within one game of the Lowell club and fourth place in the district standings. Sunday, the two teams meet at Lowell in a twin - bill and Wednesday, Winetrout Ford and Lockwood Motors lockup in another district doubleheader.
