Nino Whips Carter After Pants Swat

SPOKANE (AP) — Nino Valdes responded to a swat on the pants from his manager with a right to the chin of Harold Carter Wednesday night and jumped right back into the heavyweight title picture.

Valdes, behind on points, got the spank along with stern orders in Spanish from Manager Bobby Gleason to get going in the ninth round. He quickly got the message and laid Carter out cold in 1:40 after dropping him for an eight count seconds before.

Referee Joe August didn't even bother to count as Carter went down on his face and rolled over on his back. He raised Valdes' hand then scrawled "TKO" across his score card.

Thus, it became an official technical knockout at that moment regardless of what Carter did. It developed he did nothing but remain unconscious for another 60 seconds, then wobbled out of the ring.

"He was paralyzed when he hit in his head at the end and he'd have broken his neck if it hadn't been for the apron on the floor," said Dr. William Anderson, ring physician.

The nationally-televised fight, scheduled for 10 rounds, was the second test for the 24-year-old Carter since his discharge last winter from the Army.

He had been slightly favored on the strength of a 10-round decision June 13 over Willi Besmanoff and was ahead on all three official score cards when the end came. There were no other knockdowns.

Warner Leads As PGA 2nd Round Begins

TACOMA (AP) — Fair weather awaited a flock of top golfers who teed off Wednesday for the second round of match play in the 57th annual Pacific Northwest Golf Assn. men's and women's amateur tournament.

Leading the field was the 19-year-old defending champion, Bill Warner of Spokane, who fired a five under par 66 Wednesday to eliminate Doug Adams, Tacoma, 5 and 3.

Warner, who qualified at 151, started a string of six birdies at the second hole and was never headed by Adams, who was one under par.

Another 19-year-old medalist, Charles H. Hunter of Tacoma, shot a two-under 69 to trounce Erv Parent, Seattle's two-time Washington state amateur title, 3 and 2.

Bob Johnson, 18, Tacoma, came through with six birdies as he blasted Dick Price, another former Washington state champion from Longview, out of the tournament, 5 and 3.

Doug McDonald, Renton, defeated Jim Mallory Jr., Spokane at the 21st hole.

Ken Storey, 1934 PGA champ from Seattle, downed Jack Honodel, Bremerton at the 19th, where this year's Washington amateur champion Dick Williams, Seattle, defeated Ron Weber of Prineville, Ore.

John Lynch, Spokane, holed a 6-footer on the 19th to trounce Walt McAlwine, Vancouver, B.C. In women's competition, Edean Anderson of Ilwaco, Seattle, shot a one-under par for the 15 holes needed to defeat Molly Murphy, Portland, and Mrs. Robert Young, Tacoma, ousted Mrs. Bert Sweeting, Tacoma, 7 and 6.

Rigney Forecast Ominous For SF Opponent Teams

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The San Francisco Giants' first start led Manager Bill Rigney to make an early prediction:

"If we're up there at All Star time, look out."

Well, his young team is up there—a mere one-half game out of first place as it starts the second half season.

The Giants, a team nobody figured was going anywhere, play their 78th game tonight against Cincinnati. They'll be going after victory No. 42. Cincinnati, in this first of a two-game set, will be aiming to hand out defeat No. 37.

McCormick To Go
Rigney sends lefty Mike McCormick, a 19-year-old with a 5-1 record, against a Redlegs squad only 3½ games behind first place Milwaukee but in sixth place. Bob Purkey, 8-4, is Manager Birdie Tebbetts' choice to oppose McCormick.

McCormick beat Cincinnati 4-2 on May 20 but lasted only 5 2/3 innings June 28 when the Giants lost to the Redlegs 8-2. He was not charged with the loss then but he did give up seven hits and two runs.

Purkey beat San Francisco with a six-hitter 3-0 June 9. That was his only appearance against the Giants.

The two teams are even at 5 victories each this season.

"Sure, I'm going to play him again," Alston said. "I'm not going to fool around with a winning lineup."

Contracted Land Crop Forbidden, Farmers Warned

Douglas County farmers receiving current acreage reserve payments were warned today no crop may be harvested from contracted land during 1958.

The announcement came from J. F. Bonebrake, chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

"Under the agreement," Bonebrake said, "no crop may be harvested this year and none planted except certain ones to be harvested in 1959 or later, as approved by the State ASC Committee."

Farmers receiving payments have a responsibility under the acreage reserve agreement until the end of the 1958 calendar year, the chairman explained.

Those who willfully and knowingly violate any of the terms may be required to return his payment and also is subject to a civil penalty of 50 per cent of the amount of the payment, Bonebrake said.

CANTON, Ohio (AP) — Antique car enthusiasts need no longer snoop through rural garages for old models. They can buy them fresh off the assembly line.

Dyer Products Co. of Canton is producing an almost exact replica of the Surrey — a horseless carriage that was all the rage in 1903. It comes complete with a tiller instead of a steering wheel, polished brass headlights, bulb horn and spoke wheels.

A 4.8-horsepower motor can propel the Surrey at a top speed of 35 m.p.h.

The list price is \$1,095, or \$895 for the assemble-it-yourself addict.
