62 Die In Korean Flood; \$8 Million In Damage

SEOUL (AP) — The national police said torrential rains which finally ended today caused the death of 62 persons in South Korea and did damage estimated at more than eight million dollars.

Ten persons were missing and 6,600 homeless. The damage included 933 homes destroyed, 6,238 houses flooded or wrecked, 54 ships sunk or missing and 236 highway bridges damaged.

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WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department expressed shock Wednesday over what it called inhumane attacks by Soviet jet fighters which forced down a U.S. Air Force transport 12 days ago.

At the same time the department made public a note to Russia accusing East German authorities of seeking to "extort some form of advantage" by holding nine American soldiers. The note was aboard a helicopter which lost its way and crossed into Communist territory June 7.

The note to Moscow demanded "immediate release" of the men.

In regard to the plane downed by Soviet fighters, a State Department spokesman said a decision will be made soon about what further action to take in the case.

The nine crewmen, who have now been freed, reported on their return to Wiesbaden, Germany, that Soviet MIGs shot down their plane in flames after it wandered across the border from Iran into Soviet Armenia.

Press officer Lincoln White said the department is now collecting and studying all facts involved in the incident, including testimony from the Americans.

"In the meantime, however," he said, "the department shares the shock which all Americans have felt at the revelation of the inhumane attacks made upon this unarmed plane."

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The usual regional reports were unavailable.

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Douglas And Coos Heard At Session On Tax Structure

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Supreme Court Wednesday ordered a new trial in a case in which a seaman had been awarded \$8,000 for injuries suffered when he boarded a ship in Crescent City, Calif.

The seaman, Wallace Hugh Allen, was assistant engineer on a ship operated by Oceanside Lumber Co. He sued the company in Multnomah County circuit court.

Allen boarded the ship one night, having to jump from the pier to the ship because there was no gangplank. He fell against a mooring bit and suffered back injuries.

Allen contended the ship operators were negligent because there was no gangplank. The circuit court jury agreed, and awarded the \$8,000 damages.

The company argued, however, that it couldn't use a gangplank because of the rise and fall of the tide.

The high court ruled that Circuit Judge James R. Bain committed an error when he instructed the jury not to consider the company's argument.

The opinion was by Justice George Rossman.

In another case, the Supreme Court upheld an \$18,000 Yamhill County verdict in favor of Mrs. Winifred Lohi, whose husband was killed when the tractor he was driving was struck by an automobile.

The verdict was against William Niemi, driver of the car.

The opinion, by Justice Harold Warner, upheld Circuit Judge Arlie G. Walker, McMinnville.
