Odd, Apparently Dangerous Form Of Electricity Found In Cancer By British Group

LONDON (AP) — British scientists have found a curious and apparently dangerous electricity in cancer.

The healthy cells stick together and don't go wandering off. But cancer cells seem to develop strong negative electric charges. This could make them repel other cells, so they move about freely and spread to start cancers elsewhere in the body.

This electrical action was described in a report today to the seventh International Cancer Congress by E. J. Ambrose and G. Easty of the Chester Beatty Research Institute in London. They have been studying cells growing in tissue culture. The cells are kept alive and growing in glass tubes or plates. The cancer cells gained increasingly strong negative charges as a tumor developed and as it became more invasive or able to spread, the scientists said. The negative charge became stronger than that of healthy cells. The cancer cells could be made to stick together by adding certain chemicals which carry a positive electric charge.

The research is helping to explain the chemical nature of changes taking place on the surface of cancer cells. It might even prove

useful as a method someday of stopping the spread of cancers.

Some Benefits Shown
Among other reports to today's session of the cancer congress: The experimental antibiotic Actinomycin D produced a slight but definite improvement in about a fifth of 54 patients with various forms of cancer. The benefits were temporary, reported Doctors C. T. C. Tan and Joseph H. Burchenal of the Sloan-Kettering Institute in New York.

Mitomycin C, an antibiotic discovered in Japan, and several other drugs can cure leukemia in mice which is caused by virus, Sloan-Kettering Doctors Kanematsu Sigura and C. Chester Stock said. The drug is not yet available for human use.

Mice that fight with a defense against leukemia. This happens in a strain of mice susceptible to this blood cancer. Females ordinarily die when they are 270 days old and the males when 305 days old.

The males of this strain fight but if kept from fighting they die as early as the females. Those males allowed to fight live two months longer on an average.

Fighting perhaps stimulates the adrenal gland and the production of adrenalin, according to Dr. Paul Leonard of the University of Montreal.

Eisenhower's Brother To Visit Central America

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower's delayed good will visit to Central America will begin Saturday.

The White House gave out that word last night after Dr. Eisenhower, brother of the President, returned by military plane from a two-week fishing trip in Wisconsin. Pentagon officials were unavailable for comment on Eisenhower's use of two small military planes in returning his party from Wisconsin's Lake Okauchee region to Wausau, Wis., and a military Air Transport Service Convair for the flight to Washington.

The White House wouldn't elaborate beyond saying the trip was advanced in date and Dr. Eisenhower returned to make preliminary arrangements.

This conforms with reports Monday that Eisenhower would begin the trip July 12. Earlier reports had it he would leave Washington July 15 on the six-nation tour.

Eisenhower, president of Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, originally planned to leave in mid-June but the tour was postponed after Vice President Nixon encountered anti-American riots in Latin America. The State Department, however, said the reason for the postponement was difficulty in scheduling convenient conference dates for the Eisenhower mission.

In Chicago, a 5th Army spokesman said the request for the aircraft used by Milton Eisenhower came from a White House military aide.

On his tour Eisenhower will head a study delegation that will confer with Central American officials about economic development and other problems. He is expected to visit Nicaragua, Guatemala, Costa Rica, Honduras, El Salvador and Panama.

Fireworks Regulations Sought Of Legislature
PORTLAND (AP) — The Oregon Legislature's counsel has been asked to draft legislation to regulate manufacture and storage of fireworks.

State Rep. Fred Meek, Portland, made the request. He said the measure would provide for isolation of buildings in which explosives are manufactured or stored, limit the size of such buildings and amounts stored in each unit, and require secondary, concussion walls.

An explosion of a Portland fireworks warehouse last week killed a 4-year-old girl in a nearby house and caused widespread damage.

\$3.50 DEBT SLAYING
