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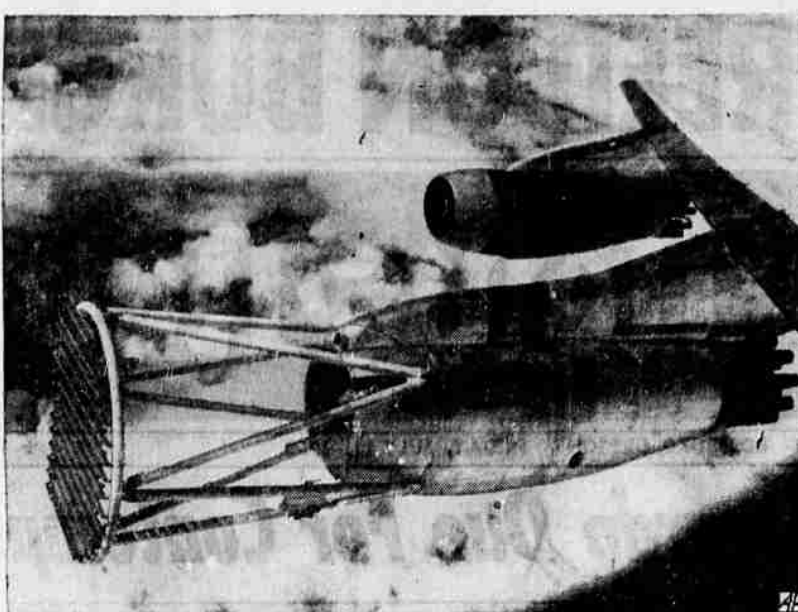

### New Interstate Highway Terminal Will Be Portland

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Al Ullman (D-Ore) has received word that a new interstate highway designated as Highway 80-N will cross Eastern Oregon and terminate in Portland.

Ullman said he had been advised of the new routing by the American Assn. of State Highway Officials.

The designation and routing of 80-N follows reconsideration by the association of an original plan which would have linked Oregon by a feeder route rather than by a main artery in the interstate system.

Ullman said the group now plans to have Highway 80 run from New York to San Francisco, with 80-S turning south near Big Springs, Neb., and ending at Denver. The new highway 80-N is scheduled to junction north from Echo Junction, Utah, and continue into Portland through Baker, La Grande, Pendleton, The Dalles and Hood River, Ore.

The original branch line proposal had been vigorously protested by both Ullman and the Oregon Highway Commission.

### Douglas Officials Speak At Hearing

SALEM (AP) — Douglas and Coos county taxing officials appeared Wednesday at the state Tax Commission resumed its hearings in the timber valuation controversy.

The controversy centers about timber valuations fixed by the Tax Commission. Some of these were changed by county assessors and county boards of equalization.

In Coos County, the board of equalization accepted the commission valuations and 20-year depletion factor in computing taxes on timber.

This action was taken after the assessor reduced them on grounds that the Tax Commission valuations and depletion factor penalized Weyerhaeuser Timber Co., and benefited Georgia-Pacific Co.

The assessor, C. G. Caughell, told the commission that these benefits and penalties result from the fact that Weyerhaeuser is logging slowly on a long-term basis, while Georgia-Pacific is logging at a rapid rate.

The assessor said he had wanted to change the depletion factor to 15 years for Georgia-Pacific and 40 years for Weyerhaeuser, but the board of equalization reversed his plan, going for the 20-year figure set by the commission.

In Douglas County, the assessor accepted the Tax Commission figures, but the county board of equalization reduced them.

Members of the Tax Commission spent much of the hearing time in asking technical questions.

### Three Miners Killed On Extra Day's Work

SOPHA, W. Va. (AP) — The bodies of three workmen were recovered from a southern West Virginia coal mine Thursday after an explosion.

The men had interrupted their vacation for what they thought would be a single day's work at the Slab Fork Coal Co. No. 1 mine. Deep inside the mine, they were killed by a sudden gas explosion.

Sam Sawyers, 54, was the father of 12 children. He and Walter Moore, 38, lived at Slab Fork. Herbert Cline, 42-year-old night foreman from Maxwell Hill had six children.

### Drain Sewage Work Approved For Federal Aid

Drain City Recorder Vern Thomas reported to the Drain City Council this week that approval by a federal auditor has assured the first payment to the city's sewage work from the \$4,100 federal aid grant.

Thomas said further money will be received from the fund as work progresses. Deep ditching is expected to be completed this week as work progressed to the vicinity of the high school, reported Correspondent Edith Bush.

Information concerning the electrical power history of Drain was read to councilmen. The date, furnished by the Bonneville Power Administration, will be used in the American League of Cities competition.

The report noted that Drain has operated a municipal light department since 1914, purchasing power originally from California Oregon Power Co. First Bonneville Power Administration service began April 1, 1911 by transfer over a 33,000 volt line from Eugene for service to Drain and Douglas Cooperative was energized May 19, 1946. Arrangements also were made at that time to tap Copco's line and build a short line to Drain.

The increase of use of power in the Drain area is indicated by a jump in annual maximum demand from 75 kilowatts to 3,800 kilowatts between 1938 and 1957, said the Bonneville report.

Thomas reported 200 water meters have been installed and 205 are still to be installed. Cost of purchasing and placing was announced at \$6,000. Councilmen agreed to complete installation as soon as possible to conserve water and increase revenue.

The recorder also reported that the city water supply is being up well, but that water regulations still are in effect.

A request for permission to move Dee's Tavern from its present location on 1st St. near B St. to the Buehler Building was granted. The Buehler Building formerly was occupied by Dr. Edwin A. Mickel. Permission still must be granted by the state board before the tavern move can be completed.

### O'Connell To Be Named To Succeed Himself

PORTLAND (AP) — A convention will be held to nominate Oregon Supreme Court Justice Kenneth J. O'Connell to succeed himself at the November election, John R. Hay said Thursday.

O'Connell was appointed to the court too late for his name to be placed on the ballot other than by a convention of 250 persons or a petition with 22,078 signatures.

Hay, a Portland attorney, said the convention will be held here July 21.

Another candidate, Lester Humphreys, Portland, announced he plans to circulate petitions, but said he also may have a nominating convention.

### Jobless Pay Claims Will Be Open Monday

SALEM (AP) — The state Unemployment Compensation Commission will begin accepting claims Monday for extended benefits for unemployed veterans of the Korean War and jobless former federal employees.

The extended benefits will be paid only if those persons exhausted their jobless benefit rights in the past year.

John A. Norton, commission administrator, said that there are 2,500 potential claimants under the new program, but that many of them already have returned to work.

### Harbor Plywood Dividend Fixed; Stock Value Up

ABERDEEN (AP) — A quarterly dividend of 10 cents per share, payable in December, was declared Thursday by directors of the Harbor Plywood Corp.

Company stock has gone up on the market in recent weeks and closed Wednesday at 19 1/2 after reaching a high of 21 1/2.

To a query by stockholders, Martin N. Deggeler, corporation president, said there was no apparent cause for the sudden climb. There have been no changes in the physical plant or future plans of the company, he said.

Assets have jumped, however, from just over 19 million dollars last year to \$33,988,695 in 1958. During the year Harbor Plywood liquidated its Lewis River timber holdings for 17 million dollars.

Jack Strause of San Francisco, identifying himself as a substantial stockholder, moved that the corporation be liquidated and the assets distributed. Deggeler said the directors would vote "no" to any such proposal.

The dividend was made payable Dec. 5 to stockholders of record Aug. 22.

### FOREIGN NEWS BRIEFS

**Amanian News**  
A Jordan army patrol has intercepted a camel caravan loaded with arms and explosives apparently coming from Egyptian-controlled Sinai or Gaza. A Jordan military spokesman announced Friday five men were arrested and five camels seized.

**NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)** — Two bombs exploded in central Nicosia Friday after six persons were killed in violence between Greek and Turkish Cypriots over this British island's future. Five Greeks were killed Thursday and a Turk died of bomb injuries.

**MOSCOW (AP)** — Izvestia asserted Friday President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles got a cold reception in Canada. The government newspaper said this was because "of imperialistic policies of the complete subjugation of the weak in the interest of the strong."

### Actress Sues Trujillo For Toss Into Pond

SAN PEDRO, Calif. (AP) — Attorneys for Gen. Rafael Trujillo Jr. have accepted a summons for the General in a Hollywood actress' damage suit.

Lyn Heburn sued the Dominican Republic's visiting playboy for \$10,000, charging two of his friends dumped her fully clothed into the swimming pool of his rented mansion.

### Disappointed Vodka Seeker Burns \$500,000

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A detective says Lawrence Nutter, 23, stole a case of negotiable American Express checks worth \$500,000 and threw them away — because they weren't vodka.

Detective Vincent Heenev told this story Thursday at a hearing. Nutter took three cases from the Railway Express Agency June 26 because he thought they contained vodka.

The first case he opened was filled with vodka, which he and a friend, William McCall, 28, sampled. Later McCall opened a second case.

"Take that stuff out of here. I don't want it," McCall told Nutter after rifling through the checks. Nutter obediently burned them in a city incinerator.

Magistrate J. Amos Harris held Nutter on \$500 bail for trial.
