Rodeo Veteran Likes Douglas As New Home

An attraction to scenic and other aspects of the Lookingglass Valley has added a veteran rodeo and fair performer to the list of transplanted Douglas County residents.

Joe Young, an ex-Idahoan who moved to Lookingglass in February, says he and his wife figuratively "fell in love" with the area when they passed through en route home from a California appearance. They formerly resided in Caldwell, Idaho.

Young, along with his "educated" horse, Star Dust, has appeared in rodeos and fairs from Canada to Texas during the past decade. Included were two appearances at the big Pendleton Roundup in Eastern Oregon.

The lanky, 36-year-old horse trainer said he began training Star Dust in 1946, after his return from Army duty in Europe. He had released Star Dust on a big Oregon ranch before he entered the service, and the horse ran wild for nearly five years before he was recaptured.

Horse To Be Retired
Young plans to retire Star Dust, who is 17 years old, in the near future. He is training a young palomino named Sunset to take the place of the veteran equine performer.

For three years prior to World War II, Young put another horse, Rambler, through his trick paces at various rodeos.

The soft-spoken Idahoan and his horse will perform at rodeos in Sonora and Plymouth, Calif., later this year. He said he did not book a full slate of appearances this season because he and his wife, Doris, still are in the process of settling into their new surroundings.

But his plans call for a full schedule next year, possibly with Sunset as his partner.

Young is a rodeo competitor as well as a featured performer. Formerly a top-notch bareback rider, he now restricts his competitive activities to calf roping.

Plywood Job Taken
Now employed at U.S. Plywood Co., he doubles as a professional horse trainer. Mrs. Young is a nurse at Roseburg Veterans Hospital.

He also lists past experience as an accountant with an oil firm in Idaho. He gained training in that field at Boise Junior College following his war service.

Young, satisfied with his present location, isn't planning on moving elsewhere. He and his wife plan to purchase the property where they live and become permanent Douglas County residents.

Chinook Salmon \$1.50 Per Pound In Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — Retail prices on large Chinook salmon have hit a record high here, the Oregon Seafoods Dealers Assn. reported Thursday.

The ocean-fished fish are selling for \$1.50, a spokesman for the group said. A short supply locally and heavy Eastern market demands are credited as the cause of the price increase.

The Seattle fisherman's exchange reported a near-record price of 84 cents on sales to brokers Wednesday. That was 8 cents higher than Tuesday's price.

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
