PORTLAND (AP) — The top seeded doubles team—Sam Lee and Emory Neale of Portland—advanced in the Oregon State tennis tournament by downing Ray Meyers of Salem and Cecil Conner of Tacoma 6-1, 6-1 Thursday.

Other favored teams also advanced. Second-seeded Bill Rose and Clyde Know of Portland overcame Leroy Gilbert, Santa Barbara, Calif., and George Conway, Los Angeles, 6-2, 6-4.

Glenn Bassett and Robert Sherman of Los Angeles, who are third seeded, eliminated Robert Brown and Ed Wofford, Portland, 6-1, 6-1.

Good Managers Even Up, Says Cleveland's Lane

NEW YORK (AP) — Frank Lane, Cleveland Indians' general manager who has quite a reputation for trading ballplayers and second guessing managers, finally has admitted he thinks all good managers are about even.

Lane, who came here with the Indians after the All-Star Game, was sadly discussing some repercussions of his firing Bobby Bragan as the club's manager last month.

He was said mainly because a writer had asked a few questions about specific incidents leading up to Bragan's dismissal and Lane's frank replies, when they appeared in print, made Bobby look bad as a manager and Lane look extremely critical.

It was, in fact, only the second time in Lane's 11 seasons as general manager of three major league clubs that he had dropped a manager in midseason.

Cause: 'Little Things'
"When they asked me the reason at the time I let Bobby out, I said it wasn't any one thing but a lot of little things," Lane said. "It still is a lot of little things and there's no purpose in reshaping them now."

"The truth is I think most good managers are about on a par. Al Lopez could win with the Yankees the same as Casey Stengel. It's the ones who aren't quite so good who have trouble."

That indicated Lane apparently classified Bragan as one not quite so good and the general manager confirmed it by mentioning Bobby's "immaturity of thinking" and his handling of players.

Sees Bragan Comeback
"I think Bragan probably will come back as a big league manager," he said. "He probably learned something from his experiences here and at Pittsburgh. He has a good baseball future ahead."

Lane thought it over a moment longer then added: "They say Bragan did as good a job as he could under the conditions and with the players he had. I think he didn't do the job he is capable of doing. The truth is we have a pretty good ball club and when Herb Score gets back it will be settled."

Porterfield New State Pro Champ

REDMOND (AP) — The new Oregon Professional Golf Assn. match play champion is Walter "Boots" Porterfield, 31, Grants Pass, who four years ago won the Wisconsin Open.

He defeated Bob Gasper, Cottage Grove, 7 and 5, in the final of the annual OPGA tournament here Thursday.

Porterfield, playing soundly and steadily, cashed in on poor chipping and putting by Gasper to take a six-up lead at the end of the first nine holes.

He was eight up after the 21st. Gasper came back to take the 22nd and 24th holes.

After the golfers had halved the 26th and 27th holes with birdies, Porterfield added birdies on the 30th and 31st to end the 6-hour contest, which was played in above-90-degree temperatures.

"I'm tired," said Porterfield. "This is the toughest grind I have ever faced."

The new champion said time he spent as a touring professional helped him.

"You learn on the tour," he said, "not to worry if you waste or make a bad shot."

Neither was a problem for him Thursday, anyway.

The victory was worth \$360 to Porterfield. Gasper collected \$240.

U. S. Airmen Get Bad Treatment Following Crash

WIESBADEN, Germany (AP) — Soviet civilians threatened to hang one of nine U.S. airmen shot down in Soviet Armenia and roughed up others, a U.S. Air Force colonel said Thursday.

Col. Dale B. Brannon of Chardon, Ohio, senior officer aboard the unarmed transport plane downed in flames June 27, said Maj. Benjie A. Shupe of Miami, Fla., narrowly missed being lynched.

The rope was attached to a telephone pole and the nose was being placed over his head when he managed to convey to them the fact that he was an American. Brannon told a crowded news conference.

"The group (of Russian civilians) then paused for a discussion. It was at this time that the Soviet military police arrived and took him into custody."

Brannon said five of the nine airmen aboard the transport received rough treatment from the local population after they bailed out of the burning plane.

My hands were tied behind my back and I was beaten in the face by fists and later kicked in the body when placed aboard a truck for transport to the local village," Brannon said.

The four crewmen who landed with the plane and were picked up by Soviet soldiers were not molested, he said.

The abuse by Russian civilians of the other five stopped as soon as they were turned over to Soviet authorities, he said.

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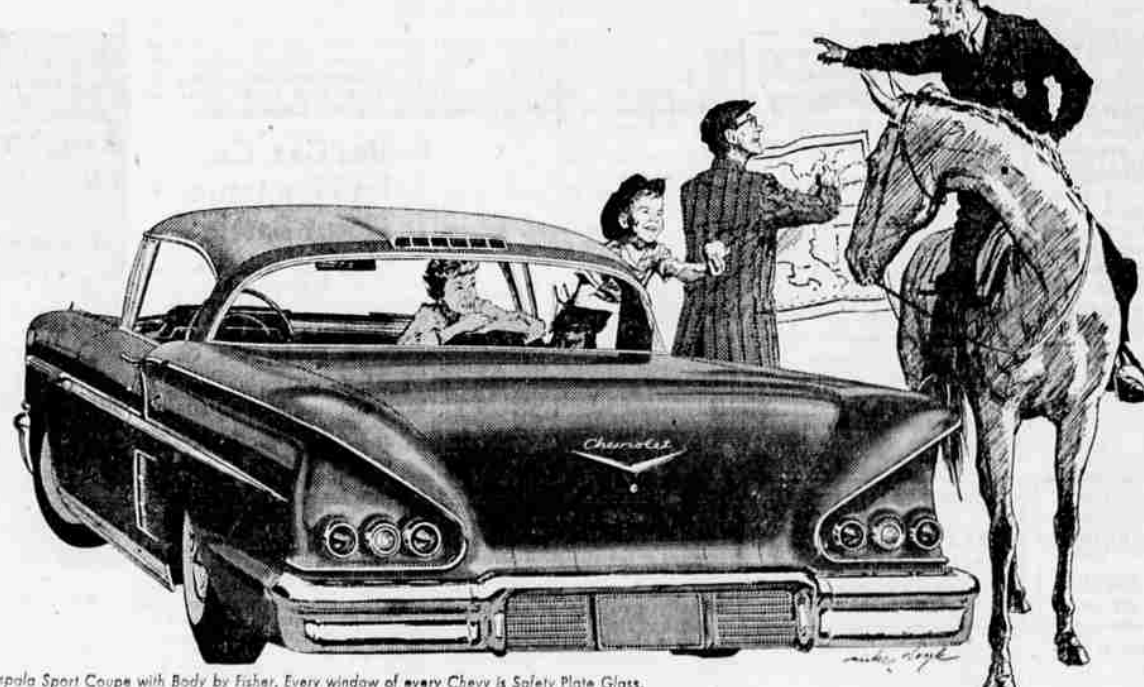


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
