Farm Products Surplus Costing U. S. Huge Sum

WASHINGTON (AP) — Uncle Sam is taking a 30-cent loss on every dollar's worth of surplus farm products disposed of under its various sales and donation programs.

The Commodity Credit Corp. reported Friday that surpluses disposed of during the 11-month period ending May 31 had cost it \$3,094,000,000 under price support and other farm aid programs.

It got \$2,200,400,000 from these products under the disposal program. This was a return of about 70 cents on the dollar cost.

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Robeson Given Hero's Welcome By Londoners

LONDON (AP) — U. S. singer Paul Robeson got a hero's welcome in Britain Friday on his first visit out of the United States after eight years without an American passport.

The 60-year-old Negro was greeted by a cheering mob of diplomats, stage folk, artistic types and just ordinary people upon his arrival at London Airport with his wife.

"This is a great international event," he was told by Viscount Stansgate, 81-year-old Laborite peer.

Another greeter was Dr. Cheddi Jagan, left-wing minister of trade in Colonial British Guiana, who said, "I'm here as a friend, not a politician."

Robeson, spruce in a speckled gray suit and gleaming white tie, entertained newsmen and well-wishers with snatches of "Water Boy," "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot," and "Over the Mountains" as television and film cameras rolled in a flood-lighted reception room.

U.S. Rights Regained

Robeson had been unable to leave the United States since the government withdrew his passport in 1950 because he declined to sign a non-Communist affidavit required by the State Department. This requirement was knocked out by a recent Supreme Court decision.

"A wonderful thing has happened," Robeson told the newsmen. "I have won the struggle in my own country to regain my rights."

"Do you regret any of your past actions?" a reporter asked.

"I did what I thought was right," Robeson replied.

"What happened was unfortunate but it is all a past chapter now."

He said it was "great to be back in England, and I hope to come back many more times."

"Do you plan to stay in England?" he was asked.

"I don't know what you mean by staying," the singer said.

"I'm an American."

"Do you intend to go back?"

"I certainly do."

Timber Tax Bill Reconsideration Will Be Asked

PORTLAND (AP) — A legislative subcommittee has recommended reconsideration of a bill for taxing Oregon timberlands.

The subcommittee on timber and natural resources of the Legislative Interim Committee on Taxation voted Friday to recommend resubmission of House Bill 821 of the 1957 session. The measure would change the timber tax formula.

Under the bill, timber would be taxed by smaller areas within the county rather than by the county as a whole area.

Rep. Clarence Barton, Coquille, chairman of the subcommittee, said the present method of taxation is not equitable for all timber land owners. He said that under the county area plan, timberlands in his county (Coos) are taxed on a 20-year cutting cycle basis although one major company operates on a 44- and another on an 11-year cycle.

The subcommittee recommendation to resubmit the 1957 bill will go to the full taxation committee for discussion at its meeting in Medford August 16.
