Nine Years' Care, Schooling In U. S. Transforms Former Korean Waif Into Scholar

QUINCY, Ill. (AP) — It's hard to believe that nine years ago Joseph Anthony was a ragged, dirty, hungry boy of the streets in Seoul, Korea.

Today, at 18, he's a pleasant, scholarly young man, preparing to take his oath of U. S. citizenship and to enter Quincy College in the fall.

"Oh, I'd have become a full-fledged citizen long ago," he said. "But the law requires that an immigrant reside in this wonderful

country five years before he may be naturalized — and that is wise."

Joe was a hard-bitten, veteran ragsman when he encountered American soldiers and fell in love with the United States at the outbreak of the Korean War.

His American dream began with kindness of an Army sergeant who fed him, and was nurtured by the good will he found everywhere doing odd jobs for soldiers and airmen. GIs translated his name from Shu to Joe, or, more often, Little Joe.

An Air Force colonel smuggled him to Japan, where a chaplain, the Rev. Donald Werr, took charge of his fortunes. Father Werr, now assistant to the president of Quincy College, gave Joe his last name — in honor of St. Anthony, patron of lost objects. He prepared Joe for coming to the United States, and hundreds of servicemen helped.

Today, Father Werr is Joe's legal guardian.

Teen-Ager Picked For 'Ideal Camp'

The institute, celebrating the Church of the Nazarene's golden anniversary, starts Tuesday and will continue through next Monday. It will draw some 750 delegates from several foreign countries and American possessions.

The Roseburg High School senior was selected on the basis of contributions to school, community and church. She was placed in the top band of the Oregon Pacific District. Eight church youths were selected to attend what is designed to be the "ideal young people's camp."

Roseburg was doubly honored in selections for the camp in that Miss Reeder will be accompanied by the Rev. and Mrs. Robert Hemmel of the local church. They and one other couple in the district were named as chaperones for the camp.

Sutherlin Boy Wins 2nd Spot

Tommy Kirkpatrick of Sutherlin placed second in a solo trombone contest held at the High School band summer session conducted by the University of Oregon School of Music.

He was among 10 high school students from Sutherlin and Roseburg to attend the session.

The session lasted two weeks and was climaxed by a concert.

Ten lovely and talented girls will compete for the title of Miss Oregon for 1958 at the 12th annual pageant at Seaside July 25, 26 and 27.

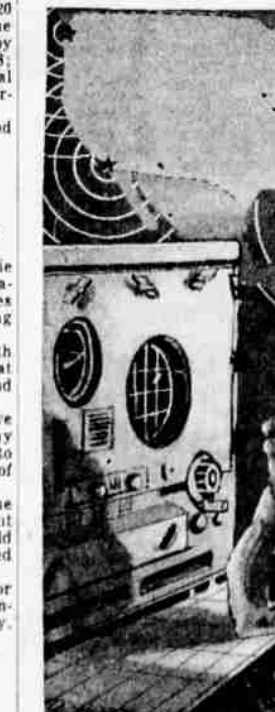
Roseburg, whose candidate Judy Hensley last year missed the title of Miss Oregon by a controversial whisker, will not have a candidate.

Douglas Grad Wins Church Scholarship

Low-Cost Housing At OSC Reported

OREGON STATE COLLEGE — Women students planning to attend Oregon State college this fall have been reminded of opportunities for low-cost housing in the four campus cooperative houses, where students trim expenses by sharing house duties.

Some 15 openings are still available for fall, according to Miss Mary Robinson, assistant dean of women.

Room and board costs in the cooperative houses come to \$405 a year, \$200 less than dormitory charges, Miss Robinson pointed out.

Each coed has a daily household assignment, including helping with meal preparation and serving or cleaning. This duty usually takes no more than 20 minutes a day, however, and is planned according to the student's class schedule. Miss Robinson noted.

Sharon Lyons One Of Dozen

The first week will be spent in training the young people and will be held at Iona Camp on the California Coast; the second week in leadership in the day camping program at Cameron House; the third week will be devoted to participation with the Cameron House senior high group in a work project and discussion seminars.

The purpose of these nationally sponsored experimental projects is to provide background experience, evaluation and information for the development of the senior high summer program. Each participating young person could apply only with the approval of his or her pastor and session.

Sharon became interested in this project while attending national assembly last year. She and others visited several mission stations throughout the Southwest where projects such as this one are carried on.

Full Year Terms Proposed To Meet Cost Of Schools

CHENEY, Wash. (AP) — Year-around operation of schools as an answer to increased population and rising costs in Washington state has been proposed here by a federal education official.

Dr. Walter H. Gaumnitz, head of the rural research unit of the United States office of Education, also urged small school systems to reorganize the usual eight elementary grades and four high school to six elementary and six junior high grades.

That would achieve better balance in the system, he told a state conference on problems of small high schools.

Following graduation, the three will be eligible for appointments as second lieutenants in the Air Force Reserve and for entry into flight training to win the coveted silver wings of an Air Force pilot or aerial observer.

Meanwhile, David Ralph Kinrade, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph E. Kinrade of Riddle, is attending the sixth United States Army ROTC camp at Fort Lewis, Wash. Attendance at the camp provides practical field work as a supplement to classroom instruction conducted during the academic school year. He is a junior at the University of Oregon.

National 4-H Group Reports On Its 36th Year Of Service

The only organization of its kind in the nation has completed 36 years of service to some two million boys and girls enrolled in more than 90 thousand 4-H Clubs throughout the 48 states, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico, according to the 1957 annual report just released.

This unique non-profit agency is the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work with headquarters in Chicago. President Dwight D. Eisenhower is honorary chairman. Up until May 1 of this year, the committee has been headed by Guy L. Noble, one of the founders who is now retired. His successor is Norman C. Mendum, former director of the National 4-H Club Foundation. Kenneth H. Anderson is associate director.

Assists In Work

The committee's principal function is to assist in functioning 4-H Club work through cooperation with state and federal extension services of the USDA. Over the years it has obtained financial support of business and philanthropic interests.

The report also points out that the committee produced and supervised the last fiscal year an all-time high of \$900,000 was dispersed by the committee, the report announces. A total of \$123,782 was used for training 15,851 adult 4-H leaders. College fellowships and scholarships totaling around \$83,000, plus over a thousand expense-paid trips to the annual 4-H Club Congress in Chicago were awarded to state and national champions.

In addition, the committee publishes a monthly 4-H Club magazine, and maintains an information department which handles 4-H publicity on a nationwide basis. Through the mail order supply service, the Committee sells some 800 different 4-H items to club members.

A 12-member board of directors backed by 19 official members of the Committee are responsible for the corporate affairs. These are public spirited citizens who volunteer their time and talents. Besides the director and associate director, the Committee has on its staff 14 professional men and women assigned to specific jobs. Total employees number around 50.

Teen-Agers Eye Aid From YMCA

A group of teen-agers is making plans to ask the YMCA to back a program of summer recreation resembling the idea of the now-defunct Roseburg Youth Center.

Twenty-two youths met last week and selected a committee to meet with the 'Y' board of directors to discuss the matter. The decision came after each of the youths outlined what they had been doing during the summer and expressed a need for such a recreation program.

The operation: "Good luck with your operation. All the Tigers are pulling for you, Billy Martin."

It was the first telegram Carolyn ever got. She was a little skeptical when she was a University Hospital nurse handed it to her. She hesitated opening it. But when she did, out came a big grin: "Wow!"

After that she knew she was "gonna pull through."

You see, Carolyn is a member of the Detroit Tiger fan club. She thinks Detroit shortstop Billy Martin is "the greatest."

She has another baseball love too. It is her neighborhood club and as she prepared for today's long ordeal she was happy it had promised to let her play at least one game "when this valve thing is fixed."

Carolyn was born with a pulmonary valve fault. The valve through which the heart pumps blood to the lungs fails to open completely, forcing a heavy strain on her heart.

Specialists decided an operation was necessary to prevent dangerous permanent damage. A mechanical heart will take over during the operation.
