Salt Lake City, after dropping four straight to the Portland Beavers, snapped back to win doubleheader from their tormentors Sunday, 4-3 and 7-4.

Portland remained in fifth place, but fell five games behind the fourth-placed Salt Lake team.

In other games Phoenix downed Spokane, 8-0; Seattle won from Sacramento 10-9 before losing 1-0; and San Diego downed Vancouver 4-3 before losing 7-3.

The San Diego nightcap marked the first Pacific Coast League start for Bob Lemon since his release by Cleveland, but he suffered the loss. Despite that, San Diego remained a half-game in front of Phoenix.

Pitching one-hit ball until the sixth frame, the 38-year-old Lemon had a 3-1 lead. He was relieved in that inning by Dick Brodowski after Barry Shetrone and Joe Durham singled and Joe Frazier lined to right to score Shetrone.

The Padres started the opener with two tallies in the first inning and Earl Averill singled in two more in the eighth on a walk and a double. Joe Durham clouted a two-run homer in the ninth for Vancouver. San Diego took the series 5-2.

Joe Christopher's run-scoring single in the fifth of the seven-inning opener gave the Bees their victory over Portland, which had scored its first two runs in the fourth inning.

Salt Lake collected 11 hits off the Beavers in the nightcap that saw Dick Barone and Jim McDaniel score solo homers for the Lakers. The series went to the Beavers, 4-3.

Seattle picked up nine unearned runs on five Sacramento errors in the first contest and then grabbed their decisive 10th rally in the eighth when Jack Bloomfield scored on a double after he walked and went to second on a wild pitch.

Sacramento picked up four tallies in the second frame and four more in the ninth on an error, a walk and four singles.

Dom Zanni won his 10th of the season with his five-hit shutout over Spokane. Dusty Rhodes hit his 20th homer of the season for Phoenix in the first inning, driving home Andre Rodgers, who had just doubled.

Phoenix scored a run each in the second and third and three more in the fifth inning on a single, a double and a triple.

In tonight's (Monday) only league action, Ted Wietand (4-8) is scheduled to go for Seattle against Sacramento's Carl Greene (4-7) at Sacramento.

San Franciscan Clips Rose For Tennis Crown

PORTLAND (AP) — Jim Watson, 19-year-old San Franciscan who was seeded seventh when the tournament began, upset defending champion Bill Rose of Portland Sunday to win the men's singles championship of the Oregon state tennis tournament.

Watson, whose play improved steadily as the tourney progressed, needed four sets to turn back the more experienced Portlander, 6-4, 6-5, 4-6, 6-3.

The women's singles title went to Barbara Browning, Los Angeles youngster, who defeated Farel Footman, San Francisco, 6-3, 3-6, 6-1.

The men's doubles championship went to Glenn Bassett and Bob Sherman, both of Los Angeles, who defeated Doyle Perkins, Seattle, and Jim Jackson, Klamath Falls, 6-3, 10-8, 6-4.

Miss Browning and Pamela Davis, Los Angeles, downed Linda Yeomans and Susan Proctor, both of Los Angeles, 6-3, 6-8, 6-1, for the women's doubles title. The Browning-Davis team also won the junior women's doubles from the Yeomans-Proctor duo, 1-6, 6-3, 6-2.

Miss Footman captured the junior women's singles by downing Miss Davis, 6-2, 6-1.

Yoshi Minegishi, Berkeley, Calif., defeated George Conway, Los Angeles, 6-4, 6-4, 6-3, for the junior men's singles championship.

Jim McManus of Berkeley teamed with Minegishi to win the junior men's doubles, defeating Clyde Witt, Berkeley, and Gene Paradzinski, Sacramento, 6-2, 6-3, 6-1.

Reed Witt, Berkeley, won the boys' singles title with a 6-1, 6-1 decision over John Fraser, Victoria, B.C.

The girls' singles championship went to Joyce Yee, Seattle, who defeated Vicki Berner, Vancouver, B.C., 6-2, 6-3.

TACOMA (AP) — The men's team title of the fourth annual Pacific Northwest AAU open swimming championships Saturday went to the Portland Aero Club which collected 97 points.

The women's team championship was won by the Washington Athletic Club of Seattle with 113 points.

The Tacoma Swim Club took second place in the men's division with 85½ points and the No. 3 spot was won by the Vancouver, B.C. Amateur Swim Club with 82½ points.

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Roy Harris' Home Described As Haven For Razorbacks, Hounds

CUT AND SHOOT, Tex. (AP) — Honest, boss, there is such a place. No post office. No name on the map. Just a "community" of 195 on the edge of the "big thicket." And they're not kidding about that ticket.

Roy Harris the schoolteacher who is challenging Floyd Patterson for the world heavyweight boxing title Aug. 18 at Los Angeles, lives here with members of the Harris clan. The place is overrun with razorback hogs, stray cattle, chickens and lonesome hound dogs.

When you speak of the Harris home, you really are talking about two or three homes. Henry, that's Roy's father, lives with his wife and five of the eight children in a unique double house. It's a log cabin with a frame house dragged up next to it and doors cut in between.

The third house belongs to Roy and his wife. It is only about 100 yards away but it is the difference between Abe Lincoln's cabin and a neat suburban home. Roy lives in a white frame house with a TV aerial slanting off the roof and a Cadillac (1951) model parked out front.

The population of Cut and Shoot shot up to about 2,000 yesterday when Roy boxed two rounds in the home-made outdoor gym that is connected to the tin-roofed Henry Harris home by a string of colored lights.

They didn't know it but this was Roy's last training session at home. Lou Viscusi, who advises Pop Harris, moved the fighter to Camp Holden, about 21 miles from Houston.

Tribe Takes 2 Padres, Options Carroll Hardy

BOSTON (AP) — Infielder Earl Averill and pitcher Hal Woodeshick were called up from San Diego Monday by the Cleveland Indians, and the Tribe optioned outfielder Carroll Hardy to that Pacific Coast League club.

Averill, 26, originally was a catcher but after troubles with the defensive duties of backstopping was moved from behind the plate by the San Diego Padres. He has been hitting at a .348 average.

San Diego used him at second base, third, and in the last few weeks in left field.

Manager Joe Gordon of the Tribe said he will spot Averill at third base and move Vic Power to second. Averill is a former University of Oregon athlete whose father was a longtime big league star.

Woodeshick, 25-year-old southpaw, is the PCL's leading hurler with a 9-2 record going into last weekend's games, a string of seven victories in a row and an earned-run average of 2.49.

He has a 2-1 record in 1958.

Hardy, 24, is a former big league star.

"I just believe I am as ready for him (Patterson) as anybody else," he said.
