

# Britain Announces Support For America's Military Intervention In Lebanon

LONDON (AP)— Britain announced full support Tuesday for American military action in Lebanon. British troops are not taking part, Foreign Minister Selwyn Lloyd said.

Lloyd told a tense session of the House of Commons that British forces in the region — presumably the East Mediterranean — have been alerted in case of emergency.

The foreign secretary said the United States informed Britain in advance of her decision to intervene "to preserve the independence and integrity" of Lebanon.

The American decision "has the full support of Her Majesty's government," Lloyd said.

WASHINGTON (AP)— House investigators held a closed session Tuesday to weigh a charge by Bernard Goldfine to take his fight against some subcommittee questions into court right away.

Chairman Owen Harris (D-Ark) made plain he held no sympathy for Goldfine's surprise request, but he ordered a 2 p.m. (EST) closed session on his investigating subcommittee to hear Goldfine and his lawyers argue the matter.

The congressmen have threatened to cite Goldfine for contempt for not answering questions.

Harris rescheduled open hearings for Wednesday after these developments.

Goldfine said he had made several visits to the White House and on one occasion had been introduced to President Eisenhower.

# Pope Pius Asks Peace Prayers

VATICAN CITY (AP)— While units of the powerful U. S. 6th Fleet sped toward the troubled Middle East Tuesday, Pope Pius XII called for prayers for world peace and a return to the precepts of Christianity.

The pontiff's plea and warning of possible universal extermination came in an encyclical letter to all bishops and archbishops of the Roman Catholic Church, the first that he has issued in more than a year.

The letter was dated Monday, the day that strife erupted in Iraq, and threatened to spread to other troubled areas of the volatile Middle East.

The 82-year-old head of the Roman Catholic Church, reviewing the long campaign for peace he began soon after his election on the eve of World War II, cited the terrible power of today's nuclear arms.

The "frightful armament, discovered by human ingenuity," he said, "are of such immense power that they could crush and submerge in universal extermination not only the conquered but also the conquerors and all humanity."

The encyclical took its title from its two first Latin words, "Memini Iuvati" or "It is well to remember."

# Truck Driver Makes Uncalled Picket Line Visit

NEW YORK (AP)— A husky Massachusetts truck driver made an unwelcome appearance Monday on a Hungarian picket line outside the headquarters of the Soviet delegation to the United Nations.

For two minutes the truck driver marched along with the anti-Communist Hungarians and carried a sign that read on one side: "Hungarian trouble-makers go home."

On the other side the sign read: "Judge us not by these foreign trouble-makers."

Police hustled him from the line before the Hungarians could get to him. He was identified as Frank Martin, 32, of Worcester.

Martin was arrested on a disorderly conduct charge. So was a picket, Laszlo Toth, 30, of Manhattan.

Toth raced across the street to get at Martin while police were questioning him and he tore the placard from Martin's hand.

Monday night, Toth pleaded guilty and received a suspended sentence. Martin pleaded innocent and was held in \$100 bail.

# American Airlines Pilot Detained In Iraq Briefly

CAIRO (AP)— An American airline pilot who was grounded for 15 hours in Iraq during the revolt there said "everything was very quiet" in Basra.

Capt. John Hulburd of Upper Black Eddy, Pa., landed his Trans World Airline Constellation in Cairo early today after revolutionary forces which seized the Basra airport allowed him to continue. The plane was carrying 25 passengers and a crew of 10 from Manila to New York.

Hulburd landed at Basra, Iraq's Persian Gulf port 280 miles southeast of Baghdad, picked up two Iraq citizens and was about to take off when told to wait.
