

Interior Secretary Seaton Party Choice For Ike's Top Aide If Adams Steps Down

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Interior Fred Seaton apparently is the overwhelming choice of congressional Republicans to succeed Sherman Adams—if Adams should quit his presidential assistant's job.

GOP members of Congress don't expect to have much, if any, influence in the matter, but a sounding of sentiment indicates most of them hope that if there is a change, Seaton will move in as chief of the White House staff.

Seaton himself says the question of a successor to Adams is purely academic.

"I don't expect to see Mr. Adams leave," he told newsmen in Minneapolis.

In his Cabinet job, Seaton has been highly cooperative with senators and House members where it was possible for him to help out with their problems. He also has the reputation of being able to say "no" — when he has to — in soft language that turns away their wrath.

Adams, on the other hand, has been known as a rather flinty "no" man. And that obviously has contributed to the unwillingness of many Republicans to defend the presidential aide in the controversy over his acceptance of expensive favors from Bernard Goldfine, millionaire Boston industrialist.

Plan To Quit Reported

The Detroit News, quoting unnamed top-ranking Republican sources, said Adams plans to quit during the Labor Day weekend. Its copyrighted story said the decision to quit is Adams' own, not that of President Eisenhower.

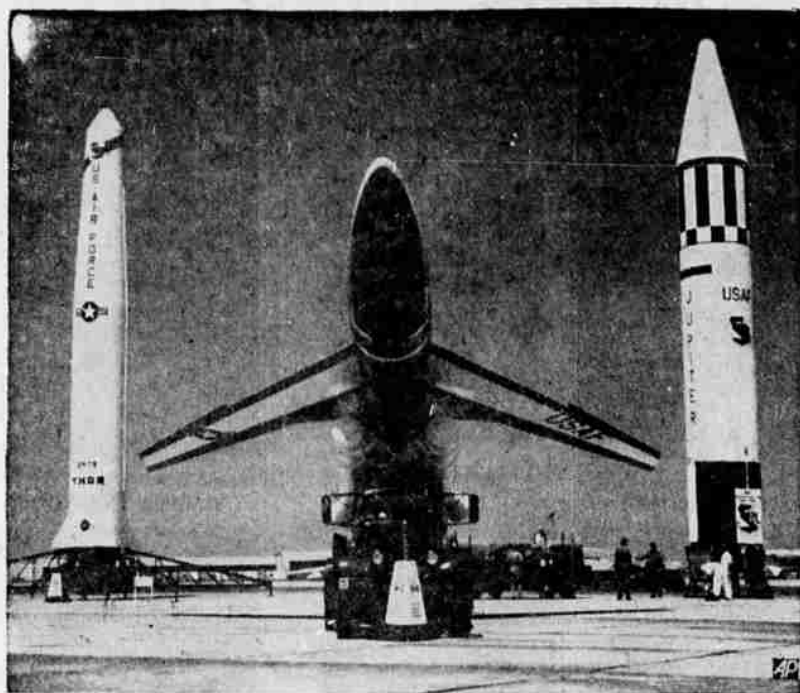
The paper said details of Adams' reported plans to leave are still being worked out. It noted that the timing it gave would be after Congress adjourns but still two months before the November elections.

In the absence of any new evidence to link Adams with Goldfine, Eisenhower has given every indication he regards the matter as closed. In the public record, he is standing on his statement that although Adams was imprudent, he is convinced of his aide's honesty and integrity and needs him as chief assistant.

Millions Voted By House To Aid Atomic Program

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House voted \$386,670,000 in new money appropriations Monday for the Atomic Energy Commission in the coming year.

This was nearly double the \$193,000,000 recommended by the Eisenhower administration for nuclear construction and research in fiscal 1959.

A voice vote passed the bill and sent it to the Senate. The biggest share of the House boost was represented by a 145-million-dollar item for construction of new plutonium production facilities for military use at the government's Hanford, Wash., atomic plant.

The house also approved an additional 40 million dollars in authorizations for construction of new research facilities.

The 145 million dollars added by the House for plutonium production at Hanford was described "a maximum effort vital to new weapon development and our improved defense posture."

The proposed Hanford plutonium reactor would be convertible to electric power uses if not needed for the military.

The bill also authorizes 51 million dollars for a gas-cooled graphite reactor, with private industrial participation, for power development.

Explosion Rips Store; 2 Men Believed Killed

STREATOR, Ill. (AP) — An explosion, coming on the heels of a deluge of rain, ripped apart a three-story hardware store Monday. At least two persons were reported missing and feared dead.

The blast tore away the top of the elevator shaft and then blew out the front of the building in the downtown shopping section.

The new tragedy struck while sections of Streator were battling flood waters caused by a 7 1/2 inch rain that fell in six hours.

Some 16 employees and customers were in the store when the explosion occurred.

Police said the missing were Dixon Williams, the owner, and Ray Aschinger, a customer.

Columbia Basin Farm Units Slated For Sale

The Bureau of Reclamation will soon offer 14 full-time farm units for sale in the Columbia Basin project southeast of Pasco, Wash. The units will be sold rather than offered for homestead, as usual.

The units range from 71.5 to 159 irrigable acres, the bureau informed George V. Blomgren, Douglas County veterans service officer. Blomgren said application for qualification must be filed before Aug. 15 with the bureau at Ephrata, Wash.

Blomgren has other details of the sale in his office in the courthouse.

Europe's highest office building, 14 stories, is now being built at Hackett, near Stockholm. It will provide office space for 3,100 employees of the Swedish State Power Board who are now scattered among some forty offices in the capital.

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Elkins' Associate Stabbed; Woman Friend Accused

PORTLAND (AP) — Phyllis (Torchy) Jessing, 28, girl friend of Alfred E. Kiefer, 35, is being held here on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon in connection with the Friday night stabbing of Kiefer, an ex-convict.

Kiefer was reported in satisfactory condition at Portland General Hospital by police sources Monday. He had been brought to the hospital with abdominal stab wounds late Friday night by Miss Jessing and James Q. Jenkins.

Jenkins is under indictment with Kiefer on charges of extortion of money from nursing homes in the operation of a small newspaper. He had been released on bail.

Kiefer was released on bail Friday morning, and was stabbed 12 hours later.

Miss Jessing is being held in lieu of \$10,000 bail on the stabbing charge and police also are holding Willard Fent Jr., 30, a friend of the Jessing woman, as a material witness.

Both Jenkins and Miss Jessing have been linked with the activities of James B. Elkins, the Portland gambler whose accusations started a vice investigation here.

NEW CITY MANAGER

Paper From Sugar Cane Residue Will Be Tried

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A \$600,000 research program on possible manufacture of paper from sugar cane residue in Hawaii will be launched this fall.

A joint announcement Sunday President A. B. Layton of Crown Zellerbach Corp. and Boyd MacNaughton, president of the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Assn. said testing facilities will be set up at Camas, Wash., and in Hawaii.

The paper company and the sugar planters have been conducting laboratory research since 1952 on bagasse — the fibrous residue of processed sugar cane.

Aim of the project is to determine the economic feasibility of a paper mill in Hawaii which could convert about 75,000 tons of bagasse a year. About a million tons are produced annually in the islands.

Government Advances Funds For Utility Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Community Facilities Administration announced Monday a \$205,000 advance of planning funds to the Washington Public Power Supply System, Kennewick, Wash.

Rep. Russell V. Mack (R-Wash.) said he was advised the money would be used for aerial and ground surveys and other engineering work at the proposed five million dollar hydroelectric dam at Lake Packwood.

The project, on which construction is expected to begin in 1960, will supply power for eastern Lewis and Cowlitz Counties.

Ike Signs Bill Extending His Wartime Power

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower has signed into law here a bill extending until June 30, 1962, his own emergency powers — and those of his successor — in the event of enemy attack or imminent attack.

Under previous law, these powers to proclaim a state of emergency would have expired last June 30.

In explanation for moving the expiration date ahead four years, the House Armed Services Committee said:

"It is believed that this country is in as much danger of enemy attack, if not more, than when Congress enacted the standby emergency powers contained in the Federal Civil Defense Act."

The President also signed into law another bill authorizing the National Science Foundation to carry out a basic research program in weather control.

The new law will permit the foundation to make grants or contracts with public and private agencies.

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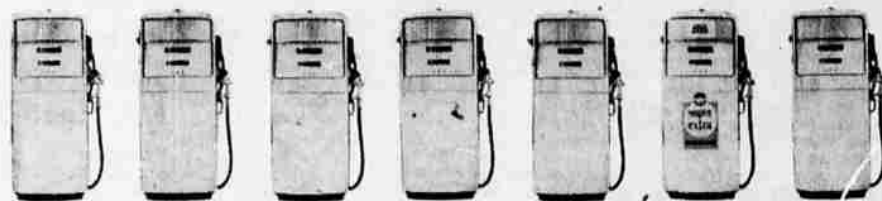
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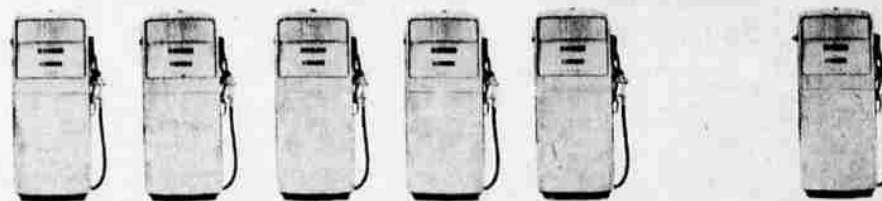
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
