Dr. Eisenhower Not Molested On Panama Visit

BALBOA, Canal Zone (AP) — Dr. Milton Eisenhower embarked on a tour of the Panama Canal Monday with his head full of Panama's proposals for economic aid and a plea for recognition of her sovereignty over the vital waterway.

It was the third day of the friendly and thus far uneventful fact-finding mission which the President of the United States has sent his brother.

Later he goes on to Honduras, Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Puerto Rico, El Salvador and Guatemala, in that order. The zig-zag itinerary was planned in advance and announced only today to foil any violent leftist demonstrations of the type that greeted Vice President Nixon on his South American tour.

If any similar anti-American sentiment exists in Panama, it did not show itself over the weekend. Eisenhower was shielded by strict security measures and whisked around Panama City so rapidly that the inhabitants of the capital hardly were aware of his presence. His daily schedule was not published.

President Ernesto de la Guardia Jr. told the visitor that flying the Panamanian flag over the Canal Zone and using Spanish officially inside the 10-mile-wide strip would help bring the people of Panama and the United States closer together.

The United States controls the Canal Zone under an agreement with Panama. The question of mineral rights and Panamanian sovereignty over the zone recently has become a hot political issue which De La Guardia's opposition has been quick to exploit.

N. Korean Reds Demand Pull-Out Of Yankees

PANMUNJON, Korea (AP) — The North Korean Communists said Monday that the American-dominated U.N. command in Korea "will be held responsible for all the consequences" unless American troops are pulled out of South Korea.

The new threat was delivered by North Korean Maj. Gen. Kang Sang Ho at a Communist-called meeting of the Joint Military Armistice Commission.

The Communist threat was couched in the usual verbiage used by the Reds for such statements. Also as usual there was no elaboration of what the consequences might be.

The Chinese Communists say they are withdrawing all their forces from North Korea and have called on the United States to do the same.

Knowland Far Behind In California's Vote

SACRAMENTO (AP) — Democratic Atty. Gen. Edmund G. Brown rolled up a two-party margin of 662,010 votes over Republican Sen. William F. Knowland in the June 3 gubernatorial primary, official figures released by the secretary of state showed today.

Brown got 1,890,622 Democratic votes and 374,879 on the Republican ticket for a total of 2,265,501. Knowland's totals were 1,290,106 Republican and 213,382 Democratic for a total of 1,503,491.

On both tickets Knowland got fewer votes than the Republican candidates for lieutenant governor, secretary of state, controller and treasurer. They are all incumbents.

Donald Donaldson got 84,449 Democratic votes for governor.

Shakespearean Festival Tickets Selling Rapidly

William Patton, general manager of the Oregon Shakespearean Festival at Ashland, reported today that advance ticket sales are totalling more than twice the advance sale at this time last year.

Patton said reservations for the July 28 opening night banquet and play are running especially high. The 6 p.m. banquet will open the festival and will be followed by the first enactment of "Much Ado About Nothing."

The Shakespeare comedy and three other plays by the Bard of Avon, "King Lear," "The Merchant of Venice," and "Troilus and Cressida," will rotate nightly from opening night through Sept. 4.

Play tickets are \$2.50, \$1.50 and \$1.20. Banquet tickets, added Patton, are \$2.50. The banquet will be held in Ashland's Luthia Park.

Directors Robert Loper and James Sandoe reported that rapid progress has been made in the "tightening and polishing" rehearsals, now underway. Dress rehearsals are slated to begin this week.

Mental Health Meet Bid Given S. Oregonians

Interested southern Oregon residents have been invited to attend a meeting of the Legislative Interim Committee on Mental Retardation and Emotional Disturbance Saturday in Medford.

The invitation was extended by state Sen. Carl Francis, Dayton, committee chairman. The all-day affair will begin at 8:45 a.m. in the auditorium of the Jackson County Courthouse.

Most of the morning session will be devoted to reports on various phases of the mental health problem by nine Jackson County residents.

An hour and 15 minute period during which members of the audience may offer opinion, testimony or recommendations to the committee will begin at 11:45 a.m. The afternoon session, which will begin at 2:30 p.m., will be devoted to committee business. It will be open to the public, however.

The committee was set up by the last Legislative Assembly to study problems of mental retardation and emotional disturbance under provisions of a senate resolution. Sen. Dan Dimick, Roseburg, was among authors of the resolution.
