Basketball Use Seen For Stock Bldg. In Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — The old Pacific International Livestock Exposition building, being remodeled in an expensive project for next year's Oregon Centennial observance, will be available for college basketball games by December.

Anthony Brandenhaller, chairman of the Oregon Centennial Commission, told the group Monday that the building will be remodeled for Portland University's home basketball games.

A contract providing that the commission will get 40 per cent of the net profits from the games was presented for action, then referred to a committee for consideration at a later meeting.

The contract is with Paul Ail, local promoter.

Miteff Decisions Vargus In Calif.

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Argentine heavyweight Alex Miteff, who won his last contest in a brawling battle with Reuben Vargus Monday night, may make a return engagement.

Matchmaker Don Chargin, who said after the 10-rounder that he hoped to have the big South American back again soon.

Miteff scored with left hooks to the San Francisco's body and head to win a unanimous verdict.

Twice he was penalized for low blows.

Vargus also drew warnings from referee Tony Bosnich for butting and wrestling.

In the eighth, Vargus received three minutes to recuperate from a low blow.

Miteff, the seventh ranked heavyweight, outweighted Vargus, 208 to 195½.

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Six Americans In Channel Field

LONDON (AP) — Six Americans and 47 swimmers from 22 other countries let it be known Saturday they want to conquer the English Channel on or about August 22.

But organizers of the annual mass swimming race from France to England said the starters would be cut to 35.

"It is neither safe nor practical to have more than that figure in the water at one time," said an official. "Swimmers have been known to get lost."

The cross-channel race is organized by Billy Butlin, the British tycoon who made a fortune out of building Holiday Camps (a sort of dude ranch by the sea). This year, Butlin has more competitors than ever. The highest previous total was 24.

Greta Anderson, 30-year-old Danish-born swimmer now living at Long Beach, Calif., again is entered. When she won last year, it was the first time in the six-year history of the race that a woman had been first home.

Nine other women and 43 men are aiming for a slice of the 1-900 pounds (\$5,320) prize money.

Seattle Woman Wins Toastmistress Contest

SEATTLE (AP) — Deciding quickly that a nation's youth is its greatest asset, Mrs. Vernon V. Robinson of Seattle won the annual speech contest of the International Toastmistress Club Monday night.

Contestants delivered brief prepared speeches and then were given an impromptu subject — "a nation's greatest asset" — upon which to speak.

Second place went to Mrs. Elliott Lindblad of Atlanta and third to Mrs. Anthony O'Hara of Michigan City, Indiana.

Election of officers was on Tuesday's program of the club's 17th convention. Mrs. Ann Towell of Akron, O., is the present president.

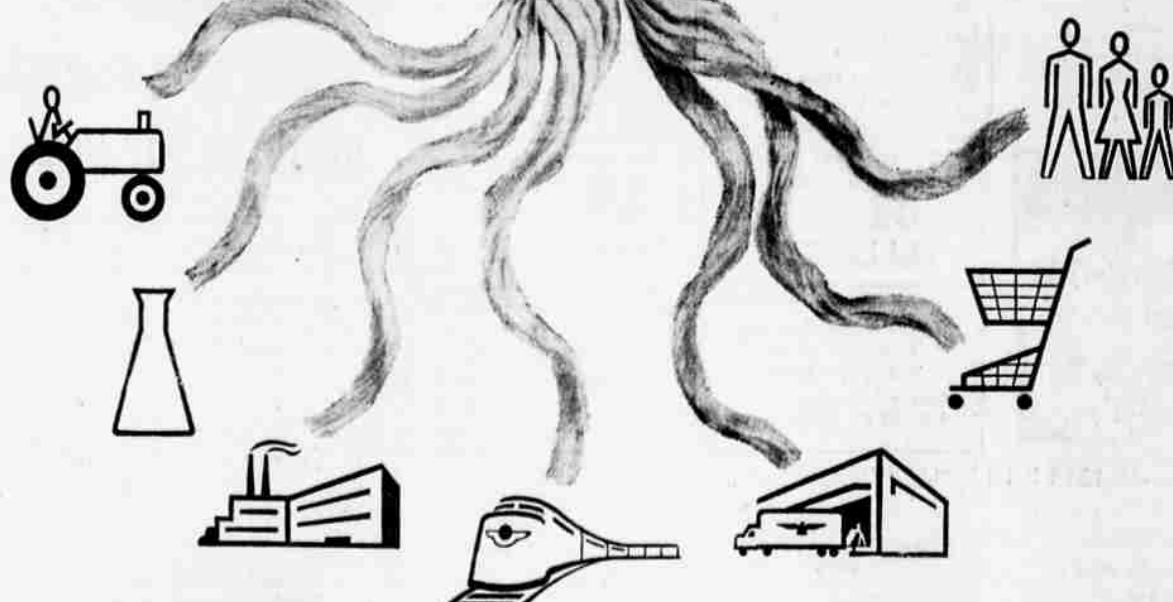
