The mare was a gift to Eleanor upon her eighth grade graduation. Eleanor will be a senior in Canyonville High School next fall, from her parents, the John Irwins, and they often take the mare to their home at the Log Cabin for pleasure jaunts over logging roads.

Mrs. Broadwater was getting ready for bed when the explosion occurred, the rest of the family was already asleep. The cabin next to theirs was damaged considerably; the plaster crumbled in theirs.

### Mother Finds 3 Daughters Shot, Husband Missing

TROY, Pa. (AP) — A mother found her three young daughters shot to death last night and her husband missing from their farm home near the New York state border.

Mrs. Margaret Pelton, 23, said she had returned to the house after a visit and had found Connie, 2, slumped in her stroller, seemingly asleep. Concerned that the child was up so late, she called out to her husband Paul, 19.

There was no answer. She suddenly realized Connie was shot. She ran into the bedroom. Patricia, 7, was on the bed. Pauline, 5 months, was in a basket. The children were dead.

Mrs. Pelton said later she ran out to the garage where her father Carlton Brion, 45, had just parked the car. She yelled hysterically, "We got to get help quick. The children are dead."

Brion had driven his daughter to Troy Community Hospital earlier in the evening for a visit with Pauline's twin brother Paul, who was critically ill from an asthma attack. They had been gone about four hours. Their home is just outside Troy, which is about 25 miles south of Elmira, N. Y.

A wide police search was on for Pelton, but Coroner Gerald Vickery said there was not much to indicate he did the shooting, beside the fact he was missing and so was his 22-caliber rifle.

Police said the children had been shot with a 22. Patricia in the head, and Pauline and Connie in the stomach.

Mrs. Pelton told a newsman that her husband, a slender 6-footer, had been a cheerful, devoted man during their four years of marriage and was very fond of his four children.

Pelton, who recently was laid off at a women's stocking factory, had just bought the children new clothing, Mrs. Pelton said.

### Congress May Be Kept On Call For Mid-East Crisis

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legislative leaders may decide to keep Congress on call for any new Middle East Emergency that might arise after it completes its regular business next month.

Sen. Styles Bridges (R-NH) forecast adoption of a resolution under which the party leaders of both houses could call members back into an emergency session if President Eisenhower himself did not do so.

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, Senate Democratic leader, said he hasn't had time yet to consider such a proposal.

Neither he nor Bridges would speculate on whether the Lebanon crisis would prolong the present session. But Bridges said it is his understanding Eisenhower does not now plan to ask for additional funds or other legislation.

Eisenhower told Congress Tuesday in a special message that he dispatched the Marines to save Lebanon from "indirect aggression from without." He said he was acting to protect 2,500 American citizens in the country.

He said the initial contingent of 5,000 Marines will be "augmented as required." He promised that U.S. forces "will be withdrawn as rapidly as circumstances permit."

Following the course adopted by former President Truman in the Korean War, Eisenhower asked for no formal ratification by Congress of his troop action. He reported it formally to Congress after he had acted.

The informal reaction was split, largely along party lines. Most Republicans took the attitude that there was no alternative to the use of armed force, a view seconded by only a scattered number of Democrats.

Many Democrats, and some Republicans, were critical of the President's decision. But all, regardless of party, made it clear they would support his action, now that it had been taken.

### Hospital Patients Will Be Feted

Roseburg Veterans Administration patients in ward eight will be feted Friday during a party sponsored by the Special Services Department.

The party is scheduled to get under way at 7:30 p.m. Veterans Administration Volunteer Service workers have been invited to attend the event, Mrs. Nancy Wulf, VAVS publicity chairman, said.

Patients who have birthdays during July will attend a birthday party at the home of Mrs. Margaret O'Neil on Fisher Road. The party will be Monday and be sponsored by the Red Cross.

Activities of the VAVS this week have included the American Good Star Mothers monthly visitation on the wards Tuesday and a dance Monday. The dance was sponsored by the Roseburg Elks Lodge.

### Position Of Jackson Co. District Judge In Doubt

KLAMATH FALLS (AP) — Robert G. Danielson, a Klamath Falls attorney and a former Ashland resident, ran for district judge of election and beat the only other candidate for the office, E. Roy Bashaw.

For all practical purposes, this meant Danielson was elected, since only his name would appear on the November ballot unless there were write-in candidates. Incumbent Judge James Main did not seek re-election.

However, Danielson took a job in the Klamath County district attorney's office on April 1 and was not a resident of Jackson County on Election Day, May 16.

Jackson County Dist. Atty. Tom Reeder advised the county clerk that, because of his nonresident status, Danielson was not entitled to a nomination certificate without which his name cannot go on the November ballot.

Reeder then asked state Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton for his opinion, which was released this week in favor of Danielson.

Meanwhile, the situation grew more tangled with the filing of a suit in Medford Friday by Richard J. House. The suit seeks to eliminate Danielson on nonresident grounds and install his erstwhile opponent, Bashaw, as the successful candidate on the November ballot.

A hearing on the suit is expected in circuit court in Medford within two weeks. The judge will then decide whose name shall go before the voters in November.

Danielson said Tuesday that, if the ruling is in his favor, and if he is not beaten by any write-in candidate in November, he would assume the Jackson County district judgeship on Jan. 1.

The lawyer said he moved his family back to Medford on July 5 and that Medford is now his official residence, even though he continues to practice law here in association with attorney Glenn Ramirez.

Danielson resigned from the district attorney's office May 15.

### Atomic Energy Bill Assured Of Senate Okay

WASHINGTON (AP) — A \$386,679,000 atomic energy authorization bill — double the size asked by President Eisenhower — was assured Wednesday of final congressional approval.

The Senate passed the measure late Tuesday without knocking out any of the projects objected to by the President. The House, in acting on the bill Monday, also did not make any cut in the money authorizations.

Conferees between the two branches will have to iron out minor differences. But the money total is certain to remain the same.

The President had asked Congress to approve only a \$193,379,000 authorization measure.

The Senate debate centered on a provision which two Republicans — Leverett Saltonstall (Mass) and Bourke B. Hickenlooper (Iowa) — contended could put the Atomic Energy Commission squarely in the public power business.

Amendment Defeated  
But Saltonstall's amendment to eliminate the provision was shouted down.

He sought to knock out 25 million dollars of a 145 million authorization for a new plutonium reactor to be built at the Hanford, Wash., AEC installation and also language which would permit the reactor to be converted to power production.

The President had asked that the entire 145 million be eliminated.

Sen. Clinton P. Anderson (D-NM) and Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.), handling the bill, contended that there was a power shortage at Hanford and that any electricity developed by the new reactor would be used there.

They said the conversion could not even be made without the future approval of Congress.

The two Democratic senators insisted also that a new plutonium reactor was badly needed because the present Hanford reactors are 14 years old and may have only five more years of useful life.

When a pilot went aboard, the brunette slipped up the gangplank behind him. The gangplank was swung aboard and the Angelita moved to sea.

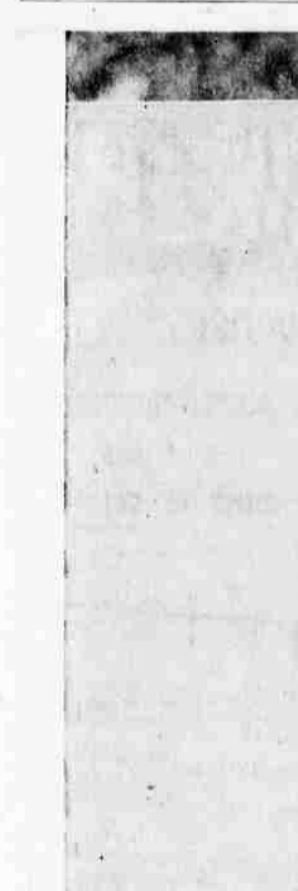
**RIGHT TO CHANGE MIND**

### Lightning Kills Motorist In Trouble, Samaritan

GREENUP, Ill. (AP) — A motorist in trouble and a man who had stopped to help were killed Tuesday by lightning. The automobile of Mr. and Mrs. Orville Livingston of Los Angeles ran off U.S. 40 during a rainstorm and became mired.

Two traveling salesmen stopped to assist them.

Mrs. Livingston, 36, and one of the salesmen, Glenn Franklin Hartman, 33, New Carlisle, Ind., were killed by the bolt. The Livingstons' daughter Jeannette, 4, was seriously burned. All were standing on the shoulder of the highway.

Livingston and the other salesman, who were trying to extricate the Livingston car, escaped injury.

### Atlantic Fleet Put On Four-Hour Standby Alert

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — The Atlantic Fleet was placed on a four-hour alert basis Tuesday. All leaves were cancelled and personnel directed to return to their ships.

Anti-submarine forces were ordered to increase their defense vigil.

Atlantic Fleet Headquarters issued the following statement designated Atlantic Fleet Communication No. 1:

"Adm. Jerauld Wright, USN, commander in chief of the U. S. Atlantic fleet, announced the Atlantic Fleet has been placed on a four-hour alert basis.

"Adm. Wright has also directed the Atlantic Fleet Marine force to take preparatory steps to ready the Fleet Marine Air-ground task force units for such duties as may be required."

"The alert also applies to the 2nd Fleet, now in Eastern Atlantic waters.

"The U.S. Atlantic Fleet is composed of over 200,000 officers and men, approximately 500 ships and 150 aircraft squadrons.

"The Atlantic Fleet supplies the ships and men for the U.S. 6th Fleet in the Mediterranean."
