

Myrtle Creek Club Due For Two With Roseburg

The Myrtle Creek American Legion junior baseball team brings its 5-11 season mark to Roseburg tonight to do battle with the Lockwood Motors Legion club at Stewart Park.

This is the second doubleheader between the two clubs with the previous twin bill giving each club a win and a loss in District One action.

The games tonight for the Roseburg Legion nine are crucial in the drive for another pennant. Bill Harper's nine currently lead the league with a 10-2 record and has four games to go including the two this evening. The Lockwood season mark is 17-4. The second place team, Springfield, owns a 6-4 record and has six games left including two with Lowell tonight.

Thus the situation is this: Two wins out of the four remaining would give the Roseburg nine a 12-2 mark while Springfield must win all six games left to gain a tie. If Roseburg should lose all four remaining games, the Springfield club could tie the title with four wins or could win the flag with five wins. The Lockwood nine is in the driver's seat.

Win Streak under way

Bill George's team will be out to end the Lockwood 12-game winning streak and slow the Roseburg pennant express some. The Winnetroun Ford club has come on during the last two outings to win three out of four games—all league titles. Two wins over Eugene knocked that Lane County club out of the running and two Eugene losses to Lockwood and a single win for Winnetroun over Lowell, moved the Myrtle Creek club out of the basement into a tie for the dubious position with Eugene.

Both coaches are expected to go all-out in the Douglas County Legion championship games. In the earlier meeting at Glendale, the Winnetroun nine dropped Lockwood 5-2 in the first game, as lefty Steve Keele threw a two-hitter. In the second game, Eugene knocked that Lane County club out of the game extending into the early morning hours by a 15-8 count in a shortened six-inning tilt.

Lockwood is expected to have its top choppers on the mound against the heavy hitting Winnetroun club. Right-hander Bill Eswine, who is 6-0 for the year, will work one of the games. On the hill in the other will be southpaw John Livingston with a 5-2 mark.

George Names Hurlers

George will counter with his two remaining choppers, Gene Morrison and Wes Davidson. Morrison is 1-4 and Davidson has a 3-4 mark. There is a slim chance that lefty Keele will return from work in the woods for the games. In that case, he would start the first game. Lefty Keele left the club with a 1-3 mark.

At the other positions for Myrtle Creek: Ed Cearly behind the plate, Cliff Worely at first, Bob Cavaner at second, Rod Trask at short and Gregg Lindquist at third. In the outfield will be the one, Bill Eswine, Dave Weakley in center and either Dan Densley or Fred Walley in right.

A first game lineup if Eswine is on the hill, will find Byron Baker catching, Gene Wagner at first, Mike Hatfield at second, Don Wells at short and either Dave Cellers or Ted Kolberg at third. In the outfield will be Livingston in left, Wes Young in center and Bob Scott in right.

After the games tonight, Lockwood draws a bye in district play this weekend after meeting at Glendale at Stewart Park in a non-count Friday night. Next week, Lockwood meets Springfield in the two makeup games and Princeton in a single non-count, all at Stewart Park.

Sunday, Winnetroun meets Springfield in a doubleheader at Glendale to close out its season.

TEAM DUE AT SALEM

Football Giants Add Heft, Speed For Promising Year

NEW YORK (AP) — Rocky Grier — all 275 pounds of him — is due to rejoin the New York football Giants in September and that's about the best news Coach Jim Lee Howell has had since they handed him the championship trophy two years ago.

Grier, a mammoth, fast-maneuvering tackle, was an all-league choice and the key man on the Giants' defense in 1956, when they won the title. His absence last year was felt keenly.

The exact time of Rosey's return is uncertain because he's still in the Army, but the minute he hits camp Howell can begin deploying the rest of his talent to best advantage.

With Grier and Dick Modzelewski at tackles, Jim Katcavage can return to his normal position at end to team with Andy Robustelli. Sam Huff will play middle guard and Bill Svoboda and Harland Svarre will be the linebackers unless rookie Don Caraway displaces one of them. Caraway, a 230-pounder from the University of Houston, is bigger than either of the SV boys.

Size, Speed Added

"We've added some size at several positions; we think we've upgraded our speed a lot and we've upgraded our defensive secondary," said Giant general manager Ray Walsh.

"The squad looks good."

The Giants open camp at Salem, Ore., July 26. The rookies will have three days to practice sparring passes and steaks before the veterans come in to take the best away from them. They'll remain on the West Coast until after an Aug. 22 exhibition at Los Angeles, stop for a game at Detroit, then camp at Bear Mountain, N. Y., until the season opens Sept. 28.

Walsh was pleased with the results of off-season trades. The Giants acquired Dorne Dibble from Detroit to round out the offensive end squad; Lindon Crow, defensive back, from the Chicago Cardinals; J.T. Frankenberger, former Kentucky tackle, from Washington, and Bob Mischak, former Army star, from the Cleveland Browns.

Rookies Due Late

Two Giant rookies — Nos. 1 and

2 on their draft list — won't join the squad until after the Chicago All Star Game. They're Phil King, flashy runner from Vanderbilt, and Frank Youso, Minnesota tackle.

King and a pair of swift rookies, Don Maynard from Texas Western and Don Herndon from Tampa will vie with holdovers Alex Webster and Gene Filipski for offensive halfback spots.

At quarterback old reliable Charley Conerly and Don Heinrich will have the support of Tom Dublinski, who did some good work for Detroit before jumping to Canada.

PGA Board Calls Bolt For Hearing

HAVERTOWN, Pa. — Are they going to lower the boom on trigger-tempered Tommy Bolt?

This question took priority over the usual pretournament gripes about the course and weather today as the country's top professionals tuned up for the National PGA Golf Championship.

Bolt, on probation since last January and hit with a \$500 fine for bad conduct, has been called on the carpet of the Professional Golfers Assn. Executive Committee tonight to plead his case.

If he can't convince the 15-member committee that he deserves another chance, he likely is to be barred from PGA-sponsored competition for from a few months to a year or more.

Bolt built up a reputation of club-throwing violence, got golf religion to win the Open Tulsa, Okla., last month and then lost his reformation.

A couple of weeks ago he picked up in two tournaments on Long Island, one of them the \$60,000 Pine Hollow Open, and drew a \$500 fine for insulting certain tournament sponsors.

Bolt said he was ill. He appealed the fine and then died off to the Midwest for a rest. All the time he insisted that he had developed a new philosophy of peace and patience, strengthened by a card carried in his hip pocket which began, "God give me serenity, etc."

With 196 victories, Robin Roberts is the winningest pitcher the Philadelphia Phillies ever have had. But he's the tough luck guy among active major leaguers when it comes to 1-0 defeats.

He had no luck at all Tuesday night, giving up just two hits in his seven innings, but losing 1-0 at San Francisco. It was his second 1-0 defeat of the season and seventh of his career, more than any other pitcher now working in the majors has had to put up with.

Roberts, who has won five 1-0 games, has been a shutout victim enough times this season to go on strike. The Phils have been blanked eight times, more than any other National League team, and Robin has been the loser in half of them.

Young Mike McCormick collared the Phils in this one, struggling through with a nine-hitter for his second shutout and a 7-1 record as the Giants, who managed just three hits, stayed within half a game of first-place Milwaukee.

Braves Defeat Cards

The Braves rapped St. Louis 4-1 on the four-hit pitching of Joey Jay and home runs by Hank Aaron and Wes Covington. Pittsburgh beat Los Angeles 6-2 in the only other game scheduled.

In the American League, Detroit walloped New York 12-5 with Frank Lary beating the Yankees for the fifth time. Second-place Boston defeated Kansas City 5-2 on Jackie Jensen's 27th home run. Baltimore beat the Chicago White Sox 4-3 in 12 innings, and Washington beat Cleveland 5-4.

Roberts (7-9) no-hit the Giants until the fifth, then was socked for the run in the sixth on a walk, Willie Kirkland's double and an error. Jim Hearn gave up the other Giant hit in the eighth.

Aaron and Covington split the four hits Sal Maglie allowed the Braves in four innings, but Aaron's two were his 16th and 17th home runs, while Covington singled and hit his 14th homer for a 3-0 lead that handed Maglie his third consecutive defeat and a 2-3 record. Aaron's fly ball brought in the other run after the Cards scored in the fourth on a walk and singles by Stan Musial and Curt Flood.

Duke Snider's two-run seventh homer — a 440-foot shot, longest in the league — gave the Braves a 4-1 lead.
