Report From Baghdad Says King Faisal Killed

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—A Foreign Ministry spokesman said Wednesday it had received a report direct from Baghdad that King Faisal of Iraq was killed early Monday by a rebel officer in the palace.

The spokesman said the report was sent by Gen. Nasser Batman-chili, Iranian ambassador in Baghdad, over the Embassy wireless. There have been a variety of re-

ports concerning the King's fate since the Iraqi coup Monday, including rumors he was wounded and a prisoner in the palace.

Shortly after this announcement the Baghdad Radio was heard broadcast the same report. The Baghdad broadcast also repeated that Crown Prince Abdul Ilah and strong man Premier Nuri Said were killed by revolutionary forces.

Contractors Close Down Additional Construction Jobs

PORTLAND (AP)—The tie-up of construction projects in Oregon and southwestern Washington spread to an additional 50 million dollars worth of projects Wednesday.

The Portland Building Chapter of the Associated General Contractors voted unanimously to close down at 4:30 p.m. all projects where teamsters and operating engineers union members are employed. About 7,000 men are involved in the latest shutdown.

Some of the larger building projects affected by the latest phase of the dispute are the Kaiser Hospital in Portland, the Portland International Airport, the huge new Lloyd Center in northeast Portland and the Air Force SAGE air defense project at Camp Adams near Corvallis.

The AGC's heavy construction division had shut down many of its 350 million dollars in big jobs last week after pickets from the Hoisting and Portable Engineers Local 701 appeared Wednesday and Thursday. They were joined by Teamsters pickets this week.

The latest shutdown is on the "strike against one is a strike against all" basis which the heavy construction division used in its closure. Wilford Long, AGC building chapter secretary, said.

Mediators reported some progress was made Tuesday in a session between the AGC and the engineers.

The mediators met Wednesday with representatives of the AGC and the Teamsters.

The Laborers' Union accused employers of a lockout and filed suit in federal court for \$44,000 in back pay for 1,000 workmen. The union said its members were laid off in violation of a contract.

Langley Asks Court To Review Conviction

PORTLAND (AP)—William Langley says he has asked the U. S. Supreme Court to review a conviction which ousted him as district attorney of Multnomah County.

Langley asked the high court to overturn the conviction on the ground that news photography in the courtroom prevented a fair trial.

The Oregon Supreme Court, Langley said, "concedes that the trial court committed error in permitting courtroom photography... but stated it would not reverse because petitioner had not shown this error influenced the verdict of the jury."

Langley said that under Oregon law questioning of jurors is not permitted. Thus, he said, he has been denied a constitutional right.

Langley last year was convicted of failure to prosecute operation of a gambling game at a Portland Paint and Varnish Dealers party.

Salem, reached by telephone at his headquarters, said: "We have not ordered a cease-fire."

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Atomic City Votes Self-Government

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP)—This atomic city of 26,000 operated by the federal government since 1943, voted 4-1 for self-government Tuesday.

In a tight turnout 3,856 of the city's 12,000 registered voters, 2,876 favored incorporation and 717 were against.

A plebiscite in 1955 before any homes or businesses here were offered for sale to private owners brought a 2-1 vote against self-government in any form. Now 80 per cent of the homes have been sold or spoken for.

Eleven men and four women, all of whom favored a council-manager form of government, were elected freeholders from a field of 65 to draw up a city charter.

Richland, which mushroomed from a hamlet of about 200 after construction started on the Hanford Atomic Works in World War II, is operated now by the Atomic Energy Commission through its prime contractor, the General Electric Co.

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Crack Paratrooper Force Waiting At Base In Turkey

ADANA, Turkey (AP)—A crack force of more than 1,000 U.S. paratroopers rested on their weapons Thursday, awaiting orders for their next move—if any—in the angry Middle East.

About 24 hours ago, this airborne task force from the U.S. 24th Division was more than 1,400 miles away at its base near Munich, Germany.

The combat-ready paratroopers—or most of them—had no idea where they were going when they were hustled aboard transport planes. They joked about the usual lack of information.

They began taking off from the West German Air Force Base of Fuerstenfeldbruck, Wednesday.

Correspondent Aboard
S.I.C. Stanley Willard, 29, Gratz, Pa., was in charge of 12 paratroopers and two jeeps, aboard this correspondent's Hercules transport.

"I don't know where we're going," he grinned. "But you can bet your boots, we'll do a good job when we get there."

With that Willard began a furious polishing of his already spit and span rifle.

The men landed here Wednesday night. Unofficial reports said

more than 50 Air Force transports were needed for the men and their rifles, bazookas, jeeps, food and ammunition.

The landing of the task force caught this Turkish-U.S. air base somewhat unprepared.

Tents Without Cots
Some staff officers of the task force had to sleep in tents without cots. Crews of the transport planes slept in their planes. The paratroopers broke out their sleeping bags and bedded down in large circles around the planes.

Commander of the task force is Brig. Gen. James E. Roberts of the U.S. Air Force in Germany.

The flight was made under tense and hurried conditions. The paratroopers had no food, with the exception of chocolates, during the six hours in the air.

Sixteen American and West German correspondents and photographers accompanied the task force.

Adana, near the southeastern coast of Turkey, is within easy striking distance of any point in the Middle East.

Unofficial estimates place the number of men between 1,100 and 1,800. The planes are C-119 Flying Boxcars, C-124 Globemasters and speedy C-130 Hercules turboprops.

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Starlet Nearly Misses Part By Trujillo Role

HOLLYWOOD — An overnight voyage aboard Gen. Rafael Trujillo Jr.'s palatial yacht almost cost a brunette film starlet a movie role.

Lita Milan was the mysterious "lady in red" who sailed on the 350-foot Angellita Tuesday from Los Angeles Harbor.

She came ashore when the Angellita reached San Diego Wednesday and then flew back to Hollywood.

But when the yacht was sailing, Miss Milan was supposed to begin a starring role in a movie in Los Angeles. When she didn't appear the director ordered her replaced.

After long conferences with Edward L. Alpers, president of National Pictures, she was reinstated in the role.

Miss Milan denied any romantic ties with Trujillo, son of the Dominican Republic's strongman.

"I have known him for a long time," she said. "I think he is a wonderful man, and I am very proud of him." She said the Angellita is heading for Mexico.
