5 Encephalitis Cases Reported

SEATTLE (AP)—Five cases of encephalitis in horses have been confirmed in Eastern Washington, the state Health Department reported Wednesday.

It warned owners to have their animals vaccinated and advised farmers to guard against bites from mosquitoes, which carry the disease.

Dr. Norman S. Hayner of the health department said two horses died of the disease on the Merle Goble farm near Lowden, Walla Walla County. The other cases were on farms of C. E. Shaw and J. C. Johnson, both near Walla Walla, Lincoln County.

Dr. Hayner said the State Agriculture Department was renewing its advice to farmers to have horses revaccinated each year in Eastern Washington areas where the disease has occurred.

He advised farmers and other persons in such areas to try to avoid mosquito bites, by spraying breeding areas, wearing protective clothing and using repellent.

Mosquitoes have been confirmed as only known carriers of the disease, Dr. Hayner said. Teams of investigators now are collecting specimens of the insect for study.

The disease strain occurring in this state is called western equine encephalitis, or brain fever. The disease occasionally is fatal to humans. In this state four cases in humans were confirmed in 1956.
